Last month's column illustrated the workings of one Standing Committee (Communications) and its several subcommittees.

From time to time, needs or opportunities come to KORA Council that aren't addressed by any of our 87 committees in their ongoing efforts, leading to the creation of an ad hoc committee or group. Four such groups are now engaged: For several months, you've been reading about and taking part in activities arranged by the 20th Anniversary Committee, co-chaired by Donna Baznik and Bob Longsworth. As reported on p. 1, in addition to special events building to a climax in early October, many of our ongoing committees are linking their own efforts to the anniversary theme. In April, KORA and Kendal at Oberlin co-sponsored a visit and presentation by Dennis McCullough, the primary creator of the Slow Medicine approach to medical care for the elderly. Led by our Ad Hoc Slow Medicine Committee, during May and June more than 120 residents took part in dinner table conversations about the implications of Slow Medicine for KatO and its residents. A summary is available from cochairs Ruth Miller and Ardith Hayes. Continuing conversations are leading to new understanding by residents and our families of ways we can support one another in understanding and addressing health care needs as we age. On a parallel track, new staffing patterns in Stephens Care Center and the Wellness Clinic promise more continuity in health care for KatO residents -- as shared in superb staff presentations at the July 23 Quarterly Health Care Forum.

After a discussion at May's KORA Council meeting, we named an Ad Hoc KORA Committee to Explore a Capital Campaign, "probably focused on the Community Center improvements." The minutes noted "cautions and reservations expressed by the residents." Some of those expressing such concerns are members of the Committee. After three meetings, the Committee has begun to draft a proposal largely focused on dedicated space for RAF activities and contributions to the Resident Assistance Fund plus, perhaps, a new fund for entrance assistance. A proposal would also probably include opportunity for contributions designated to other Community improvements: Fitness area; Woodshop/Art Center renovation; and a new Horticultural space. A complete proposal, for consideration by all residents and KORA Council before proceeding, must await more accurate estimates of costs for these improvements.

KORA Officers have convened an informal Ad Hoc Space Committee to explore guidelines for use of the Hobby/Craft room spaces, including storage, partly with a view toward a desire for hobby space by newer residents. Finally, please note, in Barbara Thomas's adjoining column, the request for suggestions to KORA by August 30 of names of residents who might be willing to serve on Kendal at Oberlin's Board of Directors. A more detailed announcement, with instructions, is posted on the KORA Bulletin Board. Please take a copy from a file on the Library table. -Don Reeves, KORA President

Our bylaws allow up to 20% of the board to be filled by residents. A resident's board service is for a three-year term, with the possibility of one additional three-year term.

But perhaps most of all, we are seeking a board member who can effectively work with the current board and management to keep Kendal at Oberlin healthy.

If you are interested or know someone who is, please notify the KORA Council within the next month, so that it can submit its nominees by the end of August.

In September, many of the nominees will be interviewed by the board's Governance Committee. At the November board meeting, the candidate(s) recommended by the Governance Committee will be voted on by the whole board.

Nominations Sought for KORA Council -

KORA Council consists of 11 councilors and four officers. It is the responsibility of the Nominating Committee to prepare a slate of people to fill available positions. To start this process we ask residents to suggest to us people whom you feel would well represent you as councilors and/or officers. We recommend that these residents should have lived at Kendal for at least one year. Your suggestions should be submitted to Box #37 in writing before August 15. Please get the consent of the person whom you are suggesting while indicating to him/her that your suggestion does not guarantee that he/she will be on the committee's recommended slate. There are more well-qualified persons than places available. From this pool of names, the Committee nominates a slate of candidates, which is presented at the Annual Meeting in November for ratification by consensus. KORA's Constitution provides for nominations from the floor, in which case the election would be decided by ballot.

Kendal's Art Gallery News

On August 12, this summer's **Kendal Collects,** now hanging in all three of our galleries, will come down.

Kendal Gallery - The prints of Charlie Harper, a local "wild life" artist, will be on display until September 15 and will be followed by the paintings of Cleveland artist Rita Schuenemann until early November.

Friend's Gallery - "Kendal at Oberlin through the Years," an exhibit of historical photographs, will go up on August 13. This show will stay there until mid-October, giving all of us plenty of opportunities to spend time appreciating these fascinating depictions of the initial planning, organization and construction of KatO, and the subse-

quent vibrant life of our extraordinary community, as it has unfolded during the past 20 years.

Community Gallery - The paintings of Lee Hefner will be shown from August 15 through the end of September. Then, in celebration of Kendal's 20th anniversary, a display of both the fronts and backs of *Eureka!* covers will coordinate with the historical pictures of Kendal in Friends Gallery. Saturday Foreign Film August 3 - 7:15pm - AUD

Departures (2009) - This powerful and moving Japanese film won the Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film. Cellist Diago Kobayashi loses his position when his orchestra in Tokyo is disbanded. He goes home with his bride to find a job. Mistakenly he applies as an apprentice "Nokanshi," one who performs the ceremony preparing the dead for burial. Heed the 18-inch Rule!

The National Fire Prevention Assn. mandates that there be 18 in. of free space between the top of any obstruction and ceiling sprinklers. During his visit to Kendal at Oberlin just after our Spring Fling, the Ohio Fire Marshal inspected storage areas and resident rooms in the Stephens Care Center and instructed that material stored on upper shelves be removed. When he visited the Auditorium, he stated the location of the imaginative tangle of nets and fishes near the ceiling sprinklers was violating the 18-in. rule as the decorations would interfere with sprinkler function in the event of a fire. A quick on-line search through legal literature cites inconsistencies in interpreting where the 18-in. rule applies, but the Fire Marshal does have the discretion to make such findings. I suppose that he was looking at all Kendal rooms as connected to a nursing facility -- which does require higher standards of compliance.

Until further clarification is obtained, it would be well to note this prohibition, especially when we plan special decorations throughout the public spaces at Kendal.

July 2013 Kendal at Oberlin Board Notes

- Our New Chair During Ed Miller's first meeting as Chair, he spoke of his intent to lead the meeting by being attentive to Quaker Principles, including careful listening, encouraging participation, respecting all opinions and being open to alternatives. He asked board members to feel free to attend other committee meetings on which they do not serve for increased knowledge.
- Board Approvals Kendal's Board reviewed the policy for recruiting resident board members since there will be an opening in 2014 for a three-year term. They also approved an Inter-affiliate Agreement to prorate costs for the self-insurance program for staff of Kendal at Oberlin, Kendal at Home and Senior Independence. This agreement is being reviewed by all the boards for implementation. The Board also approved the Investment Policy Guidelines which allow for a minimum of 5% of socially responsible funds. The new funding level actually is now 35% of socially responsible funds. The Board received an update on the Master Plan which continues to seek the most favorable contractor arrangement that will stay within our financing resources without compromising design preferences.
- Generative Discussion The Board focused on learning more about Kendal at Home, which has celebrated its 10th anniversary since it was created by Kendal at (Continued on p. 9)

Welcome Kendal's New Residents

Carla: Born and raised in Canonsburg, PA (Perry Como's home town), I went just 20 miles into Pittsburgh for my RN from Presbyterian Hospital School of Nursing in 1960. Further schooling came later after marriage and children -- BS degree in Nursing from Penn State, and MEd in counseling from Westminster College.

I met Bob when he appeared as an intern at our church. Discovering that we were both attending school in Pittsburgh, he was quite willing to "save [my] parents the trip" and drive me back on Sunday evenings.

Still students, we married in 1959, and the adventure began! After our graduations, we moved to eastern Ohio, where Bob pastored two rural churches. In between nursing work, I learned how to bake bread from one of my favorite farm wives. This would hold me in good stead for days ahead in Africa -- baking bread on a wood stove, while living in the outlying provinces. Ethiopia was our home for six years -with three-plus years in Iowa City for Bob's PhD interposed. Our two wonderful daughters consumed much of my day while we lived in Addis Ababa, and everywhere we located I always used my nursing skills. My most rewarding clinical work was with lepers in a rehab center.

Since our return to the United States, we spent most of 40 years in New Wilmington, PA, where Bob was on the faculty at Westminster College. In addition to church involvements, I moved from childbirth educator into children/family counseling, and lastly to parish nursing ... combining nursing and counseling.

One of the many reasons we were at-

tracted to Kendal was to live closer to our daughters in Lakewood and Tiffin, OH. Grandson events now fill our lives. I love to read, design cards, garden, practice yoga, walk in the woods, and cook. Robert: I was born and raised in West Allis, WI, earned degrees from Lawrence College and Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. Carla and I were married in 1959. In 1962 Carla agreed to undertake another adventure: two years as volunteers in the outlying areas of Ethiopia, where I served as a builder, maintenance man and teacher. The University of Iowa granted me a PhD in religion in 1968. During our three years in Iowa City, daughter Laura joined the family. From 1968 to 1972 we lived in Ethiopia again, where I taught full time in the history department at Haile Selassie I University, developed joint projects with the Ethiopian Orthodox Church, coordinated ecumenical programs and service projects. Theater and music also claimed some time. Daughter Heather joined the family in 1970. Fall 1972, I divided my time teaching at Pittsburgh Seminary and Westminster College. The visiting status at Westminster turned into a tenured position. I served on design teams for several new programs, coordinated the Honors Program, chaired the Department of Religion and Philosophy, and developed the Peace Center. Beyond the academic sphere, I served on some state and national boards, participated in and coordinated many Interfaith Conversations, and co-coordinated

international learning-service projects. After the events of 9/11, Carla and I and our Muslim and Jewish partners in Interfaith Conversations were particularly active. In 2002, the Presbyterian Church (USA) initiated the Listening Project that brought to the United States international teams of Muslims and Christians to tell to Americans their stories of interfaith cooperation in their home countries. I served as moderator for public forums in Pittsburgh and Youngstown. In retirement I continue my main hobbies of "fixing things" and woodworking. I also try to remain involved in peace and justice activities and in projects under Habitat for Humanity and the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance program.

Guidelines for Using Kendal's Channel 19 Services

Channel 19 TV offers daily updates of all activities and events taking place on the Kendal at Oberlin campus. Unless official Kendal transportation is available, nothing occurring in the town or at the college is publicized. The exceptions are the weekly Park Walks which specify car-pooling.

To serve you better, the following guidelines are suggested:

- All requests for an announcement should be placed in the Channel 19 open mailbox adjacent to the Heiser Reception Desk.
- Events with an early registration deadline are announced four days before the deadline and on the day the registration closes, a total of five days. After this, an announcement is shown three days prior to the actual event and on the day the event takes place, a total of four days. Let us know if there is a preregistration deadline. By limiting the viewing days we avoid making a particular day's presentation too long to watch conveniently.
- Regular weekly events are limited to less exposure (e.g., Jazz Listening, Stretch and Strength, Quaker Worship).
- For those who prepare their own slides for us to scan, we suggest that all lettering be in black and in nothing less that Arial #36 font. Colored letters are difficult, if not impossible, for the sight-impaired to read.
- Thanks to Jim Pugsley, we now have an email address: *wkaoch19@gmail.com*. The password is kendalch19. **This is not for submitting announcement requests.** It is only for last minute corrections and for comments and suggestions.
- Please submit your requests at least 12 days before the event you wish to announce takes place. When late requests are received just prior to or after our seven Channel 19 operators are assigned their individual schedules for each day of the week, there is likely to be confusion in our workroom and some disappointed Kendal residents.

Our goal is to offer the best possible service to all Kendal residents.
