Fall Lifelong Learning Classes at Kendal

These courses will be offered only in Heiser Auditorium, with the exception of the December course. Doors will close at 10:35am. The Lifelong Learning Committee will provide instructions for registering via <u>kaores.org</u>.

"It Ain't Nothin' 'Til We Say So": An Imperial Supreme Court? Tues., Sept. 3, 10, and 17; 10:30am-12:00pm. Jonathan Entin, Kendal resident and Professor Emeritus, Case Western Reserve School of Law, examines the most recent Supreme Court term. The Supreme Court this past year issued a series of cases that will make it more difficult to prosecute former President Trump, are likely to restrict the scope of federal regulatory authority, and continue the trend of insulating voting restrictions from judicial challenges. We will review these and other rulings that seem to have enhanced the Court's powers.

Session 1: The Presidency. This session will focus on the Court's rulings on presidential immunity and the scope of executive authority as well as on state power to bar presidential candidates from the ballot under Section 3 of the Fourteenth Amendment, which disqualifies insurrectionists from holding federal or state office.

Session 2: Federal Regulatory Authority. Several cases last term portend significant changes to federal regulatory authority. These rulings repudiated the *Chevron* doctrine of judicial deference to agencies, restricted the ability of agencies to enforce their regulations, and set aside various environmental rules as well as a Trump administration ban on bump stocks. Other cases rejected efforts to restrict abortion access but almost certainly will not be the final word on those efforts.

Session 3: Voting, the First Amendment, and the Supreme Court's Evolution. The final session will examine decisions relating to redistricting and voting rights, internet regulation, and political corruption, and will identify broader themes about the Supreme Court's position in American law and life.

Civilization and Enlightenment: The Spectacular Art of Japan's Meiji Period (1868-1911). Mon., Sept. 30, Oct. 7 and 14; 10:30am-12:00pm. Dr. Kevin R. E. Greenwood, Joan L. Danforth Curator of Asian Art at the Allen Memorial Art Museum, presents three lectures inspired by the recent full restoration of the Allen's large bronze *Incense Burner with Dragon Base*, made during Japan's Meiji era, and introducing the diverse art of the period. Long overlooked by scholars, appreciation for the creativity and technical brilliance of Meiji artists and artisans has flowered in recent decades with major museum exhibitions and publications.

Lecture 1: The Historical Context of Meiji Art. Discusses the historical, economic, and cultural roots of Meiji art, the forced opening of Japan to global trade and its effects on the arts, and the political significance of the Japanese arts of the period as a form of global "soft power."

Lecture 2: From the Awe-inspiring to the Exquisite: the Diversity of Meiji Art. Focuses on representative examples of Meiji arts in various mediums, from decorative arts to paintings and prints, with works from the Allen and other collections.

Lecture 3: The Global Impact of Early Modern Japanese Art. Highlights the role of international exhibitions in creating the late 19th- to early 20th-century "Japan Craze," and its wide impact on the arts and culture of Europe and North America.

Art Gallery News

In late August the Kendal Collects show ends and the new Kendal gallery show season will begin.

The Friends Gallery remains off limits for a new show, but photographs from the Kendal Photographers Interest Group continue to grace the wall. Look for a gallery reopening later this year.

Next in the **Kendal Gallery** – from Aug. 20 to Oct. 14 – is a group show called An Artist Lives Twice that features works by The Artists of Group Ten. This cooperative group of professional artists, currently numbering 17, was established in 2012 in Kent, OH. The group has grown from the initial ten artists who came together with the idea of exhibiting and selling their artworks locally and regionally. Artists in the group work in a variety of mediums including oils, watercolors, acrylics, mixed media, pastels, and metal sculpture. Some of the artists work in several different mediums, experimenting along the way.

Poetry and Landscapes by artist Jill Milenski will be on display in the Community Gallery from Aug. 23 to Oct. 17. Jill's Artist's Talk is Sat., Sept. 21, at 4:00pm in the Auditorium and on KOTV. The exhibit will show colorful oil pastel landscapes and cityscapes from Northeast Ohio, Europe, and New England. Also, a selection of poetry/quote collages will be on display. Jill takes some of her favorite quotes and enhances them with color and images to bring the quote to life and encourage the reader to pay attention to the words.

Take another look at the display of treasured cups and saucers in the Curio Cabinet. The display ends in mid-August. Next on these shelves are coasters that Randy Wagner collected in his travels around the world.



Dining Matters

On July 3 the Dining Matters Committee conducted its monthly meeting in the Friends Corner in the Stephens Care Center, to hear firsthand what residents are thinking about the new dining room. A number of the 13 residents who joined us were satisfied with their new dining experience.

We did hear of several concerns. One resident complained at the lack of salt in the dishes served. He was reminded that a number of residents require restricted salt but that every table has a salt shaker. He was under the impression that salt substitute was in the shakers. Lisa Wilken assured him that real salt is in all salt shakers.

Several residents were eager to read lunch and dinner menus the evening before. These menus are now placed on a cart in the dining room so that they can be available.

A couple of residents explained that the bare floors between tables in combination with the carpeted space under the tables create a hazard when people are pushing their chairs back in preparation for standing up. There is no good solution for this problem since the carpet was installed to help to absorb noise in the room. The servers will be warned to assist residents when necessary as they are standing up.

The committee was deeply concerned to hear how noisy the hood and fan in the kitchen were. When Lisa Wilken opened the door to the kitchen, the noise level went up markedly. We have been told that this equipment is not supposed to be so noisy and that efforts are being made to adjust the noise downward.

A microwave is still missing from the kitchen because the circuits are insufficient to permit the use of necessary appliances. We hope to hear soon that this problem has been addressed.

We were very pleased to return to the SCC for a listening session, and we will keep tabs on the issues that were raised. We hope to learn soon that a chef has been hired for the SCC kitchen. We have been assured that, when there is sufficient staff, Independent Living residents will be able to share meals with friends in the SCC. In the meantime we hope that SCC residents will make their way to the Fox and Fell and the Langston to share meals with their Independent Living friends.
