KNOW YOUR KORA COUNCIL

At the KORA Annual Meeting on Thursday November 3, Nancy Garver, co-chair of the Memorial Services Committee, read the names of the 20 residents who died since November 2010: William Renfrow, AnneMarie Menzel, Doris Sable, John (Jack) Brown, Bob Smith, Dewey Ganzel, Kathlyn Champney, Bill Hutchison, Estelle Palmer, Richard Blount, Marjorie LeBeau, Arthur Steele, Robert Collins, Jo Kerrigan, Jean Dehnel, Milton Yinger, Harvey Gittler, Paul Oncley, Anne Gieschen, and Hugh McCorkle. They are very much missed!

I gave my Annual Report, noting that we have grown to 319 residents and when the Stephens Care Expansion is completed early in 2012 our population could reach 360 at 100% occupancy -- well over the 300 we on the original planning committee envisioned as optimal. This population increase is straining our community spaces, especially given the high interest in fitness among the generation now beginning to enter retirement communities. Our 87 different KORA groups have been very active, and our residents have given more than 40,000 volunteer hours within Kendal and out in the larger community. KORA's fundraising has been very successful -- \$32,600 for last December's Employee Holiday Fund, \$34,000 for the Employee Vacation Fund, \$5,000 for Oberlin Community Services at our 18th Anniversary Dinner, and \$25,000 for our own KORA budget. We constantly strive to improve our communications, but take pride in our Library offerings, our publications (*The Kendalight*, *Eureka* and, now, the *Health Newsletter* shared with other Kendals), our Channel 19, poster and audio announcements, and our superb website. This year Kendal residents participated in the City of Oberlin strategic planning process ("Oberlin 2025") and

the City-College collaborative "Oberlin Project" aiming to make our town -- already an "Ohio 2012 Best Home-town" -- "the greenest city in America."

I trust we will be involved in many ways as residents, not least as resident members of the Kendal Board of Directors, in developing a new 15-year strategic plan for Kendal that is integrated with these other efforts. We have started planning our celebration of the 20th Anniversary of the opening of Kendal at Oberlin in October 2013, including the publication of a history of our very special community. I concluded with special thanks to Sam Goldberg, our outstanding used car salesman, and Mary Simons and her RAF Shop associates for raising \$40,443 for our Resident Assistance Fund.

Domestic Issues on National Debt Results

Recycling Paper, Ink Cartridges and Newspaper Sleeves

Recycling Paper: Only about 50% of the paper used in America is currently being recovered for recycling. The market for recycled paper keeps growing.

Recycle all of your paper all the time. It really makes a difference. When paper is placed in a landfill instead of being recycled, more virgin forests must be cut (hastening climate change). The landfilled paper itself produces methane, a greenhouse gas that also hastens climate change.

Switch to digital/online subscriptions and memberships away from paper whenever you can.

Purchase magazines printed on recycled paper. The Better Paper Project Web site features a regularly updated list of magazines that publish on recycled paper.

Use paper printed only on one side in your computer printer. One of our residents makes scratch pads out of such paper. (For more information ask Nancy Hultquist).

Recycling Ink Cartridges: Used printer ink cartridges can be recycled. Give them to our Early Learning Center or place them in the box under the copy machine in our Library. From both sites the cartridges will be turned in for reimbursement for funds that will be used to support those facilities.

Recycling Plastic Sleeves: The plastic sleeves and rubber bands that come with your delivered newspapers can be re-used by the delivery person. Just place them at your delivery site for re-use. Otherwise, he has to purchase new supplies.

Bob: I was born and reared in rural Ohio. I completed my undergraduate education at Duke University, in Durham, NC, where I had the great good fortune to meet Carol Herndon, who was a native Tarheel. We were married during the summer following our graduation, and spent the next six years in Boston. Following receipt of the PhD degree in English from Harvard, I became a member of the Oberlin College faculty in 1964, and I remained there until my retirement in 2001.

My dissertation, which dealt with medieval drama, was published in 1968 as *The Cornish Ordinalia*. Medieval literature continued to be my primary field of interest throughout my active career, and the subject of several articles that I have published. At the behest of the Department of English at Oberlin, I undertook to teach a course in the History and Structure of the English Language: That experience led me to the publication, after retirement, of a book entitled "A Decade of Campus Language at Oberlin College." Late in my career I began offering a course on The Bible in Literature, a topic that continues to nudge me toward further publication.

Beginning in 1974, I interrupted my teaching to serve for a decade as Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Oberlin. In 1980, I was granted a leave of absence in order to take up a research fellowship at the National Humanities Center in North Carolina.

Carol and I are the parents of three children: Eric (born in Boston) is married to Pascale Graham and is a violoncellist who lives permanently in France;

Margaret (born in Oxford, England) is married to Richard Flood (an Oberlinian) and is a violinist; Ann (born in Oberlin) is married to Daniel Orr and, while living in Green Springs, OH, is a member of the staff of Senator Sherrod Brown.

Among them, they have bestowed upon us eight grandchildren (Jacob, William, SaraEve, Samuel, Ariana, Clara Margaret, Lewis and Molly), each of whom is worthy of a panegyric.

Carol: My North Carolina accent gives me away, although my husband and I have lived in Oberlin for 47 years. I was born and raised in Durham, attended Duke University and met there my sweetheart, Robert Longsworth, to whom I have been married for 53 years.

Music was my major at Duke and in the Master of Music program at New England Conservatory. Our children's growing up years included cello, violin and piano and even now we enjoy family musicales when we get together at Christmas time.

I was privileged to serve as Director of Music at The First Church in Oberlin, UCC for 28 years, starting in 1977, and had the pleasure of directing a chamber concert choir in the area for 37 years.

I started flute lessons ten years ago. Since retiring, I have continued with various volunteer efforts, especially serving on the Board of Family Promise and the Interfaith Hospitality Network, an organization that helps

homeless children and their parents. My husband and I also volunteer at First Church in various ways, including arranging Adult Education programs on Sunday mornings.

We have many friends who live at Kendal and we look forward to joining them, not only for the remarkable events that enliven the Kendal calendar, but also for the wonderful sense of community and caring that permeates the campus. In addition, the new Kendal residents we have met have such a wealth of experiences to share. We are honored to be among you!

The Medical Buzz from Molly Singletary, HWC Nurse Practitioner



Medical discoveries, warnings and updates are available daily to us thanks to the speed of cyberspace. Each day, a website called *Medscape* alerts medical professionals to the latest "buzz." The purpose of this column is to share some of this breaking news from the medical front. I hope you find this column informative and helpful in your own lives.

- A recent U.K. study found that a 12-session, 3-month yoga program led to greater improvements in back function than usual care for those with chronic low back pain. However, yoga did not yield greater reductions in pain or improvements in overall health compared with usual care. But the study team notes that "...confidence in performing normal activities despite pain improved more in the yoga group than usual care group at 3 and 6 months."

- Late last month the pharmaceutical world was turned upside down when the lipid-lowering agent atorvastatin (Lipitor from Pfizer), which has claimed the number one spot in drug sales for the past five years, lost its patent protection in the U.S. The generic company Ranbaxy Laboratories has launched its generic product.

As Kendal's Risk Manager, I have appreciated residents notifying me when they have experienced a "near miss" with a phone scam or other seemingly fraudulent or suspicious happening. Here are some active scams to avoid:

- Recently a company identifying itself as "911 Medical" called a Kendal resident and asked her to sign up to aid in the organization and transfer of her medical records in case of a medical emergency. The caller asked for two payments of \$247.12 to insure that all her medical records would be forwarded to her place of treatment. The resident wisely declined the offer and called Kendal's Health & Wellness Clinic. Our staff reassured her that our Clinic would forward all her records.

- Here's a scam that has happened frequently during the annual Part D open enrollment. Phone callers identify themselves as an employee of Medicare or a non-existent agency such as the "National Medical Office." You are told that you need a new Medicare card, but first you must authenticate your identity by providing your Medicare number (which is your social security number) and date of birth. You may be asked for a credit card or bank account number. **Please do not respond to these calls! Medicare will not call you asking for your number.**

Medicare has no agents who will visit your home or send you unsolicited email messages. If you call Medicare directly, however, you will be asked for your number.

- The "grandparent scam" is alive and well! Someone calls a grandparent claiming to be a grandson. His story varies: he was in a car accident or became stranded while traveling overseas. But there is always an urgent need for money to be wired. The Better Business Bureau says this scam has become an "epidemic in Ohio."

Never be pressured or persuaded to send money in response to a phone call. And never give out your personal identity numbers, bank account or credit card information!
