
2017 Solstice: Friday, December 15, at 7:15pm “A Cornucopia of Food for a Hungry Spirit”

Professor Jiyul Kim returns to Kendal to speak on **“Prospects for Afghanistan and Pakistan.”** Kim is a retired U.S. Army officer and currently Visiting Assistant Professor of history at Oberlin College. His publications have dealt with history, archaeology, policy, strategy, culture, and military issues. He has extensive knowledge of military strategy and historical conflict for the nations of Asia. Major internal conflict has plagued Afghanistan for four decades. The U.S., for its part, has conducted military operations in the country nearly continuously since 9/11. Today, war with the Taliban persists, and relations between the U.S. and Pakistan have deteriorated. Does the U.S. face a no-win situation in Afghanistan and Pakistan? **No registration or fee. We use 500 million straws each day, and that's just in America (www.ecocycle.org). That's enough to fill over 127 large school buses every day! What happens to them? As beachfront trash shows, many of them end up in the ocean -- often in the North Atlantic Garbage Patch or Great Pacific Trash Vortex (estimated to be larger than the size of Texas). Yet with a few exceptions, largely medical, plastic straws are unnecessary. Sea turtles certainly don't need them, though a video of one with a straw up its nose has gone viral.

Plastic straws are not biodegradable and they are not recyclable. It doesn't help to put them in a recycling bin. They just go to the landfill and remain there for thousands of years -- if they actually stay there and don't escape to the ocean. For those who must have a straw, there are reusable metal straws available. Remember: There's no such place as "away". Refuse has to go somewhere.

So the next time you are tempted to take a straw for your drink, ask: "Is it really necessary?" The next time a server offers you a straw, say "No thanks. I'd rather not have it end up in the ocean." You might even suggest that they give straws only to those who specifically ask for them. Some fast food restaurants place straws and plastic tops away from the cups or condiments, so the customers have to make an effort to get them. At Kendal we are fortunate enough to have reusable cups and glasses that have gone through a rigorous washing regime. Let's use them and forget about the straw!

I was born and raised in Chicago, graduated from Vassar College in 1963, and headed to Washington, DC, along with many of my generation, including my future husband, an African-American whom I met at the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. He was a Foreign Service Officer headed for his first assignment, in Bremen, Germany; we married there and started a family with the birth of our daughter Katherine. Back in Washington, I did volunteer work for several years, and he moved to the Office of Management and Budget. After our son Rob, born in 1968, was old enough to go to full-time pre-school I began a career with the Department of Transportation. I was a policy wonk in the Office of the Secretary of Transportation for 22 years, at first working on domestic issues but then moving to the international office. I was one of the team leaders for North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) negotiations and was the Secretary's representative for shipbuilding negotiations and tariff talks. It was exciting but wearing, and I took early retirement. My husband and I left an urban life and moved to a rural home on 85 acres in Bedford County, PA, in 1996. I could finally indulge in my love of gardening and Jim could buy tractors. I decided to create an online catalogue of western Pennsylvania crafts and food, and for five years it was a fun enterprise. I also became president of a local chamber-music organization that books professional musicians for a community-chorus Messiah, a six-concert chamber series, music in the

schools, and six free summer concerts. When my husband of almost 50 years passed away in July 2014, though, it became difficult to maintain the property alone, and with daughter Katherine in Cleveland, Kendal at Oberlin became a very exciting step forward.

My education included a diploma in nursing from St. Luke's School of Nursing in Cleveland. When Kent State University started their nursing program in the late 1960s, I was one of the four Registered Nurses in the first graduating class. In 1974 I attended Case Western Reserve, Frances Payne Bolton School of Nursing, receiving a master's degree with a specialty in medical surgical nursing. I specialized in emergency room nursing and practiced in that field for about 25 years. After being a caregiver for my elderly mother, I changed my field of interest to care of the elderly. I received certification by the

American Nurses Assn. as Gerontological Clinical Nurse Specialist. My nursing practice in geriatrics included helping to start a geriatric program at Summa Health System in Akron. This involved teaching the internal medicine residents how to care for older patients. I also had a private business and we provided care management for clients in their homes. I am the youngest of three girls. My oldest sister lives in Connecticut. My other sister sadly passed away in 2013. I am the proud aunt

of three generations of nieces and nephews, including Terry Kovach, Assistant Director of Marketing. She is the reason I started volunteering at Kendal after I retired and now have become a resident.

I started volunteering at Kendal in 2005. I served on the former Wellness Committee and was appointed to the KatO Board of Directors, serving nine years.

I am an avid sports fan, including horse racing. I have traveled to places including Japan, Costa Rica, Alaska, Europe and many trips to horse farms in Lexington, KY.

The John Bartram Arboretum:**

**Your Garden and
Arboretum Planting Sites**

The Arboretum Committee, working in collaboration with Kendal at Oberlin's administration, has become more and more aware of the complexity of determining planting sites. It has not been easy for our Facility Services to know exactly where all of the earliest electrical, water, sewage and drainage lines have been placed. And now we must also be cognizant of the placement of geothermal wells and their connections to cottages.

Kendal has been working to get a multi-layered map for our campus. The top layer shows what we see with our eyes: structures, roadways, walkways and parking places, trees, shrubs and grassy areas. As our Arboretum Committee assesses the condition of each of our planted trees, we are entering its GPS coordinates to have accurate site location. The top layer is the easiest part; the underground layers the more complicated. Where are the current electrical lines, water lines, sewage and drainage pipes, as well as geothermal wells and connections? Thankfully, new technology exists which can help with keeping track of layers below ground, essential information for choosing a planting site.

In looking into using new technology, we may have resources through Oberlin College, as the Geology Department is offering a Geographic Information System Winter Term class in which students need to choose a GIS project. The GIS system is "designed to capture, store, manipulate, analyze, manage, and present spatial or geographic data" (*Wikipedia*). This can be a way to develop a multi-layered map. Our Arboretum Committee is in contact with the teacher of that class and we hope a student will choose to work on our very real project.

Once we have a multi-layered map, it will take much less time to determine whether a tree can be planted in a particular site. We hope to be able to prioritize sites where planting trees would be most beneficial. As the Arboretum Committee has said, best practices for tree placement are to plant the largest tree appropriate for the site, the type which fits the soil, water and climate conditions, and one which can thrive, but is not the very easiest for the location, and which adds to the diversity of our collection. Many new residents and residents who have been experiencing drainage and construction work in their neighborhoods are interested in making their gardens beautiful, homey and restful. Some wish to either plant a new tree or incorporate a nearby tree into their garden area. Our basic guidelines (see your handbook under documents: Horticulture Committee, Guidelines for Planting at Kendal at Oberlin) give residents permission to garden within five feet of their cottage or apartment. Doing anything else requires Kendal at Oberlin Resident Landscape Project Authorization, for which there is a form at the Heiser Reception Desk. Kendal's Grounds Department is not responsible for the upkeep of your

cottage or apartment garden. If you can no longer take care of it yourself, you need to hire someone to do so or the garden may be removed and the area returned to grass.

In choosing planting sites, we all need to be aware of any already anticipated disruption to the area under consideration. It does not make sense for the Arboretum Committee, or you as a resident, to invest in a tree or shrub where geothermal wells will be dug in the near future. We hope our planting sites can be well chosen, fitting into a long-range campus plan, so that our trees can bring us, and future Kendal folk, great joy as they grow to a healthy old age.



Recycling Report from the Republic Lorain County Resource Recovery Complex

Members of Kendal's Environmental Concerns Committee recently went on a tour of the Republic Lorain County Resource Recovery Complex.

The facility was started in 1992. This was updated in 2012 by Republic Company. The old system processed 120 tons daily; the new system processes 280 tons. The old system manually sorted 2500 lb. per man hour; the new system mechanically sorts 7200 lb. per man hour. The old system sorted 150,000 bottles per day; the new system sorts 750,000 per day. Note that 20% of all waste goes to landfill; 80% is recyclable. Fiber gets reused for newspaper, toiletries and cardboard. Plastics are melted down and reused for plastic containers and carpeting. Aluminum is reused for aluminum cans. Metal is melted down for metal objects. Glass is separated by color and is used for counter tops and the painted stripes on roads.

Our present list of recyclable objects (paper, glass, plastics, metal containers) is acceptable. Items should be cleansed of any food or liquid.

We were reminded that the following items are NOT RECYCLABLE: containers having food or liquid; those with hazardous material such as oil or antifreeze; and styrofoam, aluminum foil, pie tins, china, window glass, light bulbs, ceramics, plastic wrap, plastic

bags, flower pots, toys, scrap metal, pots or pans, car parts, batteries, needles, syringes, yard waste, grass and leaves.

PLEASE DO NOT PUT ANY OF THESE ITEMS IN THE RECYCLING CONTAINERS.
