responded to a bulletin board notice of

Oberlin College. I knew virtually  
nothing about Oberlin at the time, but  
gladly seized the opportunity to enter  
Oberlin College when offered. I  
eventually settled on a pre-medical  
major, and my extra-curricular activities  
included varsity football, lacrosse, and  
baseball. After graduating in 1956, I  
spent the following year working as a  
research assistant to one of my biology  
professors and then attended Western  
Reserve University School of Medicine,  
graduating in 1961.

My wife Emma and I met and  
married during my last year of medical  
school in Cleveland, where she had  
come to teach French in Maple  
Heights schools. After completing my  
residency training in Pediatrics in 1964,  
I returned to Oberlin and joined the  
recently formed Oberlin Clinic, being  
the first formally trained pediatrician in  
Oberlin.

After two years in practice, I was  
drafted during the Vietnam War and  
spent two years as a pediatrician at the  
U.S. naval hospital in Guantanamo  
Bay, Cuba. Fortunately, Emma and our  
two oldest children were able to  
accompany me there. I returned to  
pediatric practice in the Oberlin Clinic  
in 1968 and our youngest child was  
born that year. After 35 years of  
practice, I retired in 1999. My leisure  
time activities since retirement have  
included much time visiting children  
and grandchildren, gardening,  
astronomy and star-gazing, golf, and a  
lot of *surfing*, which I do exclusively  
“on the web.”

**From The John Bartram Arboretum:  
The Cucumber Tree:  
*Magnolia acuminata***

This beautiful native magnolia will be planted in the new large arboretum bed being developed in Kendal's largest interior quadrangle, north of Farmer's Pond. We are grateful to Fran and Roger Cooper for generously adding this tree to the diversity of our Arboretum collection.

John Bartram discovered and brought it home from his journey to Lake Ontario in 1743 when he accompanied Conrad Weiser and was present at treaty-making between Virginians and the Five Nations of Indians. Bartram then sent it to the English amateur Peter Collinson. As it can readily be propagated by layers and is very hardy, it was soon cultivated throughout the gardens of Europe.

The Cucumber Tree, which is one of the largest magnolias, grows 50-80 feet high and 40 feet wide. You can see a 75-foot one at the Holden Arboretum. It grows at a medium-to-fast rate, about 25 inches a year. Its leaves are deciduous, alternate, and have a downy underside. The tree flowers greenish-yellow and slightly fragrant, and the fruit becomes pinkish-red shaped like a cucumber, hence the common name. Its seeds are eaten by birds and small mammals. Pioneers used its wood for furniture, boxes, and interior paneling. Does anyone here at Kendal at Oberlin have a piece of this wood to show us? It often was sold as yellow poplar. You will see some of its dried leaves this month on the display table.

## 25 12th KORA President: Don Reeves 2013 and 2014

Don and Barbara Reeves moved to Kendal in July 2009 from Nebraska, leaving their farm, a home base for them and their children for more than 54 years. Don majored in agriculture and after college spent three years in the Philippines. This experience led to a lifelong dedication to the elimination of global hunger and poverty. When he returned to Nebraska, Don and his cousin began the two-family farm venture that permitted time for family, community activities, travel, volunteer work, and employment sabbaticals in Nebraska and beyond. Don has been involved with Quakers locally and Quaker organizations nationally and internationally for 60 years. He also served 12 years on the staff of Bread for the World.

Don was KORA president in 2013 and 2014. For Don, nourishing our sense of community by devoting an appropriate amount of attention to its well-being is a critical function of KORA. This involves nurturing individuals as well as addressing systemic problems, and is grounded in principles of love and equality. Community strength comes from KORA’s governance model that fosters respectful, reasoned decision-making.

Residents’ capacity to move as a community to good solutions, although not always easy or comfortable, was demonstrated several times during Don’s years in office. One such decision was to designate a \$5,000 community grant for Oberlin mobility fairs, one of 24 suggested uses. In-depth discussions about transportation led to the creation of a Transportation Commission. In 2013 concerns were raised about the national medical system’s focus on health care as product delivery. Residents began identifying ways to advocate and supplement support for the well-being of residents – living well with whatever time we have. The Thoughtful Medicine Committee evolved.

Those who come in contact with Don know his delight in people and their lives, his dedication to peace and justice, and his deep love of the land, the environment, and building community. Don – wise elder, philosopher, strategist – continues to support individuals and serve the Kendal community in many ways. Thank you, Don!

## 25 13th KORA President: Ardith Hayes 2015 and 2016

When Ardith Hayes and Ruth Ann Clark retired, they planned to settle in Chicago to be near their two sons and six grandchildren, but Kendal came calling. They moved here in September 2011. The community has benefited greatly from their choice.

Ardith had a rich and diverse work life. Early in her career she was involved in full-time ministry, development of Head Start Centers, founding of Montessori preschools, and more. Then her career took another direction, lasting 32 years: seminary teaching and administration. This work took her to Chicago, New York, and Berkeley. Throughout, she held many leadership positions and impacted the lives of adults, children, and students.

Ardith was KORA's President in 2015 and 2016. She feels it was a privilege to serve and welcomed the combination of organizational leadership and community-tending involved. There were challenges, but also much laughter along with the work. She is deeply grateful for the amazing support, acceptance, and encouragement she received from residents, staff, and administration.

Highlights of those years: Residents learning to live together in an almost-full house; advocacy for public transportation in Lorain County and the launch of our Ride-Share program; moves into the new and re-done community spaces: KRS, Creative Arts, Woodshop, Horticulture, WKAO; resident input to cottage remodel design and start-up; launch of the John Bartram Arboretum; and participation in development of the Five-Year Strategic Plan.

Ardith explains the importance of the Residents Association in this way: "KORA's organizational structure is the warp and woof on which the tapestry of our community life is woven. It frames our community life and needs to be kept strong. All of us are weavers as we keep the Kendal tradition of participation in our myriad ways. I am amazed at the resilience of this community in adapting to change even as we remain firmly grounded in the values and traditions that formed us."

Thank you, Ardith, for your service and for championing leadership development to sustain and nurture involvement in KORA for years to come.
