2020 Tax Answers for Kendal Residents from Vance DeBouter

During the Zoom program on "2020 Taxes and Changes" held on Wed., Nov. 18, Vance DeBouter, local CPA and a community member of KaO's Finance Committee, talked with Grace Tompos and Tom Konkoly about 2020 year-end tax planning and answered questions from Kendal residents.

His informative presentation offered reminders of important actions to take in making the 2020 Income Tax preparation go smoothly and accurately. If you missed it or would like to review it, contact Tom Konkoly to borrow a thumb drive to use on your computer.

Here is additional information based on questions asked by residents:

Question: Do gifts to the employee funds (vacation and holiday) qualify for a tax deduction?

Answer: YES, Kendal is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization and all gifts to Kendal are tax deductible.

Question: How do I give a stock gift to Kendal at Oberlin?

Answer: Call Ann O'Malley; she has a form for you to complete.

This will enable the transfer of stock from your account to Kendal. In order to be sure your gift gets processed in this calendar year, you should begin the transfer now.

Community Conversations Our Oberlin Prairie Tues., Dec. 1 - 7:15pm Zoom and KOTV

Kate Pilacky and Andy McDowell from the Western Reserve Land Conservancy, Ohio's largest land trust, will present a program on their work. They will focus on the Firelands area and specifically on the newly opened Oberlin Preserve. The site is historically significant because it was a stop on the Underground Railroad and was once owned by the family of the Oberlin abolitionist John A. Copeland Jr. Learn about the conservancy's plans for restoring the prairie to Oberlin.

Kendal System Educational Series on Racial Inequality Mon., Dec. 7 - 2:00pm Zoom and KOTV

Kendal appointed a Racial Justice and Reform Task Force to get underway conversations related to racial injustice and inequity that would encourage all of us to reexamine our own potential unconscious biases around race.

The result was a series of three sessions, led by Christopher Ridenhour, Director of Workplace Culture at SpiriTrust Lutheran, that included a passive learner curriculum on racial inequality where participants learned the uniqueness of diversity, equity, and inclusion in aging services.

Community Conversations Oberlinians Who Fought for Women's Suffrage Thurs., Dec. 10 - 7:15pm Zoom and KOTV

Oberlin Heritage Center's Museum Education and Tour Coordinator Amanda Manahan will tell us about Oberlinians who fought for women's suffrage, working against discrimination on the basis of both sex and race.

Drawing from newspaper accounts and historical records, this 25-minute program looks at activism in a small town, and how it connected to the larger national movement and events that led up to Ohio's ratification of the 19th Amendment in 1919 and to national ratification in 1920. A Q&A session will follow.

The program was originally researched and developed in 2019 by AmeriCorps/Ohio History Service Corps member Riley Thomas.



Oberlin Community Services Needs Our "Holiday Helping Hands"

Oberlin Community Services' Holiday Helping Hands Outreach returns to our Kendal community this month to give needy children in the Oberlin area gifts of toys and much-needed clothing this holiday season. Volunteer sponsors buy and wrap gifts for specific children of Oberlin families. Although the children are anonymous, gift ideas, clothes, and shoe sizes are provided to make it easy to find the perfect items. Last year 336 children in 125 families received gifts. Staff and residents from Kendal at Oberlin kindly covered 25 of these children.

The names and information for the children are on the bulletin board in the Heiser hallway near the Kendal Early Learning Center. Staff and residents can take a name (or names) and shop for the children. This year, if you find it easier to participate by buying gift cards for families, that is certainly welcomed.

Staff will transport them to Oberlin Community Services for distribution to the families. We have participated in this program for several years and have made Christmas a much brighter holiday for Oberlin area families who are facing financial challenges.

A responsive community organization, it provides direct assistance, referrals, and other services to Oberlin and southern Lorain County residents who need help meeting basic needs. More About Kendal's Residents



Sara Millman

My life began in the Chicago area, but we moved to California when I was four. I grew up in Castro Valley (birthplace of Rachel Maddow), then chiefly notable for its six-mile stretch of gas stations and supermarkets.

I started college at UC Berkeley but earned my BA from the University of Oregon in Community Service and Public Affairs, a program designed to equip graduates for human services roles traditionally requiring higher degrees. My specialty was evaluation research, and I was among the program's first graduates who taught the next cohort of the same program.

In time, I found that the work I wanted to do required a higher credential, meaning graduate work. I decided to become a China-specialist/demographer/social psychologist and explore how the Chinese one-child population policy was achieving such great impact and whether lessons from there could be applied in less regimented societies to help them slow their own population growth.

I started graduate work in the University of Washington's sociology department due to UW's strong programs in the three areas I hoped to combine. Learning Chinese at the same time proved too much so I focused on becoming a demographer, earning my MA at UW and my PhD at the University of Michigan.

Then I taught population at Brown University (nine years) and a wider range of sociology courses at the University of Hawaii in Hilo (19 years). Teaching was a joy when I had students genuinely interested in learning, as was research when I had colleagues with whom to share my work.

Ten years ago, I took early retirement and settled in the Seattle area I had loved as a graduate student. I craved the sense of community and involvement I had experienced there. That same craving is much of what motivated me to join KaO this October. Even with the pandemic restrictions, I've felt warmly welcomed here and look forward to the future as those restrictions eventually lift.

Sunday Open Rehearsals in Heiser Lounge to Resume

A tradition of informal music playing, or open rehearsals, by Kendal residents on Sunday afternoons was just getting started when the Covid pandemic intervened. With strict new protocols to protect the health of the musicians and any listeners, the Music Committee has now been authorized to resume this program. The first session will be on December 6 starting at 4:00pm.

The sound of live music has long been a hallmark of life at Kendal and many residents have mourned its loss. Concerts by Conservatory and other outside artists are still off limits, but Kendal has many residents who play musical instruments. Proposed Letter to the Kendal Corporation Board of Directors:

From its founding in 1973 the Kendal Corporation has been a leader among the nation's most progressive CCRCs. Its grounding in Quaker values and its constant, non-intrusive support of all the Kendal campuses sets and maintains exemplary standards for us all.

We as elders, and you as board members, have a heightened awareness of our responsibility to the health and welfare of our children, grandchildren, and the future of our planet. This moment presents an exceptional opportunity for the Kendal community to serve as a model for CCRCs everywhere to address climate change.

Therefore, in the spirit of Quaker collaboration and consensus-building, we Kendal residents seek the Board's assistance in developing a shared commitment among the Kendal Corporation and the residents, administrators, and staffs of its affiliates to address the climate crisis in ways aligned with the IPCC recommendations; specifically, that the board will support and encourage each Kendal affiliate to set carbon reduction goals, such as cutting emissions 50% by 2030 and achieving net carbon neutrality by 2050; help establish interim benchmarks and monitoring systems to measure progress; and seek ways to assist each Kendal affiliate to achieve these goals and targets.

From The John Bartram Arboretum: Winterberry Holly Ilex verticillata

Winterberry is a shrub that we at Kendal at Oberlin can enjoy many months of the year. It grows well in zones 3 to 9, in sun or part shade, and is native throughout Eastern North America. It tolerates clay and wet soil and resists erosion. It has no serious disease or insect problems, although it can have powdery mildew.

Plants do best in acid soil. They can grow 3–12 feet high and 3–12 feet wide, depending on the variety. They should be pruned to shape in early spring before the new growth.

Winterberry is especially appreciated for the bright color of its fruit in late fall and winter. It blooms in very late spring to early summer, and its flowers appear on the new growth. Its berries



are much more noticeable than its flowers and often stay on the stems until early spring.

Winterberry has both male and female plants, so botanically it is called

deciduous. There needs to be one male for six—ten females in order to have the fertilized beautiful red berries.

And it is another plant here at the Arboretum which attracts birds — eastern bluebirds, American robins, cedar waxwings, and woodpeckers. How wonderful that the berries stay on the stems throughout the winter and are available to them.

You can find winterberry here at the John Bartram Arboretum as you come off the Buttonbush Bridge to the north next to the Apartment Building, and in the Courtyard Garden, to name a few locations. As you take walks through the Kendal at Oberlin John Bartram Arboretum, enjoy *Ilex verticillata* and the variety of birds it attracts.
