# Winter Solstice Thurs., Dec. 15 - 7:15pm - Heiser Auditorium, KOTV

Our 2022 Winter Solstice celebration is coming soon! Quite a few of your friends and neighbors have been rehearsing for weeks now, and all are excited that they will once again have a live, in-person audience in Heiser Auditorium, for the first time in three years. The program will, of course, also be broadcast on KOTV.

This year's theme is "Tis the Season to Be Jolly," and we can promise you that the air that evening will be full of laughter and good cheer. The performers will include the Kendal Singers; the

#### **Best in Show!**

When the CARF Survey team exited from their visit to Kendal on November 7-9, we knew their report was only preliminary, needing to be confirmed by CARF International.

Just the same, as they reviewed each of the 19 major areas with the words "No Recommendations," it told the welcome story that Kendal's preparations this past year resulted in conformance to all 1,942 standards. We received a number of optional sugges-

tions, which are offered to enhance the standards.

How does that stack up to previous years? Pretty darned good! In 2007 we also had no recommendations, but in 2012 we had one recommendation that dealt with the need to track visitors coming into Heiser in the event of an evacuation.

In 2017 we had three areas to improve, including documenting emergency drills and annual staff competencies.

The most valued part of the exit report was listening to comments made by each of the experienced surveyors, including that Kendal at Oberlin is the place where they would like to live (or work). This is high praise not often shared by surveyors.

The CARF surveyors in November were very impressed with how thoroughly residents are involved in making decisions and providing activities for our community, so much so that they all said they would love to live here.

I wish they could have seen the sea of raised hands at KORA's annual meeting when nearly all residents showed they are involved with committees, interest and support groups, and programming. Kendal residents are talented, engaged, and amazing!

At the annual meeting, residents elected Rollin Conway as president, Prudy Hall as vice president, and three new council members (Janet Newman, Mary Van Nortwick, and Dina Schoonmaker). Other councilors and officers will continue for another year.

A huge thank you to outgoing Vice President Charlotte McGowan and Councilors Anne Lockwood and Mary Simons, all of whom have given good advice and worked hard for KORA, residents, and Kendal at Oberlin.

The 2023 budget of \$38,157, which includes \$3,523.25 from 2022 estimated unspent funds, was accepted. We thank residents for their generosity.

# Examining Racism in America to Forge a More Equitable Future A.G. Miller: Ancestral History and Enslavement Tues., Dec. 20 - 7:15pm - AUD and KOTV

A.G. Miller, Professor Emeritus of Religion, Oberlin College, will discuss his search for his ancestors and the history of their battle for freedom and dignity in the Civil War and Reconstruction Era. He will present some of his findings about his maternal great-grandfather, Charles Wheeler, a soldier in the 62nd United States Colored Troops, and how the Emancipation Proclamation provided an opportunity for enslaved people to achieve freedom through volunteering for the Union Army.

This event is part of the Kendal at Oberlin Racial Equity Forum, a new series of lectures, presentations, and workshops which aim to examine the role of race in U.S. society, culture, and government through both historical and contemporary lenses. The objective of this series is to develop an understanding of the systemic nature of racism with the goal of finding concrete ways to combat it and establish a more equitable society.

# Ruminations on the Life and Writings of Henry David Thoreau Wed., Dec. 7 - 7:15pm AUD and KOTV

Resident George Blomgren notes that although Henry David Thoreau died 160 years ago, his writings and the life that inspired them are still of great interest. Two books, based entirely on his journal writings, were published for the first time in 1993 and 2000. Some of the little-known facts that they reveal about his eccentric life had a profound effect on his literary output and are relevant to the current interest in his work.

# America's Threatened Forests and Restoring the American Chestnut Tues., Dec. 13 - 7:15pm AUD and KOTV

Almost one sixth of the tree species found in American forests is under severe threat due to climate change, invasive species, and infections such as Dutch Elm Disease and Emerald Ash Borer. Notably, the American chestnut is described as being functionally extinct.

The American chestnut population has been decimated by a fungus that produces oxalic acid. This toxin eventually kills the tree. Scientists have developed a blight-tolerant tree, the Darling 58 chestnut, which has an additional gene that encodes for an enzyme that neutralizes the acid, allowing it to survive the infection.

The Darling 58 illustrates how science can preserve and enhance plants, including agricultural commodities, that are threatened by climate change and disease. *Alan Lockwood, Chair*,

# Joyous Kwanzaa to Everyone!



American Maulana Karenga created Kwanzaa in 1966 as a celebration of family, community, and culture. The holiday begins on December 26 and ends on January 1. The name Kwanzaa derives from the Swahili phrase matunda ya kwanza, meaning "first fruits."

During the holiday, families and communities organize activities around the Nguzo Saba (The Seven Principles): Umoja (Unity), Kujichagulia (Self-Determination), Ujima (Collective Work and Responsibility), Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics), Nia (Purpose), Kuumba (Creativity), and Imani (Faith).

A Kwanzaa ceremony may include drumming and musical selections, libations, readings, discussions of principles and history, a candle-lighting ritual, and an artistic performance. On January 1, the seventh day, there is a feast of faith (Karamu Ya Imani).

"Joyous Kwanzaa" may be used as a general greeting during the holiday. The greeting for each day of Kwanzaa is Habari Gani?, Swahili for "How are you?"

# From the John Bartram Arboretum Bare Root Planting

I would like you to consider the hackberry at the west sit-and-chat area and the American yellowwood tree on the north side of the walkway between the apartment building and the marketing office.

They are among the new trees re-



cently planted in our arboretum as bare root trees. By comparison with balled and burlapped trees, those obtained bare root can be

larger. Look at the tall tree in the photo at top of the second column. Its roots have been trimmed back less, so it has a wider root system, which provides better anchorage once it is established.

The weight of the soil around balled and burlapped trees makes them very heavy and hard to move. Care must be





taken not to acquire ones with girdling roots, which go over and around one another.

Bare root stock can actually suffer less transport shock and enjoy a higher rate of survival.

They must be strapped, tightly



enough that
wind will not
blow them over,
but sufficiently
loosely that they
can move a bit
while growing.
Their roots
need to be
healthy, not

brittle from drying out or squishy or moldy from being too wet.

In the Trash Room put your <u>acceptable</u> glass, paper, cardboard, metal, and plastic into the proper bin. Posters on the wall show the appropriate bin.

Notice the two posters from Republic Services; one shows which things to ALWAYS recycle and the other shows which things are NEVER recycled.

The Most Important Rule: If in doubt, put it in the trash!

# Dining and Nutrition Services



Probably the greatest challenge facing the Dining Matters Committee is helping 345 individual residents

get the most out of their personal dining experiences. How does our dining service produce dishes that depend for their flavor on onions and garlic while avoiding those vegetables for residents who are allergic to them? Or who can't stand their taste? Then there is cilantro. Some of us are allergic to it while others love the taste. We all know the battle lines that form along the salt-no-salt divide and the crisp versus easy-to-chew vegetable debate.

The cooks can't please all of the people all of the time. The solution we are gravitating toward is building in menu flexibility. To make your personal way through this tangle, you must study the menu listing all the contents and ingredients. You can find it on the website as well as in the notebook across from the mailboxes and on the telephone at 440-775-9868.

Remember that plain (unseasoned, unsauced) vegetables are always available. In fact, sauces can always be left off an entree. Lisa Wilken assures us that barbeque sauce is always available if you do not care for the sauce being offered. As for cilantro, any Mexicansounding dish or dish with "salsa" in the title will use cilantro in the preparation. It must be cooked into the dish.

When considering your choices, turn the menu over and study the Always Available choices. Chicken and fish fillets are listed. These can be added to a salad or chosen as the entree. You can choose a hamburger or veggie

burger served on a bun or add barbeque sauce to the patty as an entree. We always have chicken, tuna, seafood, or egg salad available. Any of these can be added to a tossed salad or served in a wrap or on bread or a bun. Interesting flatbread selections are available a week at a time in the Langston at lunch, but you can always substitute any other combination of toppings to make a personalized pizza of your choice. And personal pizzas that can be modified are also available on the Always Available dinner menu. You can think about creating a meat entrée from the vegetarian stir-fry over rice on the Always Available menu by adding a chicken breast or fish fillet to your order and cutting up the meat or fish and adding it to the stir-fry. You can also add soy sauce if salt is not a problem for you.

Look carefully at the ingredients list for each menu item; it will tell you important information as well as warn you of ingredients you want to avoid. At the very least, you can always Google the name of a dish to learn about it. If you live in the Stephens Care Center and must make your menu choices a few days ahead, SCC Dining Services Manager Katie Barman can possibly advise you before you make your choices.

The dining staff is striving to give us the maximum number of options possible at any given meal. Be creative. Build a meal around a soup you like and an invented salad. Look around and notice what meals other residents have created. You are in the driver's seat.
