Genetic Engineering. Tues., Jan. 16, 23, and 30, 10:30am–12:00pm. Yolanda Cruz, Professor Emerita of Biology at Oberlin College, presents a three-part course. The products of genetic engineering abound in many aspects of modern lives. How do we assess the benefits of this technology?

Session 1: Genetically Engineered (GM) Products GM products are today a part of our daily lives. What GM products are we likely to encounter?

Session 2: Why It's Called "Genetic Engineering" What does "genetically engineering" an organism actually mean? How is it done?

Session 3: Pros and Cons of Genetic Engineering The uses and abuses of GM technology. What have we learned?

Oberlin College Theater: *Pipeline* Fri., Dec. 8 - 7:30pm - Wurtzel Theatre

Professor Caroline Jackson-Smith, OC Professor of Theatre and Africana Studies, directs this production of Dominique Morisseau's play. Omari, a Black student at a predominantly white prep school, is provoked into an altercation with his teacher. His single mother, Nya, teaches at the district public school and her fears for her son push her to the edge. As mother and son grapple with their relationship, larger cultural and societal issues emerge.

Play Readers: *Silent Sky* by Lauren Gunders Fri., Dec. 8 - 1:30pm; Sat., Dec. 9 - 7:15 pm - AUD, KOTV

Silent Sky dramatizes the story of Henrietta Leavitt, an early 20th-century astronomer whose discoveries changed our understanding of the cosmos – in the face of opposition from the patriarchal astronomical institutions of her time. Henrietta had significant hearing loss; the silent sky she viewed at the Harvard College Observatory revealed to her, through meticulous observations, how to measure the distance to distant stars. Her work revealed that billions of galaxies exist beyond the Milky Way and that the universe is expanding.

Phyllis Gorfain directs Betsy Allen, Carol Conti-Entin, Catharina Caldwell, David Bell, and Jean Slonneger in a beautiful play honoring Henrietta's journey.

Allen Memorial Art Museum director Andrea Derstine will treat Kendal residents to a special tour the week after the Play Readers *Silent Sky* (see above).

Artist Anna Von Mertens celebrates the achievements of the early 20th-century astronomer, Henrietta Leavitt, whose pioneering work changed our understanding of the cosmos. The museum exhibit collects all of Von Merten's rigorous, beautiful, and graphic drawings as well as hand-stitched quilted textiles that respond to the rigorous observations of Henrietta Leavitt. Examining Racism in America to Forge a More Equitable Future

Joyce Assis, an Oberlin resident and a native Brazilian with African roots, will present a two-part program on the samba, a lively dance of Afro-Brazilian origin. On Monday, she will talk about

the history and culture of the samba, including its origins in Africa and connections to the period of enslavement in Brazil. On Tuesday, Joyce will conduct a workshop in which she will perform the samba and invite residents to participate and learn this beautiful dance.

Dark Sky Lighting at Kendal Mon., Dec. 4 - 7:15pm AUD, KOTV

Terry McGowan will share Kendal's efforts to be certified as the world's first "Dark Sky Retirement Community" by DarkSky International. Kendal's outdoor lighting test installations demonstrate the objective of walking or driving safely at night while also valuing views of the stars and the night environment needed by plants and animals, including people.

Hal Sundt teaches creative writing at Oberlin College when he's not in New York writing books or articles for such periodicals as The New York Times Magazine, The American Scholar, and The Ringer. Hal will share his experiences and illustrate the variety of forms that literary journalism can take. Hal teaches that real life doesn't fit an ideal narrative and access to sources is often limited. How do writers work around these challenges to craft engaging and informative stories?





Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Transition Team Update

By the time you read this update, the Transition Team will have conducted Zoom interviews with five strong CEO candidates. Each candidate brought a unique set of qualifications honed from different personal backgrounds and work experiences in the senior living and services sector. Each interview gave us an opportunity to consider in what direction Kendal at Oberlin might grow under the leadership of each of these candidates.

Along with gauging business skills, we relied heavily on our own Strategic Plan and Quaker values to frame key questions that we introduced as "a variety of things that are of great importance to the Kendal at Oberlin community." Specifically, we engaged in direct conversations around Goal 3: Strengthening KaO as an employer of choice; Goal 4: Commitment to DEIB; Goal 5: Uses of technology to improve operations and resident experiences; Goal 6: Strengthening and growing conservation and sustainability; and Goal 7: Promoting meaningful growth. We heard about each candidate's involvement and their commitment to the foundational values, either professionally or personally, and most shared that they are anxious to hear more about KaO's progress in each of these areas. One candidate went so far as to "applaud our callout for sustainability in our strategic plan."

Our next step in the search process is on-campus in-person interviews of the four finalist candidates. Invitations have been sent for the week of December 4. Interview teams include KORA Councilors, who listened to residents at a special KORA meeting to help format their questions, Staff, KaO and KNO Board members, Transition Team members, and Barbara Thomas – potentially 48 individuals total, including 21 residents. Something to note: while each interview group will offer their feedback and that information will be invaluable to the Transition Team's recommendation of a final candidate, the decision of who to hire ultimately falls to the KaO Board of Directors.

The Transition Team thanks everyone for their support and encouragement throughout this process. Collectively we are sure that we will identify the right best candidate to lead Kendal at Oberlin. R. Peter "Pete" and Prudence "Prue" Richards

Pete:

I was born in early 1943 in Lorain; my parents were recent Oberlin College graduates. Dad barely had time to greet me before leaving for WWII Navy duty in the Pacific; my mother and I lived my first couple of years in Oberlin.

After the war, we moved to Columbus, then to New Jersey when I was seven. I graduated from high school there in 1961, came to Oberlin for college, then did graduate work at the University of Chicago, earning a MS in mineralogy/crystallography and a PhD in paleocology. I taught at Oberlin for seven years, did a postdoctoral year at the University of Michigan, and morphed into a limnologist.

I worked in the National Center for Water Quality Research at Heidelberg University for 35 years quantifying pollution chemistry of Ohio rivers and Lake Erie (commuting from Oberlin).

Prue and I have a blended family of five "boys" who span five years in age; two from my first marriage and three from hers.

Some of my interests are collecting and studying mineral crystals and mushrooms, gardening, fishing, and generally being outside in the natural world. I've done quite a bit of woodworking, from furniture repair and manufacture to building an A-frame cabin with no power tools. Music, and especially singing, have always been part of my life. I studied music theory as an Oberlin student. I was fortunate

to be part of the Oberlin College Choir that toured the Soviet Union in 1964.

Prue and I sing in the First Church Choir and Musical Union, and, although we lived across the street from each other at the time, a big part of getting to know each other was singing in the Oberlin Community Chamber Singers.

Kendal is a big change. We look forward to it!

Prue:

My parents moved to Oberlin in 1947 to teach in the English Department at the College, and I was their "first Oberlin project." I attended the brandnew First Church nursery school, then the Oberlin public schools, and graduated from OHS in 1966. After two years at the College of Wooster, I returned to Oberlin College and got my BA and teaching degree, then went on to teach English at Oberlin High School while my three sons were growing up. Being a Mom was my first calling in life, and as a teacher in the system I knew all my kids' friends and what they were up to.

I spent summers as a child with my maternal grandmother while my parents taught summer school at OSU. She introduced me to sewing by having me make a blouse from cutting out the pattern to the finished garment, completely by hand—facings, zipper, and all! My paternal grandmother had a treadle sewing machine, which I learned to use later. From my clothes to children's clothes to Renaissance and Living History costumes and many quilts, textiles, and sewing have given me great joy my whole life. They led me to my second career as the collections assistant at the Oberlin Heritage Center via costuming for their Oberlin Wellington Rescue presentations.

Music has been the other constant in my life. Over the years I've played brass, woodwind, and stringed instruments in marching bands, concert bands, and orchestras, but singing is my greatest joy. Starting with singing in the shower, on to Junior Choir at First Church, then the adult choir, Oberlin Community Chamber Singers (where I met Pete), Black River Singers, Musical Union, and a couple of recitals, nothing (besides my husband, children, and grandchildren) makes me happier than singing.

A Look Back. The history of the growth of the library continues. Still not open in December 1993, the library committee appealed to residents to stop by the library if they had a spare hour now and then and take books out of boxes and process them according to the instructions found in the boxes. Residents were asked to help with the well-known library practice of stamping books with ownership information and inserting book pockets in each book. (*The Ad Hoc Newsletter*, December 9, 1993).

From these simple beginnings, the library has evolved in 30 years to house approximately 7,500 fiction and nonfiction books. In addition, a large collection of mass market paperbacks contains general fiction and thrillers, mysteries, and romance novels. A sizeable collection of DVDs is also available.

The remarkable feature of the library collection is that it has been built from donations from residents these past 30 years. The quality and variety of these donations can be observed in the monthly exhibits organized by Mary Clare Beck and Kari Inglis. ~Joan Long

Connecting in Community in 2023

Walk to End Alzheimer's: A successful Basket Raffle raised \$3,596 for the Alzheimer's Association, and our Walking Team of 32 residents and staff joined together to participate in the Lorain County Walk.

Our community also worked to raise money for **United Way** community collaboratives through fundraisers such as the Bake Sale and participation in the Spelling category of *A Night at the Bee.* In the April 2024 Bee, there will be opportunities to compete in the categories of History, STEM, Spelling, and Art (like the game "Pictionary"). Interested? It's not too early for residents to start practicing!



Kendal at Oberlin Racial Equity Forums: This year leaders and representatives of the larger community were invited here and shared their experiences on topics including our immigration system, racial equity in education, redlining, and racial disparities in health care. Shared meals and Continue the Conversa-

tion opportunities such as "Healing the Space Between Us" were powerful opportunities to learn, connect, and build relationships. Sparked from the Healing the Space conversation, in 2024 there will be monthly gatherings with Oberlin City's Equity Coordinator to learn and build relationships for connecting in the Oberlin community.

Examining Racism in America to Forge a More Equitable Future

Oberlin Community Services was grateful for the muscle KaO's staff horticulturists put into the Cooper Community Resource Center grounds on Oct. 5!

We helped their new lead gardener, Henry Yeager, to beautify the property by removing weeds, landscaping, removing dead plants and roots, and making new plantings. Kendal residents (right) came Oct. 17 to help plant new trees, shrubs, and grasses, all of which are both edible and native to Ohio.


On the other six nights WSCC will broadcast YouTube blessings as the menorah is lit.

From the John Bartram Arboretum Serviceberry (Amelanchier canadensis)

Serviceberry has four-season appeal with its spring flowers, summer fruits, fall foliage, and winter white zigzag twigs with light grey bark. They are most often understory trees, but particular varieties do very well in full sun, giving even sweeter and more abundant berries according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources. There are many cultivars.

Many birds, including cardinals, cedar waxwings, towhees, Baltimore orioles, and mockingbirds, eat serviceberries, as do squirrels, chipmunks, foxes, and deer.

You only need one tree to have ber-

ries. It grows well in moist areas with some cultivars becoming a rather dense bush if not pruned a lot. Then little birds like to build nests in it.

Most do not do well in polluted areas or high-salt areas. They grow 1–2 feet each year, reaching 15-30 feet in height. ~Anne Helm for the Arboretum Committee



Dining Matters

Sometimes it seems hard to believe that we are actually making progress in Dining Services, but this is a moment that we can all celebrate. Lisa Wilken has been officially named as Director of Hospitality Services. She brings energy and dedication to her job. Lisa is determined to resolve the issue of consistency slippage. If unfortunate variations have crept into a dish during the past several presentations, she discusses the issue with the chefs to understand and eliminate the differences. Lisa emphasizes that she depends on and pays attention to the comment cards that she receives from us.

What do you think of the extended Langston hours? I have heard positive comments. Several card games have moved into the Langston to capitalize on the availability of food and drink. Please remember that the Langston is open mornings and afternoons, and take advantage of the hot drinks, muffins, light fare, and desserts.

Coming soon, if not already here, servers are getting small-portion buttons on their tablets. When these are functional, your server can mark down that you wish a small portion of a dish. This does not mean a reduced price, but it does prevent you from either eating more than you wish or leaving food on the plate. Those who have advocated for this feature have assured us that they are willing to pay full price, but they don't like wasting food. It is not clear when this button will be activated. Just ask your server whether he or she has the small-portion button on the tablet yet.

Lisa promises that further changes are coming in Dining Services. We don't yet know what or when, but the staff is striving mightily to bring improvements.

Keep your eyes and ears open, and, if you have a chef candidate in your pocket, be sure to let Lisa know.
