Dan not only donated ten trees but helped plant them. You'll find two Gobbler saw-tooth oaks and a Douglas fir in the Woodland Garden at Buttonbush, each with an orange bow; two bald cypress trees in Buttonbush Pond; a Japanese black pine in back of Cottage #207 (visible from the road); two larches -- one planted on the eastern bank of Heiser Pond, the other between Island Pond and Wildflower Hill. Two dawn redwoods will be planted in the spring. It took two Dans (Buttler and Reiber), one Don (Reeves) and one Ed (Wardwell) to do the planting, and Ryan's crew to clear the debris. Preparing for Kendal's 20th Anniversary

On October 3, 1993, the first residents moved into Kendal, after six years of dreaming, planning, financing, recruiting and building Of the Founders who moved in during the first few months, 44 are still here, along with at least eight of the original staff.

Honoring all the Founders and longerserving staff will be a major focus for Kendal at Oberlin's 20th Anniversary this year. KORA has asked Donna Baznik and Bob Longsworth to head a 20th Anniversary Planning Committee, which includes several other residents and staff members. Already, the list of possible celebratory events exceeds our probable capacity or a still-to-bedetermined budget.

Dick Baznik, with support from his committee, is well along in compiling a 20-year history of Kendal at Oberlin, based in large measure on interviews with Founders and long-time staff. Publication is expected by early fall. Initial plans, still very sketchy, point toward a climax during the first week in October. We can all count on one or more festive occasions, complete with food, memories, toasts and mementos. With Donna B. co-leading the Committee, it could not be otherwise! We're also asking each of our KORA Committees, plus Interest, Service and Support groups to consider an anniversary or celebratory twist to ongoing (or special) activities during this year. Even without specific labeling, the current and upcoming display of Paul Arnold's work carries that flavor. A few people are dreaming up a 20th Anniversary logo. What new banner might be readied for carrying in community parades? What new landscape plantings on campus? Thinking beyond purely celebratory events, Bob L. is leading an exploration of a Colloquium or Symposium, perhaps in cooperation with Oberlin College, on an appropriate theme like the impact of Medicare reform on CCRCs, or some other aspect of changing mores

One important thing to notice about the R>A>F Shop itself is that for a long time the hours have been from 8:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. daily. We have decided that starting February 1 we will change the closing hour to 7:00 p.m. Volunteers do the closing, just like volunteers do all the things needed for the R>A>F enterprise. Since so many evening programs start at 7:15, it has been challenging for folks to enjoy the program and also lock up the shop on time. So you will have 77 hours each week to shop instead of 88 hours. We hope you will find sufficient access to do your wonderful shopping there. Perhaps this is also an opportunity to notice another basic feature, namely how we work on an honor system. With new folks moving into Kendal this spring, perhaps a reminder is useful so all can know how this amazing place works. Shoppers are welcome to come in, browse, dream, assess, enjoy the shop in #155 and #280 (upstairs). Before leaving with your items, don't forget to pay for them: Use the cash box on the kitchen counter in #155 and the box on a table in #280. For many years this system has worked well and the R>A>F has grown. Theater: Lucia Mad Sat., Feb. 9 - 2:00pm - Hall

In Don Nigro's play, James Joyce's beloved daughter Lucia traces the imagined course of her doomed love for Samuel Beckett, her father's young disciple, while investigating the relationship between love, madness and the act of artistic creation. Kendal Board News for January 2013

The Kendal at Oberlin Board welcomed new members Mary Haber and Mary McKee to their first Board meeting in addition to resident representative Don Reeves, KORA's new president.

Mary Haber is a human resources manager who works at AgriNomix, located adjacent to Kendal in the Industrial Parkway. Mary has served on the Board's Human Resources Committee for the last ten years.

Mary McKee is an attorney based in Hickman & Lowder's Lorain County office She focuses her practice on Social Security Disability law and the preservation of government benefits through special needs trusts.

- The Board approved bylaws language regarding a clarification on the authorities of Kendal Northern Ohio as the "sole member." This is basically considered clean-up language and does not change the original intent.
- The Master Plan was accepted in principle, realizing its preliminary cost estimates ranging from \$20-30 million will be fine-tuned over the next two months.
- The architectural firm RLPS was approved to complete Schematic/Design Development and Construction Documents related to the Kendal Classic Cottages. Much is to be com-

pleted before construction could start in June.

- Initial steps are now underway to consider refinancing existing debt and the potential for new debt to support the ten-year Master Plan.
- The Board was updated on Kendal Marketing's accomplishments, bringing excitement for 2013 with 10 new cottage contracts sent out and 39 new priority applications approved during 2012. A new brochure is almost complete and new referrals are emerging through our websites.
- Board members volunteered for assignment at all the 2013 KORA meetings.
