One of the most important strengths of our community is that KORA has a strong voice at the KaO Board table. Currently the KORA President and three additional KORA members serve on the board, among them Barb Benjamin, the board's secretary. Still other residents serve on a variety of board committees. This new year promises to present us with exciting opportunities and adventures, including the celebration of our 30th anniversary.

Significant Moments in Western Medicine. Tues., Feb. 7, 14, 21, 10:30am-12:00pm. Kendal residents Rich Hall, Professor Emeritus of Philosophy, Michigan State University, and Prudy Hall, Professor Emerita of Chemistry and Biology, Hiram College, present a three-session course. **Heiser Auditorium only**.

Session 1: Ancient Greek Medicine: Exit the Gods, Enter Hippocrates. In ancient Greece, starting abruptly in the 400s, medicine became "scientific," and that shift is universally ascribed to Hippocrates. Before him, the gods were believed to be responsible. Writings in the "Hippocratic Collection" eschew appeals to divine causation and in some cases explicitly criticize such appeals. Many of these writings cite an imbalance of bodily "humors" as the cause of illness, and the four-humor version of that theory came to dominate medical thought until the 1800s.

Session 2: From Humors to Germs: 1650-1900. What led medical practitioners to discard the four humors and the associated miasma theory as explanations for illness and to accept germs as the causative agents? We will examine some of the key observations and experiments responsible for this paradigm shift, including works of Leeuwenhoek, Pasteur, Lister, and Koch, as well as the technology that made the theoretical work possible.

Session 3: Medicine in 2123. We will ask the class to extrapolate from the present to discuss: What will the health field look like to our great-great-grandchildren? Will there be major changes in what they think of as the causes of illnesses? In diagnosis? In treatments? In preventative medicine? In payment? In other health practices?

Lamas, Khan, and Emperors: The Politics of Tibetan Buddhist Art in Imperial China. Mon., March 6, 13, and 27, 10:30am-12:00pm. Heiser Auditorium only. Kevin Greenwood, Curator of Asian Art at Allen Memorial Art Museum, presents three lectures. The relationship between China and Tibet, although perceived by contemporary Westerners as defined by conflict, has a long, complex, and interconnected history. This series will highlight the connections as exemplified in great masterworks of Tibetan Buddhist art and architecture from the 13th to the 18th centuries. These works were made for, and sometimes by, the most important religious and political figures in China, Tibet, and Mongolia. Often displaying a synthesis of Chinese, Tibetan, and Mongolian artistic styles, and with subtle political meanings, these works of religious art range from the awe-inspiring to the sublimely beautiful.

STOP, LOOK, AND LISTEN Wed., Feb. 8 - 10:30am OR 3:15pm Education Center Training Room

STOP, LOOK, AND LISTEN helps residents be comfortable and effective when communicating with fellow residents, family, and friends who live with cognitive changes.

In September 2022, Kendal residents presented this program at the Dementia Action Alliance Conference in Indianapolis. Conference attendees praised the program for being designed by residents and presented to both residents and staff in our continuing care retirement community.

The presentation begins with a video by a person with Alzheimer's who talks about the importance of maintaining friendships. Then we discuss tips on initiating a conversation and the adjustments you may need to consider when conversing with somebody with cognitive changes. A short activity helps demonstrate the art of listening.

The goal of the program is to provide an atmosphere at Kendal where people with cognitive changes can maintain their friendships and stay active within the community, while adapting to the changes.

Adolescent Mental Health: A Generation in Crisis Thurs., Feb. 23 - 7:15pm - AUD and KOTV

Dr. Nancy Darling, professor of psychology at Oberlin College, will discuss some of the causes and consequences of the mental health problems many adolescents are currently experiencing. Dr. Darling's research focuses on adolescents, and she is the editor of the *Journal of Adolescence*. If you are interested in a sample of her thinking, her blog for *Psychology Today* is "Thinking About Kids."

Adolescence is marked by major cognitive, physical, and social changes. Adolescents transition from life within the family to life focused on peers and the search for autonomy. The pandemic undermined many of the structures that traditionally support teens in that transition. The result accelerated a rapid decline in the mental health of children, adolescents, and the adults who love them. What do kids need to thrive? How can we help?


Attend a Forum and Help OHC Make History!

An only child, I was born in 1946 in Oberlin, when my father taught English at Oberlin College. We moved to the Detroit area when I was two and lived at times in a working-class neighborhood, by a cottage-lined lake, and in faculty housing on Wayne State's innercity campus. I earned a BA in humanities (anthropology, English, and history) from Michigan State. Thanks to an elective in data processing, I could make my living as a programmer/systems analyst for the Department of the Navy, but my heart was elsewhere.

I was an active Episcopalian and took time out to earn a master's degree in Theological Studies at an Episcopal

Seminary. When I began having serious health problems, I took another leave for a time of retreat at Pendle Hill Quaker Study Center. I investigated ceramic sculpture and discovered my community-building and listening gifts. Unwilling to return to government service, I joined the administrative staff doing system design for a couple of years.

I was next drawn to a certificate program in the work of Matthew Fox at Holy Names College in Oakland, CA. It also fulfilled a longtime dream of living on the West Coast.

If I had done the program before I met Quakers, the year would have gone better, but it provided a bridge to an excellent ceramics studio and housemates who became very dear friends. My health problems became disabling, and I retired from computer work.

My mother's dementia drew me back to Michigan. She did not live with me, but managing her care and restoring her house took pretty much full time for a number of years. I also became deeply involved with the Red Cedar Friends Meeting community, serving as librarian, archivist, and elder.

At the **Botanical Garden**, stroll through glasshouses replicating the environments of Costa Rica and Madagascar and experience the *Orchids Forever* exhibit.

At the **Museum of Art**, see *The Tudors: Art of Elizabethan England*, which includes works from the Metropolitan Museum of Art and international lenders. The works depict a turbulent time in history and "how the English Renaissance was the work of wily leaders and enterprising foreigners" (*NYTimes*).

Both venues have cafés. A shuttle will be provided after lunch if you want to see both, or you can walk the short distance.

Health Services Forum Schedule

From the John Bartram Arboretum Black Walnut (*Juglans nigra*)

The black walnut is a deciduous tree with dark brown bark and wood. It is one of the most valuable trees in Indiana's forests, according to Purdue University Extension. The tree can reach 100 feet tall and 100 years of age (*Williams, 1990*). It has a deep taproot, so it cannot be moved easily. Its leaves are compound, with 15 to 25 leaflets. It tolerates a wide variety of soils. It likes partial sun.

The black walnut grows in eastern American forests in hardiness zones 4-9 from Massachusetts to Florida, Minnesota to Texas, and across southern Ontario. It is usually found in mixed forests, with sugar maples, yellow poplar, white oak, and northern red oak, according to the USDA.

The dark hardwood of the black walnut makes fine furniture prized for its beautiful grain. You can see some here in podiums in Heiser Auditorium, crafted by our own residents. Native Americans used its bark in tea as a remedy for toothaches, headaches, and snakebites (*Moerman, 1998*). Many mammals and birds like the nuts.

Some plants and animals are turned off by its juglone, a natural chemical which inhibits growth of plants in soil surrounding it. I remember how on our property on Lincoln Street in Oberlin our red raspberry canes spread further and further south as the neighbor's little black walnut grew larger and larger. Away from the tree, the raspberries managed to find soil without juglone.

We have recently returned to different menus for lunch and dinner. The staffing shortage in the kitchen

caused the identical menus for several weeks. But the identical menus were unpopular, so – blessings on the staff – Scott Stonestreet is responding by returning to different menus.

If shedding extra pounds is among your New Year's resolutions, however, you might consider taking advantage of the opportunity to eat a larger meal at noon. Research shows that eating a light meal in the evening helps with losing weight. You burn off the calories from a large meal at noon with afternoon activities and sleep after eating fewer calories at dinner. So you might consider eating more at noon.

Whether you eat a larger meal at noon or in the evening, don't forget the Always Available list on the reverse side of the printed menu. When tomato soup is one of the soup choices, you can add a grilled cheese sandwich to make a light meal. Add a protein to a salad or an order of stir-fried veggies. Macaroni and cheese is soon going to

appear on the Always Available menu. It is easy to create a sandwich to enjoy with a side dish or two from the front side of the menu. In short, a study of the Always Available menu can quickly remind you of many possibilities for constructing a light meal for either lunch or dinner.

We will close with one further note about pizza. One of the options on the Always Available menu is a personal pizza. This is no longer a small round pizza that you can add toppings to. It is now what we have come to call a flatbread, which is larger and has more sauce. Even though they take more preparation time and effort, the culinary staff has made this shift because the flatbreads are more popular and cook faster, so they can be delivered more quickly.
