## **KNOW YOUR KORA COUNCIL**

**Kendal Value:** *To employ financial designs that contribute to security and serve our social objectives, to make our services and communities affordable to the extent possible, to a range of economic capabilities.*

What an exciting KORA Council meeting we had in May – thanks to all who made it enjoyable and meaningful. It was especially delightful to have so many newcomers present. KORA is *our* resident association and all residents are members! Council meetings are an opportunity to learn what is happening, find out about issues before Council, and offer support to the work being done in our community. Together we make a difference.

Council approved on behalf of the entire association a contribution of \$25,000 to the Kendal at Oberlin 25th Anniversary Residents Assistance Fund Initiative. As good stewards with a concern for our fellow residents, Council agreed this was a fitting and beneficial gift to honor residents and celebrate our anniversary.

A highlight of the meeting was learning about improvements prioritized for the AV/Media system in the Heiser Auditorium. Dennis Cook explained the upgrades that are planned. The report prepared by Dennis and Rey Carrion and posted on the KORA Bulletin Board was received with appreciation. Those present expressed gratitude for the work done by Facility Services, Dennis, and the AV Media ad hoc Working Group. Since the meeting, we have learned there are sufficient funds for Phase One (2018) and Phase Two (2019) of the project. Both will be undertaken this summer, causing the auditorium to be unavailable August 17 to September 15. We'll appreciate your patience.

At Council meeting the status of the request from the House Committee regarding the Langston Gathering Area was explained. Council will sea-

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## Nonpoint Source Pollution, Lake Erie, and You! Tues., June 19 - 4:15pm- AUD

Sarah Orlando, extension educator with Ohio Sea Grant, based in the Ohio Dept. of Natural Resources' Office of Coastal Management in Sandusky, is program manager for the Ohio Clean Marinas and Clean Boaters programs – voluntary, incentive-based programs to help maintain and improve Lake Erie water quality while preserving the economic activity and viability of the marine trades industry. She will discuss some of the issues with nonpoint source pollution on our waterways, including information on harmful algal blooms. Lake Erie's use as a source of recreation, drinking water, and tourism is at risk with increased nutrient loading from tributaries and other sources of runoff. ## **25** Anniversary Initiative for the Residents Assistance Fund

### **Remembering a Loved One**

The first response to the 25th Anniversary Initiative for the Residents Assistance Fund was Gretchen Roose's gift in memory of her husband, Ken. The Rooses were Founders, and Gretchen remembers attending one of the very early planning meetings. A presentation on the concept for creating a Kendal at Oberlin and the plan for funding it was followed by silence. It was Ken, then an Oberlin professor of economics, who broke the silence, saying, "It sounds good to me." Others followed suit, as Gretchen recalls. Ken enthusiastically endorsed the establishment of a Residents Assistance Fund from Kendal's inception, and the Rooses supported it faithfully, year after year.

When Gretchen asked me over two years ago what the Philanthropy Committee was doing, we had just begun to realize that our upcoming 25th anniversary celebration was a fine opportunity to address the need for boosting the Residents Assistance Fund. I described the plan, and Gretchen made the first gift – on the first anniversary of Ken's death. We talked about the impact Ken had made from Washington, DC, to here – from serving on the President's Council of Economic Advisors in the 1950s to constructing clay tennis courts at Kendal.

Bill Rice is another of the Kendal residents who have made memorial gifts to the 25th Anniversary Initiative for the RAF, in remembrance of his wife Mary Jean, who died in 2017. "It was an easy decision," Bill said, expressing gratitude for the wonderful care Mary Jean received during her long stay in the Stephens Care Center, and for the freedom he had to bring her to dinner in the Fox and Fell each evening.

Bill spent his entire career as an

engineer in glass and ceramics at General Electric, and until their two sons were born, Mary Jean was secretary to the CEO of what is now Key Bank.

Later she played many roles as a community volunteer. It may not surprise you that Bill served on Kendal's Board of Trustees for nine years and also for a term as KORA treasurer, but as young as he looks, can you believe that he is also a WWII veteran?

The option of making a gift in memory of a loved one or ones — or in honor of a living person — is available not only for gifts to the Residents Assistance Fund, but for any gift to Kendal at Oberlin.

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## **25** 6th KORA President: Leonard Singer, 2003

Len and his wife Lenore moved to Kendal August 21, 1998. Lenore died in October 1999 and Len was part of our community until he passed in 2015. Len grew up and went to school in Pennsylvania. He earned a degree in Chemical Engineering from Penn State. In 1943 he was drafted and classified as an Army Medic to work as a lab technician on a hospital ship. After the war, he earned a PhD in Physical Chemistry from the University of Chicago. Then there were stops in Ithaca, NY, and Washington, DC, on the way to his 30-year career as a research chemist with Union Carbide in Parma, OH. Len was a musician, both jazz and classical. He and Lenore had two daughters.

Len was KORA President in 2003. He is remembered as extremely intelligent, a kind and sweet person, and a good listener. One resident remembers Len saying his year as president was a little chaotic for him. Not only was he President of KORA, but he later married Meg Gold who was serving as Vice President at the time. In the July 2003 *Kendalight* Len reported on his term: "...so far it has been busy and interesting, and at times a bit exciting. We've considered a range of issues including dandelions, the News and Views Bulletin Board, our committee system, life in the Care Center, and what's new on the Administration scene. The main thing we're learning is how new residents feel about things here at Kendal, that almost *utopian* community where we care about and enjoy one another."

## From The John Bartram Arboretum: Redbud Tree

Spring finally arrived, bringing much joy with colorful, delicate blossoms of small trees and shrubs. One of these, the redbud, is known for the visual interest it brings to every season.

The redbud's purple-pink flowers emerged in May in Oberlin, prior to the emergence of its heart-shaped leaves. As its leaves begin to show, those tiny leaf buds first emerge a reddish color, soon turning dark green, and then yellow in the fall. The structure of this small tree is of irregular branching patterns, making for beauty in the landscape even when it has no flowers and no leaves. It can be especially beautiful covered with snow.

The redbud, according to Arbor Day Foundation, "grows in acidic, alkaline, loamy, moist, rich, sandy, well-drained and clay soils." Just don't put it in soaking wet or totally dry ground. It is very useful to wildlife: early butterflies seek the nectar of the blossoms; bobwhite and chickadees eat the seeds. Its branching pattern makes for choice nesting sites for small birds. Native Americans showed Europeans that the redbud flowers are delicious to eat. And George Washington wrote in his diary about the beauty of the redbud tree and how he transplanted seedlings from nearby forests to his Mt. Vernon property.

Here in the John Bartram Arboretum we have a number of the native Fabaceae *Cercis canadensis* (Eastern Redbud) and additionally several particular cultivars, the "Forest Pansy" by the employee entrance and the weeping redbud "Lavender Twist" directly north of our main entrance to Heiser by Center Pond. (This particular tree was planted with its wire container left around its roots. Caged roots – not a good thing. See more about that at our Arboretum display table.)

Enjoy those elegant little redbud trees which bring beauty to our landscape throughout the year.

## Nest Box News

The nesting season is well underway. Monitors checking the nest boxes report that there is one active Eastern Bluebird nest and five active American Tree Swallow nests.

The nest box by Meadow Pond has been claimed by Eastern Bluebirds. It contains four beautiful blue eggs. It is still early in the nesting season, and many terrible things can happen before the eggs hatch and the chicks are reared (a process that takes about 3 to 4 weeks). Yet your chances of glimpsing their brilliant blue color and hearing their soft melodic song on the Kendal campus this summer are looking up.

American Tree Swallows with their bright white fronts and iridescent dark backs are swooping low over ponds and lawns in search of insects both at Kendal and in New Russia Township Park. The tree swallows have claimed five of Kendal's nest boxes with their feathers and grasses, and these have a total of thirteen eggs – so far.
