Fun Fitness Week Begins on June 7

For the 16th year, Kendal staff and residents will have a week of fitness and fun activities, this year set up in accordance with Ohio Dept. of Health guidelines. There will be 20 different activities from Mon., June 7, through Fri., June 11. Line Dancing with Dan Reiber in front of the Heiser entrance is a new activity. Another will be identifying musical tunes played by

more than 12 residents on various instruments. Back from the past but modified for safety will be Croquet (outside), Dog Play Time, and KELC Bikers' Relay.

Traditional activities will include Walking, Swimming, Biking, Observation Walks, Radio-Controlled Sailing, Miniature Golf, CommUnity Walk, Shot Put, Wii Fun (limited number at one time), Tennis Court Fun, Robot Table Tennis (limited number), and Baggo.

After much study, the Joint Technology Committee is starting to implement a new website and database for residents and staff to use. June 6 - Now, Voyager (1942) A frumpy spinster (Bette Davis) blossoms under therapy into an elegant, independent woman who falls in love with an unhappily married architect (Paul Henreid).

June 13 - Flight From Ashiya (1964) In the early 1960s, a flight crew's mission is to rescue a life raft of Japanese civilians stranded in rough seas.

June 20 - Cheaper by the Dozen (2003) With his wife doing a book tour, a father of 12 (Steve Martin) must handle a new job and his unstable brood.

June 27 - The Pumpkin Eater (1964) A mother of eight (Anne Bancroft), married to a philandering third husband (Peter Finch) is in a fragile mental state.



The biennial **Kendal Creates** show opened May 18 in the **Kendal** and **Community Galleries**. Though it was a bit of a challenge to display more than 80 items in just two galleries, we were delighted to get entries from more than 50 residents!

The exhibition of work created by Kendal residents includes models, sculpture, wood turning, ceramics, and knitted and quilted pieces as well as paintings, watercolors, photographs, and more.

Because of restricted entry into the **Friends Gallery**, this year's Kendal Creates Show will not extend into the Stephens Care Center's exhibit space.

June 8 - The Watermelon Woman (1996) A young black lesbian filmmaker probes into the life of The Watermelon Woman, a 1930s black actress who played "mammy" stereotypes. 💝

June 15 - Cowboys (2021) A troubled but well-intentioned father who has recently separated from his wife runs off with his trans son into the Montana wilderness. 💝

June 22 - The Kids Are All Right (2009) Two children conceived by artificial insemination bring their biological father into their non-traditional family life. 💙

June 29 - A Single Man (2009) An English professor, one year after the sudden death of his boyfriend, is unable to cope with his typical days in 1960s Los Angeles. 💝 Instead the current show of photographs and art by Kendal residents will be succeeded by an exhibit of Don Parker's watercolor landscapes previously shown in the Community Gallery.

The Art of Aircraft as Structural Design, a display of small airplane models that Joe Luciano has been making all of his life here at Kendal, will continue in the **Curio Cabinet** for the duration of the Kendal Creates Show. Be sure to take the time to look at the details of his craftsmanship.

After years of planning, work, and restoration, the **Founders Quilt**, created by a group of the founding residents of Kendal at Oberlin, has been installed in its permanent display space – the small alcove between the Heiser Lounge and the Penn Dining Room. Our gratitude and admiration

go to Anne Wardwell and Margaret-Ann Ellis, who spent hours cleaning the quilt, inch by inch, using professional textile conservation techniques to brighten each square. Thanks go to Anne and Ed Wardwell for storing it safely for a couple of years in their cottage. Additional thanks go to Doug Kirtz for designing the way in which the quilt could be safely displayed on the wall and building the backing board. Facility Services helped as well: Greg Wilgor crafted the support bar on which it rests and Quinn Barbee completed the installation by securing the top edge to the wall. Carl Whitehouse designed and built a white "garden fence" to keep electric scooters at a distance when they park there. Additional adjustments to lighting and ventilation will be done by resident Terry McGowan and KaO electrician Jon Hall.

Final thanks go to Grover Zinn, who coordinated the efforts of all the skilled craftspeople in the project.

More About Kendal's Residents



Janet E. Newman

My roots go deep into Canadian soil; my parents moved to the U.S. during the war and raised my two brothers and me mostly in Avon Lake, a small town on the south shore of Lake Erie, about 20 miles north of Oberlin!

I did my undergraduate work at Smith College, Northampton, MA, and studied in Spain in my junior year. In 1967, I graduated with a BA in Hispanic Studies.

I began my first profession as a computer programmer/analyst in Washington, DC.

My husband and I became active in the Unitarian Universalist faith, and after his death in a car accident in 1978, I began two years of full-time ministerial study at Wesley Theological Seminary in DC. I earned the MA from the Divinity School of the University of Chicago in 1982 and the Doctor of Ministry from Meadville/Lombard in 1983. I was ordained by the Unitarian Universalist Church of Arlington, VA, where my husband and I had married and become lay leaders, where I felt a call to ministry, and then where my husband was memorialized.

I served two congregations as a called minister and then decided to pursue the specialty of Interim Ministry. In that capacity I served congregations as far north as Ottawa, ON; as far south as Fort Myers, FL; as far east as the Boston area; and as far west as Denver.

Upon retirement in 2016, I returned to my "base camp," a modest condo in Winter Park, FL.

Soon I realized that I needed to provide for my future as I aged. I researched Continuing Care Retirement Communities and was drawn to the Quaker values in Kendal communities. A cottage became available much sooner than I expected—and now I'm delighted and grateful to be with you!

Kendal at Oberlin's Board of Directors met by Zoom. With most getting vaccinated, a hybrid meeting may be possible before year's end.

The Board officially accepted **Kendal's 2020 Audit**. The results will be part of the Annual Disclosure Statement sent to residents this summer.

The auditor's industry report focused on **cybersecurity**. Healthcare providers are a major target for cybercriminals. Kendal has been proactive with added security solutions.

Approval of **refinancing of 2013 bonds**, to be completed by early summer, should bring considerable savings over the next nine years.

Cleveland YWCA's 21-Day Challenge addressing Diversity, Equity & Inclusion was the topic of lively discussion. Offered since 2019, it presents a new set of readings, videos, and podcasts, allowing for all participants to choose according to their interests, knowledge, and time constraints.

The Board accepted **Mary Haber's** resignation for personal/health reasons. Her expertise in human resources has been greatly appreciated over her long nine-year tenure. ~*Barbara Thomas*

Spellebrate Trophy

Protecting Our Most Vulnerable

Are you thinking, "I'm vaccinated. I'm healthy. Why can't I go into stores and restaurants without worrying about a mask?" Here's why.

We live in a congregate setting - essentially a big "bubble" - that includes people within a wide range of health. So those of us who are least vulnerable must protect those who are more vulnerable, especially residents living in the Stephens Care Center (SCC).

After a long isolation, SCC residents are enjoying the Heiser Lounge, library, auditorium, and other public areas in our campus. According to current regulations, a single positive COVID-19 test would not only put residents at risk but also stop their visits outside the SCC and require testing for at least two weeks!

Thus, even after June 2, we will continue to wear masks in all Kendal public spaces and to exercise caution in the outside community (especially in stores and restaurants), to ensure the freedom and safety of our most vulnerable residents.

Yet the rules keep changing! The New Normal Committee has prepared a simplified guide to be released by June 2. Check this for the latest procedures and restrictions, all thoughtfully based on recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), State of Ohio, and Kendal at Oberlin.

Snapshots from Our Stephens Staff Education Fund

With generous contributions from residents, the Stephens Staff Education Fund helps finance continuing education for Kendal employees. *The Kendalight* will feature a few employees who have recently benefitted from the Fund.

Elisabeth Christman

Elisabeth Christman has been a sales and marketing representative at Kendal for two years. Last year, she was offered a chance to participate in Leadership Lorain County (LLC). The Staff Education Fund paid her tuition.

LLC is a county-wide program for leadership training. Its signature program is an annual ten-month class that explores segments of our community such as business, social justice, healthcare, law and government, education, and recreation. It develops personal and leadership skills, promot-



ing teamwork and networking. Participants work on service projects that focus on solving community problems or contributing to local infrastructure. The program features panel discussions, site visits, guest speakers, and hands-on learning through immersion in Lorain County.

Elisabeth became one of 42 participants in LLC's class of 2020, representing a wide variety of employers in Lorain County. Its goal was to get folks together to learn more about the county and stimulate networking and local knowledge.

Elisabeth grew up in nearby Port Clinton and graduated from John Carroll University in Cleveland. After working for a few years in California, she and her husband inherited her grandparents' home in Port Clinton, across the street from her parents' house. Her husband works in Cleveland.

"I realize now how much is outside Cleveland," she notes. "I'm more aware of resources in the health care community here. I see how compassionate people are in this community. Now I'm a network builder. I have a whole list of people I can call on."

Normally the LLC class meets once a month for a year, including an overnight retreat. Some of these meetings disappeared during the pandemic, but meetings continued online. "We spent a day at the Common Ground Center in Oberlin, where we used teamwork on the obstacle course. That was my favorite activity," says Elisabeth.

"This was good timing for me," she says, "to meet people and build a new community. It would take years to learn so much about this region without Leadership Lorain County. I know so much more now, and it helps when I talk with prospective residents of Kendal."

From The John Bartram Arboretum: The Little Leaf Linden (Tilia Cordata)

The little leaf linden is very adaptable to a variety of soils, from acidic to alkaline, sandy to clay. It likes to be moist, but well-drained, not just sit in water. Thus it should be watered when there is a drought, especially when young. One thing which is not good for it is road salt.

A little leaf linden grows at a medium rate, 1 to 2 feet a year, to a height of 50 feet, spreading to about 40 feet in diameter. It needs at least four hours of direct sunlight a day, but likes full sun.

The tree has a very attractive pyramidal shape (see photo) with medium green leaves that have a little chartreuse accent which remains with it long into the summer. The leaves turn a golden color and drop late. The dense canopy gives great shade. The little leaf linden is a tree whose leaves a resident here at the Kendal arboretum finds especially attractive with the dark of evergreens behind it.

The linden flowers are clusters of yellowish blossoms that hang down on long stalks and have a pleasant fragrance. They are attractive to wildlife such as hummingbirds and bees. Their bloom time is in June, later than many



The Rising of the Moon

Thursday, June 24, at 2:40pm will be the Full Strawberry Moon. The name comes from Algonquin tribes of Native Americans. Typically the last full moon of spring or the first of summer, this full moon was their sign to harvest wild strawberries.

trees. Fertilized flowers produce a nutlike fruit which animals like. When the tree is mature, its soft wood provides nesting hollows for birds such as woodpeckers.

This tree is considered low maintenance, though it should be carefully pruned for strong structure giving it a single leader and well-spaced lateral branches. The tree typically has a life span of a few hundred years.

It has a wide potential planting range in the United States which includes most all of the east, north, and central regions. Japanese beetles can skeletonize its foliage, so planting

Big Bus Trip to Blossom Music Center Cancelled



Nest Box News

Juneteenth Celebration Festival "African Americans: The Struggle, The Fight for Freedom, and Still Yet Invisible" Saturday, June 19 - 9:00am–6:00pm

This year, the Juneteenth Oberlin Executive Board will present a unique program: a drive-by festival with a parade and drive-through vendors. Covid protocols will be followed and masks required for everyone.

Plastic-shielded booths will be placed only on the tree lawn curb around Tappan Square. Festival goers can drive up and point to what they want; the vendors will get it for them.

Food trucks will be located on Professor Street, away from the parade. Safety protocols require that people stand 6 feet apart while in line ordering food.

Attendees must watch the parade from their cars. There will be no stage or live performances other than during the parade itself, when participating groups can stop for a one-minute performance at the end before disbanding.

The festival organizers will have volunteers moving the traffic and are not encouraging foot traffic.

The nest box season is picking up. The weather has warmed up and insects, which most young chicks need in order to grow and develop, are becoming more plentiful. Eastern Bluebirds have claimed three of Kendal's nest boxes. One box by Meadow Pond has five chicks that are developing well. Bluebirds in a nest box by Island Pond lost four chicks last month due to cold and lack of adequate food. Now they are busy building a new nest to start over. A third nest built in the box near parking lot 5 does not yet have eggs. Bluebirds have also shown a great deal of interest in the nest box in the Community Garden and the nest box behind Cottage 5 where the bright male often perches on the roof or inspects the interior. It seems no female has yet joined either, as no nesting material is in either box yet.

Tree Swallows are just starting a nest in the second box at Meadow Pond. Three of the four boxes on Wildflower Hill have a total of 16 tree swallow eggs, and the box by Island Pond has another 6, for a total of 22 tiny white eggs!

As on Audubon nest box trails, most of Kendal's nest boxes are paired. Eastern Bluebirds and Tree Swallows make good neighbors since they do not compete for the same food. Bluebirds drop from a perch to pick up insects in the lawns and grass or on trees and leaves. Tree swallows catch their food on the wing, flying with their beaks wide open to scoop up flying insects. They help to keep the mosquito population down. Watch for them as they soar low over the lawns around Kendal. *~Nina Love*

Dining Matters

We have started on our re-MORSEI turn to community dining, but we have a way to go before we are back to most prepandemic practices. We must wait for health department regulations and staffing constraints to permit further progress. We are now able to enjoy socializing and dining in the Fox and Fell; we can help reduce lines and waiting times by selecting lunch as our mealtime, reserving a table in the Langston for dinner during our assigned week, or opting to take meals home to enjoy at our leisure. We can make this step toward normality effective.

Eventually, we will be able to implement the Choice Meal Plan that will use dining dollars. Before the pandemic, a few residents asked for a more flexible dining plan than the one specified in our contracts. Those residents had specific dietary needs that were difficult to fulfill within our dining cycles. Consequently, the administration and the Dining Matters Committee have been discussing various plans and options, attempting to balance the needs of these residents with the stable finances needed to support community dining.

Since socialization and community are the most cherished aspects of dining, the tiered system was developed to give residents access to dining while allowing them to prepare some their own meals at home when the meal selection at Heiser was less than ideal for their needs.

Most residents will select the 30-meal tier that is most like contract dining – that number of dining dollars is easily sufficient to provide a typical meal a day. Depending on your preferences, you may find that ordering à la carte is more to your liking – it can reduce unnecessary food waste associated with senior community dining and might fund more mealtimes than you expect. You may even find you have unspent dining dollars at the end of the month. In that case, similar to practices before Covid, those unspent dining dollars will remain in the KaO budget to support the myriad services we enjoy at Kendal. We can support the Kendal we love both financially and socially.

Choices, flexibility, and socialization are the desired outcomes. New dining procedures, new menus, and new meal plans are future milestones in our journey to normalization.
