Decision-making is a core value behavior that is part of every Kendal at Oberlin employee's job description. It affects staff at every level of employment. Whether a driver working away from campus or a registered nurse working alone at night, our staff must feel empowered to solve problems or take appropriate action to address circumstances under their control.

Such decisions are to be made with Kendal at Oberlin's vision and Values.

Staff come to know by experience and confidence when a situation necessitates a course of action without delay. If a housekeeper's equipment suddenly tingles when she handles the cord, she knows to stop using the equipment and report it immediately for inspection.

More complex decision-making calls for evaluating decisions thoughtfully, collecting necessary data or facts, and


Our bylaws allow up to 20% of the board to be filled by residents. A resident's board service is for a three-year term, with the possibility of one additional three-year term. The board seeks candidates who are committed to helping Kendal at Oberlin stay strong and who have skills and experience that complement those of the current board. A background in many areas – such as finance, facilities planning, philanthropy, diversity/inclusion, and governance – and on other boards will be considered, as will familiarity with Quaker values which stress respect for the many valid opinions of others and consensus-based decision-making.

Nominations should be placed in the KORA open mailbox by June 30, so that names of nominees can be submitted by July 15. Nominations should only be submitted with the consent of the nominee. Each nomination should include a résumé and a brief statement of the nominee's interest in serving on the board.



The Juneteenth Oberlin Executive Board says, "This Juneteenth Celebration will feature a New Orleans Second Line parade. The Second Line will be led by Oberlin College graduate Kevin Lewis from New Orleans who specializes in Second Line music using the traditional Dirge. We will honor the spirits of Black People, when death was one of the ways our ancestors were free from slavery, Jim Crow laws, lynching, the Reconstruction Era, Black Codes, and segregation. The Second Line parade will be going down Morgan Street to the Westwood Cemetery – singing and dancing, celebrating our ancestors' release to freedom." Jack Secrist and Kathleen Secrist

Jack:

I was born and raised in Williamsville, NY, a small village near Buffalo where my parents grew up and spent their entire lives. I had one brother, five years my senior, who was my mentor in all things good and not so good. He was a doctor who greatly influenced my decision to follow a career in medicine. He died of cancer much too soon in his late forties.

After high school I went to Williams College and then returned home for medical school in Buffalo. Being sick of bad weather, my first wife and I moved west to Los Angeles, where I continued my medical training at UCLA. That was in the early 1970s during the Vietnam War, and I soon found myself in the Air Force at a small base in Oscoda, MI. By then we had two beautiful daughters and a marriage that was slowly failing. Next stop was at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN, for a three-year residency in Dermatology. There I met Kathleen, who became the love of my life. She also had two young daughters by a previous marriage. We soon married and moved to Elyria, OH, to begin a new life together with our four kids. I practiced Dermatology for the next 43 years, 26 in solo practice and 17 with the Cleveland Clinic. Kathleen was my office manager for 25 of those years.

It's amazing how fast time goes by. Our children grew up together, went to high school and college, got married, and started their careers.

We feel blessed to have had such a wonderful life and family. Our strong faith in God has been a great solace to us in coping with the few bumps in the road

With our kids on their way, we decided it was time for a change. We were fascinated by this nearby college town, Oberlin, and thought we should continue our life there. And so we did. We have really enjoyed the past ten years living here in town. We have been able to travel to Europe, Africa, Antarctica, China, and the western U.S. Some of these vacations were on bikes, which is a great way to travel.

In Oberlin we made new friends, enjoyed the benefits of living in a college town, and also learned about Kendal. This, we thought, is no doubt where we should be spending the rest of our lives. So, our new adventure at Kendal has begun. Carpe diem.

After working for the Appalachian Regional Commission in Kentucky, I relocated to Oberlin and joined the Oberlin Clinic. I retired in 2018.

My first stay in the U.S. was working in an AFSC field office as part of my alternative service as a conscientious objector to the German draft. At that occasion I met my wife, the reason I relocated to the U.S. after completion of my service.

In January, Kevin Roose, The New York Times podcaster, spoke about the challenge of adapting to technology in the changing world of automation. The skills to do so are outlined in his book Futureproof: 9 Rules for Humans in the Age of Automation.

Connect: Building Exceptional Relationships with Family, Friends, and Colleagues is the title of the book by David Bradford, Eugene O'Kelly II Senior Lecturer emeritus in Leadership at the Stanford Graduate School of Business, with Carole Robin. He was interviewed by his Oberlin classmate, Marjorie Porter in an April Zoom meeting.

The following evening, Daniel T. Rodgers, Henry Charles Lea Professor of History emeritus at Princeton spoke about his book Age of Fracture, which examines how the ideas that Americans had lived by became fragmented in the latter part of the last century.

From the John Bartram Arboretum The Interconnection Between Trees and Birds

Birds need trees and trees need birds. What can they do for each other?

Trees host insects in their bark and leaves. Particular insects can be harmful to a tree but a source of food for particular birds. The woodpecker may be drilling a deeper hole into the crack in the branch of a tree to get harmful insects from the tree and eventually form a deep enough hollow to shelter and nest there.

Trees provide shelter in all kinds of weather. Some trees have three or more branches coming together which create the perfect spot for the cupshaped nests made by goldfinches.

Chickadees like to nest in the natural hollow in a tree at the forest edge, often finding such a place in birch trees. Amazingly, they help with pest control. It is estimated that they consume 1,000 bugs a day while feeding their nestlings

and themselves. Bad bugs would soon overpopulate and kill many trees if birds weren't there to control them.

Bluejays bury the acorns of a white oak up to 2½ miles away to retrieve later when food is scarce. However, if not retrieved, the acorns may grow into new oak trees.

In the Midwest much of the land has been cleared for agricultural, residential, and commercial purposes. The John Bartram Arboretum is important in conservation of native species of fauna and flora, and the two can help each other.

Late spring and early summer is a wonderful time to take a walk, look around, and enjoy what you discover.

Nest Box News

Kendal's nest boxes are important to help sustain native bird populations that build nests and rear their young only in a cavity – never on a branch or bush or ivy-covered wall or on the ground. As the numbers of cavity-dependent bird species declined, Audubon groups put up nest boxes in habitats to support them.

Kendal's monitors check our 13 boxes and record the species, number of eggs, chicks, and chicks successfully fledged. As of mid-May, one nest box has fledged four Eastern Bluebird chicks. A second nest box near Meadow Pond had five beautiful blue Eastern Bluebird eggs due to hatch before the end of the month. But that nest and its contents were destroyed by English House Sparrows, an invasive nonnative species that is a primary cause of population decline in native species.

At season's end, Kendal's data is added to the approximately 50 Black

River Audubon Society's trail totals that are then incorporated into Cornell University's nationwide Breeding Bird Survey. Ultimately, it becomes a tiny, but important, part of breeding bird data collected around the nation and around the world by scientists who study trends in wildlife populations on our planet.

Dining and Nutrition Services



This month's Morsel is a summary of various dining details.

The Kendal cooks do not add salt to recipes or dishes they prepare. A few bases are salty when they arrive, but most are low-sodium and gluten-free. Adding salt, Mrs. Dash, soy sauce, or other condiments is left to each diner.

Onions and garlic are staples in many recipes. Unfortunately for those who are allergic to them, nothing can be done to modify these dishes. If you are ordering stir fry, you can request that they be left out. You can also ask that soy sauce not be used. This will reduce the salt content. Remember that the soy sauce is not low sodium, but is gluten-free.

Please note that Mrs. Dash has been added to the herbs and herb blends available behind the salad dressings.

Be sure to familiarize yourself with the condiment packets beside the microwave outside the William Penn. Here is where you will find soy sauce, duck sauce, hot sauce, mayonnaise, etc.

Please remember that mashed potatoes are now always available at the evening meal.

Almost always, plain versions of dishes are available upon request. The exceptions are dishes like stuffed peppers and spaghetti. But you should always be able to order plain vegetables and simple broiled fish, chicken, or pork. If your server seems unfamiliar with your request, ask for the manager and make your request clear to her.

Vegetarian sausage is now available at breakfast if you wish to order it.

If you are looking for vegetarian dishes, keep an eye on the menu. "VG" will be at the end of the line for every vegetarian dish listed. The word "Vegan" appears in every title of a vegan dish.

You should try requesting the doneness you prefer for your meat order. Sometimes the server has no way of indicating this information, but often the request can be made on the iPad. We all feel frustration when our meat comes out too rare or too well done.

The staff is adamant that you should send back any unsatisfactory portion so they can cook it further or try again. This seems a great waste, but it is no more of a loss than sending it back uneaten. Director of dining services Greg Zehe says that restaurants are accustomed to having dishes returned as unacceptable. This is what Kendal would prefer to have us do as well.

Finally, at the request of several residents, feta cheese has made an appearance on the salad bar. It will probably alternate weeks with blue cheese as a salad choice.
