Succession Planning Update May 2023

Ka C Transition The Transition Team continues to work through the process to identify our new

Chief Executive Officer, meeting several times in the month of May.

With the help of several sources - LeadingAge, Kendal Corporation, Team member and Board member referrals - we identified 12 well-established executive search firms from across the country that focus on recruiting CEOs for the senior living and services management sector. Many of these firms have worked exclusively in the senior market for 20+ years; at least two are owned by women; at least two are headquartered or have offices in Ohio; two firms have worked with Kendal affiliates in the past; all of the firms identify Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion as important factors in their search process.

The Request for Proposal (RFP) was distributed on April 26 with a return date no later than May 17. The very first bullet point under Services Requested is "Engage and connect with stakeholders throughout the process." We expect that the executive search firm will help us set up a way for you to share your thoughts and ideas about the skills and values we all expect in our new leader.

Other Transition Team meeting agenda items include reviewing the current CEO job description (skills), discussing how to identify a candidate's understanding of our Quaker values, and beginning to develop a plan to "Kendalize" our new leader. This is preliminary work and the executive search firm we hire will help us to finalize all of these.

We set aside a full meeting at the end of May to review the returned RFPs. If initial acknowledgments are any indication, we are expecting a good response. We will conduct virtual interviews with several firms and complete reference checks. Every Team member has been asked to develop at least two executive search firm interview questions. In mid-June, we plan to make a recommendation to the KaO Board to hire the best firm and move on to our next phase.

Kendal Celebrates Pride Month 2023

Gender and Sexual Identities in the 21st Century Thurs., June 22 - 4:00–5:15pm - AUD and KOTV

As if LGBTQ+ weren't confusing enough, the first quarter of the 21st Century has witnessed the proliferation of new terms describing gender and sexual identities. Do you know what it means when someone describes themself as nonbinary? Gender queer? Bisexual? Transitioning? Incel? Why do some people prefer They/Them as pronouns? It used to be so simple and clear-cut...or was it??

This presentation by Kerry Glaus is a crash course in gender and sexual identities. We begin with the basics, i.e., each of us (yes, each of us!) has a Sex, a Gender Identity, a style of Gender Expression, and a Sexual Orientation. These four dimensions are conceptualized as continua rather than dichotomies, and form a context within which we will discuss some of the newer terms describing the complexities and diversity in our gender and sexual identities.

The **Friends Gallery** will close on July 1 when renovation of the Friends Gallery, Friends Dining Room, and the Gathering Room begins. Linda Grashoff's photography remains in the Friends Gallery until late June. A group of Kendal photographers will exhibit their work on the temporary walls until the Friends Gallery reopens.

Art Gallery History

In June 2001, just prior to the opening of *Kendal Collects, The Kendalight* reported that the present Kendal Gallery was scheduled to receive the wall carpeting that continues to provide an excellent surface for our galleries. Resident Paul Arnold, who designed the gallery wall, specified thick plywood, not wallboard, beneath the wall fabric so nails could be used repeatedly to hang art.

From the Health & Wellness Clinic Physical Exam vs. Medicare Wellness Visit

The difference between a physical exam and a Medicare Wellness Visit is basically the difference between your doctor or nurse practitioner focusing on what is wrong versus what is right with your health. Both are equally important.

Feeling III or Well? When you're not feeling well or in pain, you want to get better. A *physical exam* helps to figure out what the problem is and what needs to be done. When you're healthy and feeling good, you want to stay that way. A *wellness visit* helps your health care provider understand what is working for you and how to best support your continued health and well-being.

Physical Exams: The primary purpose of a physical exam is to look for health problems. Based on findings, your health care provider may ask you to have tests to rule out possible health issues. Some of the things that may be done during an exam include: a visual check of your body overall, looking into your eyes, ears, nose and throat, listening to your heart and lungs to detect irregular sounds, touching parts of your body to feel for abnormalities, testing your motor function and reflexes.

Medicare Wellness Visits: Your annual Medicare Wellness Visit is an assessment of your overall health and well-being with the primary purpose being prevention. Medicare covers this type of visit once every 12 months. During this visit, your provider combines information from the visit with your medical record to gauge your risk for common preventable health problems such as heart disease, cancer, and type 2 diabetes. Based on what is learned, your provider creates a personal prevention plan tailored to you. Some of the things that may be reviewed during this type of visit are: reviewing questions about your health; confirming your medical and family history; recording your current prescriptions; measuring your height, weight, and blood pressure; looking for signs of memory loss, dementia, and frailty; documenting your health risk factors and treatment options; making sure your vaccinations are up to date; ordering further tests (such as bloodwork); providing personalized health advice; and developing a screening schedule (like a checklist) for the preventive services recommended for you.

It's important to take advantage of your Medicare benefits and schedule a Medicare Wellness Visit every year. If your primary care physician is here at Kendal, the Health & Wellness Clinic keeps track of these dates for you and calls you to set up your appointment each year when it is time. If you would like handouts on this information, we have printed materials available in the Health & Wellness Clinic. Just give us a call and we can place a copy in your open mailbox. 2023 Oberlin Juneteenth Celebration

"Marching through Station 99 to Freedom" Sat., June 17 - 9:00am–6:00pm George A. Abram Pavilion (Edison St., behind McDonald's)

Juneteenth – originally June 19, 1865 – is considered the date when the last enslaved people in America were freed. While its roots are in Texas, Juneteenth has become a federal holiday and a day to celebrate freedom all over the United States. Oberlin's history of commitment to abolition and the cause of freedom makes the community uniquely qualified to celebrate Juneteenth.

The **Juneteenth Parade** will take place at 12:00 noon, beginning at Spring Street Park and moving along Pleasant Street to the Roundhouse and the Pavilion on Edison Street. The parade will include horsemen, a clown, candy, dancers, a band led by Oberlin College alum Daniel Spearman, and other fun features.

Programming at the **George A**. **Abram Pavilion** will begin with an opening prayer and a reading of the Emancipation Proclamation. There will be storytelling, children's activities, a DJ, food vendors, and other vendors.

At Westwood Cemetery from 6:30pm to 7:30pm, there will be a commemoration of **Maafa**, also known as the Holocaust of Enslavement.

The June Open Studio is on Thurs, June 1, 1:00–3:00pm. The deci-


sion on which artist will be featured has not yet been finalized. Come and see!

Library Notes

Library 30th Anniversary Celebration with Horticulture Committee



Mary Clare Beck of the Library Committee and Prudy Hall of the Horticulture Committee have collaborated on an exhibit on display in the library to celebrate Kendal's 30th Anniversary. The exhibit centers on a book of photos of wildflowers (251 in all) seen around the Kendal grounds and Oberlin, compiled by Betty Weinstock from 1998-2001.

A description and time of emergence of each wildflower is included that provides a valuable comparison to presentday observations, such as the effect of climate change. The book has been digitized, and printed copies will be available in the Horticulture Room and in the library.

Betty, a founding member of the Library Committee, also made important contributions to the operations of the library, including the use of Excel to record the library holdings (recently made available online to Kendal residents). Bob Weinstock, Betty's husband, was the first chair of the library committee. Mary Clare has also included some historical information on the early operations of the library in the exhibit with the help of Jim Sunshine in formatting and printing posters. These show the Weinstocks' contribution, as well as photographs of Wildflower Hill and "Betty's Woods" by Linda Grashoff, Kathy Caldwell, and Anne Palmer.

From the John Bartram Arboretum Large Street Trees

We now realize that we no longer should plant the same variety of tree in a long row on our streets because of the danger of disease or insects destroying the whole row of trees at the same time. Instead, it is wise to vary the family and species in the row.

One possibility would be to alternate white oaks, red maples, American linden, honey locust, sycamore, and red oaks depending on the width of the area, the soil type, the moisture needs and tolerance, and the type of seeds dropped. Again, the right tree in the right place.


