## Kudos to Kendal Volunteers for 2011

Residents, staff and friends of Kendal continue to contribute an amazing number of volunteer hours both to Kendal and to the wider community. Kendal residents have faithfully kept track of volunteer activities throughout 2011. And, with only a little nudging, 180 residents have reported 44,271 hours of volunteered activities. (For those who keep comparative records, in 2010 185 residents reported 49,161 hours.) Residents volunteer the most hours to KORA committees and a variety of services for Kendal at Oberlin. Next greatest number of volunteer hours go to the Oberlin community churches, schools and favorite organizations. Over 46 residents and friends of Kendal have recorded over 3100 volunteer hours in Stephens Care Center. About 30 staff members have reported close to 634 hours of volunteering. This makes a total of slightly over 48,000 volunteer hours contributed by and through our Kendal community. The Volunteer Clearing House Committee is appreciative of the Kendal spirit residents and staff have demonstrated in this survey. March 17 marks the anniversaries of the death of St. Patrick (in 493) and the birth of “Kendal at Oberlin” (in 1987). On that date four Oberlinians met with Karl Heiser at his invitation to pursue the idea of an “Oberlin Retirement Village.” Present at Karl and Ruth’s home at 371 West College St. were Jephtha Carrell, Bill Long, Dorothy Luciano and Anita Reichard. Absent were three other invitees – David Clark, Diana Roose and Betty Weinstock. Much was accomplished at that meeting, not least being the commitment by Jephtha to “phone Alan Hunt, Philadelphia, who has extensive experience in organizing, building and operating Quaker retirement homes.” Over the next two months members of the committee visited several continuing care retirement communities in Ohio, New Jersey and Pennsylvania – including the original Kendal communities, Longwood and Crosslands. New members joined, most notably Dr. James “Jim” Stephens. Eric Nord and I were officially added to the group at its sixth meeting on June 1. Our first public meeting, which was held on June 24 in First Church, provided an opportunity for interested residents to meet Alan Hunt and “hear the questions and advice of local citizens who may be interested in living in the retirement center to be built here.” In November 1987 we began the process of incorporating the Oberlin Retirement Community as a 501(c)3 organization.

In a sense, this was a selfish enterprise. The Committee members themselves all hoped to become residents of this new Continuing Care Retirement Community someday, so each of us -- consciously or not -- tried to shape it to reflect our own values. Along the way we disappointed some by not forming the community as a “co-op” on the

model of several other town and college cooperative endeavors. Others were distressed that the anticipated fee schedule would exclude many townspeople of lesser means. Fortunately, both the members who decided to drop out and the new members who were added (including Ed Schwaegele and later Tom Piraino) shared the Quaker “Values and Standards” espoused by the Kendal organization. The Oberlin Retirement Community Board faced many challenges, including soliciting funds, finding a site and obtaining the Certificate of Need for nursing home beds. By entering into a contract with Kendal Management Services (which became The Kendal Corporation), we were able to move forward in financing and building our project. But our primary task remained recruiting “prospects” ready to move in soon to “Kendal at Oberlin.” Seventy per cent of the units had to be com-

mitted before construction could begin, so we formed our human community of Kendal residents first. Thus our present Kendal at Oberlin Residents Association (KORA) is in a very real sense the continuation and enlargement of that original group who gathered in the Heiser home on March 17, 1987. Let’s wish ourselves a VERY HAPPY 25<sup>th</sup> BIRTHDAY! (Remember that March 16 marks the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the groundbreaking for our community. And Barbara Thomas had just been hired as the new Administrator for Kendal at Oberlin!)

## Library Notes

Some people have mistaken the locked shredder box by the copier for a shredder. It is just a secure receptacle which accumulates materials to be shredded. About every four weeks, a Cintas truck with a powerful shredder parks by the main entrance while the contents of several such boxes here at Kendal are shredded. (The only one for use by residents is in the library.) **Paper clips should be removed before putting paper in the box, but staples do not need to be removed.** Shredding the contents of the box costs \$20.00 each time. Two or three times last summer, we tried going eight weeks between shreddings and the box became overstuffed! Shredder contributions for the year were \$161.01. Copier profit paid the rest of the \$220 total. This year we expect to have the box emptied every four weeks for \$260.00. The library has added three more shelves of paperback books and many more audio books than usual during the last month.

- Events with an early registration deadline will be announced four days before the deadline and on the day of deadline itself -- a total of five days. After this, an announcement will be shown three days before the actual pre-registration event and on the day of the event -- a total of four days.
- Weekly activities will have a slide to view on the day of the activity (e.g., Jazz Listening) as well as on the day before -- a total of two days.
- Please do not submit an early request, asking for an "immediate release". If this were done for all, it might add up to a 15 or 20-min. waiting period to view the menu for the day. *-Milt Ellis*

and/or arranges for a continuum of residential and support services from residential living through nursing care. The variety of residential contracts that are offered by Kendal are reviewed to ensure that the specific provision of services agreed to are offered and that these services are coordinated throughout the continuum of care. These standards ensure that persons served have the choice of flexible accommodations that are designed to meet their changing needs over time. A spirit of community with a focus on wellness that enhances the quality of life for the persons served is also assessed through these standards.

### Person-Centered Long Term Care:

The Stephens Care Center at Kendal was the very first Person-Centered Long-Term Care Community in Ohio. Hallmark to these standards focused on life in the SCC are: autonomy, individual choice, cultural competence, and flexibility. These standards review SCC programs to ensure they foster a holistic culture of successful aging and self-determination where the voices of the persons served are heard. In partnership with persons served and their families/support systems, personnel understand what services persons served want, how the services should be delivered, and how the persons served can be engaged in their homes. These standards are set to confirm that Kendal's SCC is a place where persons served want to live, personnel want to work and both choose to stay.

### Report from Greg Zehe

On Tuesday, February 21, Dining Services hosted a **coffee tasting** session from 5:00-7:00pm in the Heiser Lounge. Kendal residents tasted and compared three varieties of coffee and the coffee we currently serve, then submitted a comment card with their observations. Mike Dardis, Beverage Manager with Northern Haserot, was on hand to answer questions. Many residents participated in the informative session and as you can imagine, there were many opinions represented:

- 2% preferred our existing coffee overall
- 7% did not like any of the options including our existing coffee
- 23% preferred the Euro Roast coffee over all of the options including our existing coffee
- 32% preferred the Guatemalan coffee over all of the options including our existing coffee
- 45% preferred the Kenyan coffee over all of the options including our existing coffee

It was clear the "strength" was the primary driver in the groups that preferred the Euro Roast and Guatemalan coffees. The Kenyan coffee was perceived as the "smoothest" by those who favored it. We plan to utilize the feedback from this event to work with Mike Dardis to create a custom blend for use in our dining operation. We will use the "smooth" Kenyan coffee beans and increase the amount of coffee used to yield a "stronger" flavor.
