### January 2014 Kendal Board Notes

In January, the Kendal Board of Directors welcomed new resident member Ruth Ann Clark. She has already started serving with an appointment on the Governance Committee as requested by chair Ed Miller. Ruth Ann noted she would not only enjoy this assignment but also be able to make contributions based on prior board service. The Board also welcomed Christine Shay-Downer, Board Fellow for 2014. Christine, who is in her second year of graduate school at Baldwin Wallace University, has a nursing background working for BioScrip Inc. Don Reeves will once again serve as the resident representative attending Board meetings.

The Board's business included an update by Corporate Compliance Officer Stacy Terrell and Risk Manager Toni Merleno for year-end reports. This year Kendal will join other Kendal affiliates in using the Peace Church Risk Retention Group (PCRRG) for several on-site corporate compliance audits through the year. ## KNOW YOUR KORA COUNCIL

We have a pleasant “problem.” Kendal programs and events occasionally attract more people than Heiser Auditorium can seat. Organizers of a few programs regularly anticipate the problem, and open the rear auditorium doors to accommodate more people -- Spring Fling, Oberlin Heritage Center programs, and a few others expected to attract visitors from town.

But if not planned for, an overflow crowd leads to attempts to satisfy last minute, or late, attendees. People string chairs along the north wall, which may be acceptable. Others carry chairs from the Café area, which soon creates a safety problem. In a few instances, late opening of the rear doors has created a mad scramble, distracted other attendees’ attention, or interrupted the program if it has already begun.

In addition to attractive programs, contributing factors include increasing attendance by Stephens Care Center residents, in part because of a very supportive Wheelchair Brigade. We’ve lost a few seats by giving attention to safety with more space for wheelchair attendees while preserving an exit route. Since Barbara and I arrived nearly five years ago the number of mobility devices has increased substantially, enabling more residents to attend. We seem to be attracting more visitors to our programs. We’re all pleased at participation by more sprightly new residents, hoping and expecting that their number will continue to increase! This “problem” was considered at last month’s Coffee Hour, and discussed at some length at our KORA Council Meeting. A number of suggestions were offered, including “we need a bigger auditorium” -- hardly feasible in the short term! More practically, program planners need regularly to anticipate the possibility of full house, and plan accordingly: opening the rear doors if a large crowd seems likely, or being ready to do so at first sign of a crowd. A wheelchair usher might en-

able better use of wheelchair spaces. We can reform our practice of just-in-time (or only-a-little-late) arrival, or lower our expectations for late seating, or expect to use portable listening devices outside the auditorium if all seats are taken, or the doors have closed. Some programs do not lend themselves to opening the rear doors. We might try a system of tickets or repeat performances or dress rehearsal seating. KORA Council has asked Anne Elder, Program Committee Chair, and Bob

McClusky, KORA Vice President, to consult with Program Subcommittee chairs, other programmers and the Wheelchair Brigade. Together they will draft guidelines that might facilitate maximum attendance and minimum disruption for further discussion by KORA Council.

Please give Anne or Bob your suggestions for easing our “problem” and enabling maximum enjoyment of a continuing stream of top-notch programs. -Don Reeves, KORA President

## Welcome Kendal's New Residents

### Jim and Linda Marshall

**Jim:** Our transition to Kendal was not difficult because we have lived in Huron, less than 30 miles away, for almost 47 years. We have been attending concerts and other events at Oberlin College during these years and feel very comfortable here.

I grew up in Glen Ridge, a small suburban town in northern New Jersey. Pearl Harbor happened during my senior year of high school. That event changed most of our lives, but in my case I was lucky. I joined the Navy, got into the Naval ROTC, and was sent to Yale University. After graduation in 1947, I worked for two companies. In 1953 I joined the Hyatt Bearings Division of General Motors Corp. in Harrison, NJ. This started my career with General Motors, which ended in 1985 at the New Departure/Hyatt Division in Sandusky, OH. We started traveling when Linda took her French students to France during spring breaks and continued after retirement with Elderhostel, as well as on our own. We have been on over 50 Elderhostel trips over the years, both foreign and domestic programs.

Linda's record covers many family details, so I will not repeat them here. My early years were different from most American kids. My father was a mining engineer in Colombia, South America, where I was born. The mining operations were in the Choco (Pacific rain forest), but we also had a home in the mountains near Cali. We lived in both places, probably according to the rainy season in the tropics. I was home-schooled in the early grades, then sent to boarding schools in Wisconsin for two years. We moved to Glen Ridge in 1935 because my father was transferred to the New York offices.

**Linda:** I was born in Dresden, Germany, mother's home town. Both my parents were chemists, working in Hamburg during the early 1920's when inflation was rampant. They decided to emigrate to the United States for better opportunities.

I grew up in Montclair, NJ, and attended Montclair College High School and Swarthmore College, spending my junior college year in Geneva, Switzerland. After graduating in 1952 from Swarthmore, I got a job at the Chase National Bank in New York City. I married Jim; we lived in Summit, NJ, for almost 11 years and had four children, moving with them to Huron, OH, in 1966. These "children" are grown and married now. Doug, our oldest, lives in Sun Prairie, WI; Sally in New York City; Lee in Mason, OH; and Newton, our youngest, in Winnetka, IL. We have nine grandchildren. I was certified to teach French after taking many courses at Bowling Green State University; later I got a master's degree in reading from there. I've taught French and reading in high school and college and have done some tutoring in French.

I have been a member of the League of Women Voters for many years and was instrumental in getting a League started in Erie County.

We have spent our summers on Upper Saranac Lake in the Adirondacks since 1986, and at this special place or "camp" our children, spouses and grandchildren gather together each summer whenever possible. Jim and I

volunteer at the nearby Wild Center Museum in Tupper Lake, NY. Our Adirondacks activities -- canoeing, hiking, and sailing -- have lately been reduced to walking in the woods and riding on our pontoon boat. We are enjoying being Kendal residents, participating in all it has to offer.

One charity is the Mercy Thrift Shop in Lorain, part of the Mercy Hospital system. There seems to be a significant community of homeless men who shop there. For this reason, we take lots of mens clothes there. We heard that a homeless man who had been living under a bridge came to Mercy Thrift Shop, found some decent clothes, got himself cleaned up enough to be presentable to an employer, was hired, and then got a place to live. With stories like this, it is easy to continue taking clothes to this charity.

Another charity to which we have contributed is Women of Worth, a program for incarcerated women. Occasionally we have been given large amounts of scrap fabrics and other materials. We have given them to these women, whose work in crafting, sewing, quilting, crocheting, knitting, etc., allows them to give back to the community. The self esteem of these women is enhanced as they find meaningful service.

RAFF extends your donations to Family Promise, Habitat, the Boys and Girls Club, Goodwill, Hospice of the Western Reserve, and more. It is a way to keep the love going out to many people.

In January the shop receipts totaled \$2,813.25. This is a good average for the month and not a bad way to start the year. Many thanks to all of you!

## **Notes from the Thoughtful Medicine Committee**

Lynn Ensinger, Director of Clinical Services/DON at Kendal, came to the February Thoughtful Medicine Committee Meeting and presented an overview of the Kendal Health Care System. The goals are Healthy Living, Preventive Medicine, and Disease Management.

First, the staff works to insure that the residents' needs are identified and an action plan arranged. To start the day there is a Standup meeting where all departments are represented -- from housekeeping to the medical staff. Information can be shared to help residents throughout the Kendal campus. In addition there is a Wednesday morning meeting with Dr. Georgia Newman and the clinic staff to insure that residents' medical needs are met and coordinated in the clinic system. Second, the clinic has many ways to support residents in need and offer preventive care. There is always a nurse on duty to access the problem and send you on to a PA or a MD. In the clinic, the medical needs of the residents are addressed in a number of ways, among them: administering IV meds (antibiotics), addressing hydration problems, changing dressings, ordering x-rays, monitoring high blood pressure, upper respiratory illnesses, and blood sugar, doing bladder scans, and giving and reconciling meds.

Finally, here are some of the best

things you can do to stay out of the ER: Reconcile your meds (have the most current orders and make sure your list is correct, know the proper doses, side effects, and adverse interactions) and at each medical visit ask that your results be put in your chart. Remember always that you are in charge and that you can accept or deny any treatment or trip to the emergency room.

The Kendal Health Care System is always changing and evolving. Here are some of the goals for the future: Develop clinics for the prevention of congestive heart failure, chronic lung disease, hypertension and diabetes, and balance testing/ambulation assessment.

The library continues to receive donations of books relating to the thoughtful medicine approach at Kendal. A discussion of "Knocking on Heaven's Door: The Path to a Better Way of Dying," by Katy Butler, is scheduled for March 10. Please put a note in my box if you are interested.

for federally reimbursed services, it is valuable to have this outside service. The board also heard mini updates from most of the board committees.

Examples included: The Finance Committee learned more about the self-insurance plan for staff (PCHIP); Health Care Quality Management shared changes related to physician coverage and a continuing dialogue with Mercy and the Cleveland Clinic; a view was provided into quality reports from the Ohio Dept. of Health for services delivered by Senior Independence; the Governance Committee initiated the annual forms to be completed by board members including an annual Code of Conduct, Conflict of Interest Form, and an annual Self-Assessment; Marketing gave an overview of the year, noting 17 new move-ins and 13 close-outs. The department's activity also included 5,185 touch points with prospective residents, 56 Try-It visits, and 350 inbound marketing

requests for down-loaded information.

The board's main focus for the meeting was a status update on renovated cottages now projected to be completed in April. Geothermal wells are in process with three completed as of mid-January. The geothermal cost is about \$8,000 per cottage vs. \$6,000 budgeted. The designs for community spaces (Horticulture and RAFF and Training Center) were still undergoing refinement at the time of the board meeting. Cleveland-based firm Krill has been selected as our preconstruction management firm and are now on board to work with Kendal representatives for new estimated design costs. Kendal previously used Higley for preconstruction services. A Master Plan Update for residents is to be scheduled in March for the finer details of project status.

The board was briefed on the January extreme weather incidents and necessary repairs. It expressed sincere appreciation for the extraordinary efforts by staff and residents to get through this difficult time.
