“Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging” is more than a committee. It is a group effort to actualize an accepting, welcoming atmosphere here at KaO. It is also a commitment by each of us to make all persons feel comfortable being true to themselves.

Interactive Session: We’ll first share updates about work toward our DEIB strategic goals and ongoing campus activities and plans related to equity, inclusion, and anti-racism. Then we’ll devote the majority of our time to focus groups conducted by the Cleveland Center for Community Solutions. They

Bahá’í Faith Celebrates the New Year in March

You might think the Bahá’í Faith is little known, but this relatively new arrival on the scene is more geographically widespread than any religion other than Christianity, and it continues to grow.

The Bahá’í Faith was founded in the Middle East over 100 years ago by a Persian nobleman. Unity is at its core – belief in one God and in one race: the human one. The Founder’s hope was to foster a “peaceful and integrated global society.”*

Other precepts include building of world peace, acceptance and respect for all religions, elimination of prejudices, reduction of global poverty, and universal education. Another key tenet is sharing the Faith with others on request, without proselytizing.

Bahá’ís follow a different calendar. The Bahá’í year begins on the vernal equinox, March 20 or 21. It consists of nineteen 19-day months plus four or five “intercalary days” at the end of February. Each month begins with a gathering for worship.

Lamas, Khan, and Emperors: The Politics of Tibetan Buddhist Art in Imperial China. Mon., March 6 & 13 (ZOOM ONLY) and March 27 (AUDITORIUM ONLY), 10:30am–12:00pm.

Kevin Greenwood, Curator of Asian Art at Allen Memorial Art Museum, presents three lectures. The relationship between China and Tibet, although perceived by contemporary Westerners as defined by conflict, has a long, complex, and interconnected history. This series will highlight the connections as exemplified in great masterworks of Tibetan Buddhist art and architecture from the 13th to the 18th centuries. These works were made for, and sometimes by, the most important religious and political figures in China, Tibet, and Mongolia. Often displaying a synthesis of Chinese, Tibetan, and Mongolian artistic styles, and with subtle political meanings, these works of religious art range from the awe-inspiring to the sublimely beautiful.

Time Travel Back to the 16th-18th Centuries through Sound. Tues., April 4, 11, and 18, 10:30am–12:00pm. Heiser Auditorium only.

Catharina Meints, Kendal resident and Professor Emerita at Oberlin Conservatory of Music, presents a three-session course.

Mark Fahringer, founder and project director for The Salvation Army's 49-9 Project, will describe this successful prison outreach and re-entry program that seeks to reach out to persons currently incarcerated and recently released from correctional and treatment facilities in Northeast Ohio.

Its aim is to provide recently released inmates with help to guide them to available resources. The program provides classes to inmates, case management, financial assistance, mentoring, and resume and job search assistance.

Based in Oberlin, the program began working with the Grafton and Lorain Correctional Institutions and now operates across the Salvation Army's Northeast Ohio Division. The ultimate goal is to reduce recidivism and stabilize the lives of ex-offenders.



In 2024 LDNC anticipates open positions for Secretary, Councilors, and an LDNC member. Open positions vary from year to year and sometimes open positions arise that are not anticipated. It is extremely helpful to LDNC and the community to have a pool of people with a variety of skills that you recommend for KORA officers, KORA Councilors, and LDNC members.

We hope you will think broadly and specifically about persons to serve.

At the KORA bulletin board and on the resident website, you will find this year's Call for Nominees. The Call for Nominees description explains more details about the nomination process and contains a summary of roles and responsibilities for KORA Council positions and LDNC members. Consult the bulletin board and the website for information.

If you would like to discuss a nomination or ask questions, please contact a member of the LDNC. Once you are ready to nominate someone, seek your prospective candidate's permission, then write a brief note on why you would like to see your nominee in this position. Make clear to the person that your suggestion does not guarantee that they will be on the LDNC's recommended slate in November.

If you nominate yourself, include a few words about your interest in the job.

Nominations should be placed in Box 216, Attention Bob Longworth, by May 15, 2023.

Your input is essential! Get ready, set, and nominate!

Kendal Volunteer Hours in 2022

Every year Kendal residents and staff have carefully recorded the number of hours they have served as volunteers, both within Kendal and outside in the greater community. These volunteer hours are submitted, and the totals are tabulated by the Volunteer Clearinghouse Committee. Barbara Thomas uses these figures to support and to validate Kendal at Oberlin's non-profit status, and to demonstrate the many and varied ways our residents and staff contribute to the wider community.

The grand total of all hours reported for 2022: 55,726! This total is a significant increase when compared with the hours reported in 2021.

Inside Kendal: The reports show that residents volunteered 38,407 hours within the Kendal community in three categories: KORA (29,126 hours), Kendal at Oberlin (9,133), and Pandemic Related (148). Comparison of the hours in 2022 with the hours in 2021 shows a significant increase in KORA hours, an insignificant decrease in KaO hours, and a significant decrease in Pandemic Related hours. Compared to last year, the total hours of volunteering within the Kendal community increased by more than thirty-eight hundred hours.

Outside Kendal: Residents and staff volunteered 17,319 hours in 2022 outside of Kendal in seven categories: Organizations (7,994 hours), Church (4,178 hours), Oberlin College/LCCC (1,523 hours), Government (870 hours), Medical (709 hours), Schools (150 hours), and Miscellaneous (1,895 hours). Comparison of the hours in 2022 with the hours in 2021 shows significant increases in six categories and slight decreases in the Schools and Meals categories. Compared to last year, the total hours of volunteering outside of Kendal increased by more than sixty-eight hundred hours. Kendal residents and staff took advantage of increased opportunities to volunteer for community activities and events as they became more available during the year.

Responses: This year 191 reports were received from the residents, which is more than the number received last year. Kendal staff tracked 1,909 hours of community service with a variety of non-profit organizations such as Oberlin Community Services, Leadership Lorain County, Ohio Living, Oberlin Rotary, Lorain County Racial Equity, and United Way. Stephens Care Center recorded more than 3,600 hours volunteered by BOTH Kendal residents and community volunteers.

The Volunteer Clearinghouse Committee appreciates the diligent work of residents and staff to track their volunteer hours and report them at the end of the year. **THANKS** to all who volunteered in 2022! From the John Bartram Arboretum River Birch (*Betula nigra*)

The river birch grows in hardy zones 4–9 and is a medium-large tree growing to a height of 40–80 feet. It prefers full sun to partial shade, and tolerates a variety of soils but not high alkaline soils. As its name indicates, it does like moisture, but does not want to sit in still water; surprisingly, it can tolerate some drought when no longer very young. It does keep erosion in check along stream banks. The wood is not particularly strong and is often used as plywood.

It has male and female flowers on the same tree (it is monoecious). The 3-in. male catkins are much more noticeable as they form in the fall and blow in the wind. Their pollen is released in the spring. The female catkins are much less noticeable since they appear at the same time as the leaves which are serrated and diamond shaped.

The seeds are scattered by the wind and also by water if the tree is along a river. Many river birches are now planted in the landscapes of homes and even as street trees. Sadly, they can be chosen for landscapes where there is not enough room. There are cultivars of the native river birch with distinctive

coloring in the peeling bark, and also some that are shorter.

There are few insect and disease problems with the river birch. Many other non-native birch species do have problems, one being with the bronze birch borer.

The river birch is one of the native species of trees that supports the most insect biodiversity. It provides food for hundreds of species of butterflies and moths, birds, and small mammals. Loved for its beautiful bark and graceful shape (especially noticeable in winter), it is a valuable tree. We have 47 here in our Arboretum, making up almost 5% of our collection reports.

Dining and Nutrition Services



It is no secret that our dining service is engaged in a continuing struggle to hire and keep staff at every level.

What may not be so obvious is that they are competing in a sellers' market. Gone are the days when the administration could tell workers how many and which days in a week they were assigned to work. If a server can come in on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, the schedulers adjust the worker's schedule to fit that requirement. The schedule is a never-ending jigsaw puzzle. The result is that diners can never anticipate when they will be facing few servers or a skeleton cooking crew. This can be frustrating for diners; it is exhausting and nearly impossible for those responsible for making the system work for us all.

The Dining Matters Committee has urged the staff to post signs warning us when the staff is scanty and reminding diners of the rules for meal pick-up and sit-down dining. Here is a summary of the rules we are going to be dining by.

Lunch: At lunch we are asked to place our order for both take-out and

sit-down meals at the door to Fox and Fell. Meal pick-up time is 11:30am to noon. Sit-down diners can order and then find a seat beginning at noon. If pick-up lunchers arrive late, they will have to wait for a break in the dining line to place their orders. Staff members are always willing to help seat someone who needs assistance, but try to remember to place your order before accepting assistance to a table.

Dinner: The evening dining room meal service will still include server-accepted ordering. But we are trying a slightly different schedule for orders. Those ordering take-out can do so from 4:45 to 5:30pm and again from 6:30 to 7:00pm. The hour from 5:30 to 6:30pm is reserved for sit-down dining service. Of course, diners can come into the Fox and Fell earlier than 5:30pm, but they should be prepared to wait for the attention of a server until 5:30pm.

We urge you to give this system a try. This is a work in progress, with the goal to relieve pressure on the staff. Tell us what you think using the comment cards.
