Know Your KORA Council

Resident association presidents are included in the annual Kendal System Strategic Thinking Gathering, along with staff and board members from each Kendal community. This year we met at Kendal at Longwood on April 23-24 to focus on the future of aging and its implications for the Kendal system and the Kendal communities. The trends are clear, beginning with a dramatic shift in age demographics worldwide. Also noted: Trouble ahead for the economics of old age; growing preference for living in age-desegregated communities rather than CCRCs; and a growing need for individualized care and support services.

I will share reflections from time to time on why all of the above matters to us here at KatO, and on what we have to contribute precisely because the Kendal system has developed into a rich resource on healthy aging. I mention these trends briefly just now, because they are the background for our participation in the May 28 Intergenerational Conversations preceding the White House Conference on Aging to take place later this summer.

Some of you are aware of the upcoming panels. Here is the limited information we have at this point. There will be ten sites for these focus groups; two are at Kendal communities, one of which is Kendal at Oberlin. These sites will be connected live via Public Broadcasting links, and coverage will switch back and forth, with all sites open to one another via a central moderator (similar to live TV coverage of elections!) Michele Tarsitano-Amato is coordinating KatO participation. Our site will have two tables of ten participants: two residents, two high school students, two college students, two staff members, and two from the larger community. We will be assigned one of four possible focus issues: retirement security; healthy aging; longterm services and supports; elder justice. Likely we will be given "healthy aging,"

One of the great joys of the new Kendal Resale Shop is the way that it continues to be a place of hospitality, perhaps more than before. Folks not only shop there; they also visit with their friends and family while there. We are glad to provide such an open, light, fun place for everyone. Recently a woman from town was shopping and wanted to buy something that cost \$2.00. She had a \$10 bill with her, but no \$1.00's. Fran Cooper happened to be there, saw her situation, and gave her \$2.00. The woman noticed Fran's name badge. Some time later, Fran received a thank you note containing \$2.00. The note said: "Thank you for making my payment when I met you in the new Resale Shop. I did not have exact change... Thank you for your help. P.S. This is why I love Kendal." I share the story with Fran's permission, for the joy of all of us. The Shop's honor system of payment is as strong as ever, as is our hospitality. We now carry children's clothes, along with a few toys. Most of the clothes so far have been donated by parents of Kendal Early Learning Center children, so the sizes are quite small. It has been a delight, akin to soul food, for the Resale volunteers to process these adorable clothes for tiny tots. And they are selling, too. What fun to have things for little people in the midst of our community of elders.

In March, total receipts were \$3,636.25. Included in this total are a car sale with \$500 for RAF, and \$16 from Threads. Indeed, we had a very good first quarter in 2015.

3/3 Orcutts: Turkey vulture, not at Kendal, but at I-480 Lorain/Cuyahoga Co. line, a VERY early harbinger of spring; 3/6 Marilyn Myerson: Robins; 3/7 Elizabeth Hole: Spirit found some pussy willows out! 3/9 Orcutts: Downy woodpecker on feeder, and countless geese under the feeders; 3/13 Nina Love: Red-wing blackbird - a sure sign of spring - at Parking Lots 1 and 3, and at Rock Pond; 3/15 Orcutts: Grackles at Rock Pond; 3/16 Terry Carlton: Turkey vulture soaring over the eastern half of KatO; 3/16 Larry Porter: Dark-eved vireo, red-headed woodpecker, and house finch back of #65, and muskrat in Farmers Pond, a very plump and healthy looking beast (duck eggs responsible?); 3/18 Orcutts: Bluebird pair inspecting nestboxes near Rock Pond; 3/18 Peg S.: The same on the Kendal side of Island Pond; 3/22 Orcutts: Seven scaup (lesser?) in Rock Pond; 3/23 Terry C.: Slate-colored junco behind #143, and 3/24 a downy woodpecker at Farmer's Pond; 3/24 Orcutts: Buffleheads, redheads, ringnecked ducks, hooded mergansers in Rock Pond; 3/25 Orcutts: Ruddy ducks at Rock Pond; 3/30 Lee H.: Great white egret behind Phase II; 3/31 Orcutts: Belted kingfisher on north shore of Rock Pond. 4/1 Lee H.: Two tree swallows at Rock Pond; 4/2 killdeer at 11:30pm near

east end of Wildflower Hill, heard a

calling barred owl near the west end,

and a possum skulking on the side

of the road near Buttonbush Bridge. 4/3 Larry P.: Spring peepers on "the east side", but heard western chorus frogs by Buttonbush Bridge two days earlier; 4/5 Orcutts: Blue-winged teal in Rock Pond; 4/6 Maureen Bailey: 5-6 ring-necked ducks, and two buffleheads on Meadow Pond, and two piedbilled grebes in Russia Township Park. Bird Monitoring News

Off to a promising start! As of April 26, New Russia Township Park had four active eastern bluebird nests with a total of 21 eggs, with the first 5 due to hatch on May 2 or 3. There are also many American tree swallows investigating nestboxes in the Park but since they are so dependent upon flying insects for food, they are usually a few weeks behind bluebirds in their nesting schedule. In addition, a kestrel box was recently mounted in the northwest corner of the park - basically across from Drug Mart. It was mounted on a 16-20 foot telescopic pole by Black River Audubon Society volunteers. Kestrels are also endangered because of the diminishing number of farm buildings and fields of grasses and native plants housing

an abundance of small rodents on which they feed. Other less common species in the park so far are eastern meadowlarks, Wilson's snipe and field sparrows, none of which use nestboxes. At Kendal there is no eastern bluebird activity but many American tree swallows are staking claims on our boxes. On the Kendal trail, one nestbox had a dead tree swallow with a broken neck (victim of an English house sparrow). But on a box near Phase III bluebirds were seen feeding, or perched on the fence nearby.
