  - Other government document.

The following are NOT VALID: notification mailed by the Board of Elections or any document/card that does not show voter's name and current address (including U. S. passport).

## KNOW YOUR KORA COUNCIL

This month KORA appeals to residents to donate as you are able to the Employee Vacation Fund. **May 18: "Why Are So Many Older Drivers Killed in U. S. Traffic?"** 10:30am to noon, Leonard Evans, President, Science Serving Society, and former research fellow at General Motors Research Labs. **May 7, 14, 21, "Site and Insight: Themes in Asian Buddhist Architecture,"** 10:30am to noon, Kevin R. E. Greenwood, Joan L. Danforth Curator of Asian Art, Allen Memorial Art Museum. This three-part course focuses on thematic links to Buddhist architecture throughout Asia. The first lecture will provide an overview of Buddhist concepts that find expression in art and architecture, and examine the fundamental early South Asian Buddhist structures known as *stupa* (burial mound), *chaitya* (sanctuary), and *vihara* (monastic residence). The second lecture will look at the evolution of Buddhist architecture in China, Tibet, and Mongolia. The third will cover Korean and Japanese contributions to Buddhist architecture. Major sites discussed include temples and grottoes in India, Indonesia, China, Korea, and Japan, as well as two of the most famous dry landscape gardens in Kyoto. Class 4809, \$20.

## News & Views: Foreign Affairs Fri., May 4 - 10:30am - AUD

Oberlin College professor of politics Steve Crowley presents "**Russia's Foreign Policy.**" Under President Vladimir Putin, Russia is projecting an autocratic model of governance abroad and working to undermine the influence of liberal democracies, namely along Russia's historical borderlands. Russia caused an international uproar in 2016 when it interfered in the U.S. presidential contest. But Putin's foreign policy toolkit includes other instruments, from alliances with autocrats to proxy wars with the U.S. in Georgia, Ukraine, and Syria. How does Putin conceive of national interests, and why do Russian citizens support him? How should the United States respond to Putin's foreign policy ambitions? No registration or fee. **All are welcome.**

## Asian Rural Institute, Japan: Building a Sustainable World One Rural Leader at a Time Tues., May 22 - 7:15pm - AUD

JB Hoover, Executive Director of the American Friends of ARI, and ARI graduate Judith Daka will tell us about the Asian Rural Institute. Founded in 1973, it brings local grassroots community leaders of under-served rural populations from Asian, South Pacific, and African countries to its location in Northern Japan for a nine-month intensive training program on sustainable agriculture, community building, and leadership, with emphasis on reaching the most marginalized, poor, and oppressed peoples. ARI welcomes people of any faith, race, class, or profession as long as they share ARI's vision and pledge to return home straightaway to work with their people. Each year ARI trains about 30 participants and has graduated over 1,300 from more than 50 countries. **All are welcome.**

The Allen Memorial Art Museum will conclude its centennial year with a celebratory event on Thursday, May 3. The vast contribution of Kendal residents to the AMAM will be recognized at the event which begins at 5:00pm at the museum. ## More About Kendal Residents

### Anne Palmer and Bruce Harker

**Anne:** I spent my first 18 years in a Chicago suburb, and went to Oberlin College, graduating in 1966. After Bruce Harker (also class of 1966) and I married, we lived in Hyde Park, Chicago, and then began our life of working overseas.

In Indonesia I discovered public health. While Bruce did his thing and our daughter, Lienchai, went to elementary school, I completed Center for Disease Control and Prevention correspondence courses, volunteered with the local health department working on vital statistics, and to my surprise, was asked to manage a project promoting oral rehydration and high-dose Vitamin A for preschool kids. This mind-expanding work gave me experience in social marketing, evaluation research, and clinical research as well as management. That led me at age 49 to earn my master's degree in public health from Johns Hopkins. Next came an AIDS education project in Philippine cities: I was old enough to be the kindly grandmother amidst the young sex workers. Then back to maternal and child health in Indonesia, followed by a return to HIV (plus TB and malaria) on short-term assignments, mostly in African countries.

Our daughter lived and worked in Florida for 20 years, then exchanged her surfboard for a snowboard in Colorado.

Post-retirement, I've enjoyed reading, gardening, bicycling, and tutoring conversational English. I'm a volunteer researcher with [TracesOfWar.com](http://TracesOfWar.com), identifying photos of war sites in Europe and discovering and summarizing the stories behind them. All this has a

backdrop of companion dogs: rescues and our "Peter Pan, never-grow-up" flat-coated retrievers. We've been on the Kendal list a long time. We upgraded to "active" in 2015. We look forward to continuing to grow in this warm community.

**Bruce:** Raised southwest of Louisville, I majored in psychology at Oberlin College, graduating in 1966. Anne Palmer and I met through Oberlin's Outing Club, hiking the Appalachian Trail in the Smokies; we married in 1967. Following my University of Chicago PhD, we spent a postdoctoral year in India. Two years in Kuala Lumpur hooked us on Asia and added our Thai daughter to our family in 1975. She "rides" in Breckenridge, CO, where she's a private chef.

For 30 years I led international teams in Southeast Asia: building Indonesia's women's literacy program and its Ministry for the Role of Women in Development; empowering the Philippine indigenous tribes to manage their forest territories; and enlisting local farmers in the north of Sri Lanka to resist Tamil rebels. From 2000 to 2003 I worked at our Jakarta Embassy to help Indonesia reach a peace accord with rebels in Aceh. Following the 2004 earthquake and tsunami, I returned to Aceh for the Asian Development Bank to refinance local banks and to design a micro-credit program for devastated small businesses.

Our travels immersed us in several cultures and worlds of temples, mosques, curries, rice fields, active vol-

canos, crater lakes, tropical forests with howling gibbons and giant fruit bats, and white and black sand beaches on blue-green seas.

I retired to State College, PA, in 2003 to assist my parents in their assisted living at the Quaker-directed retirement community Foxdale Village. In 2008 we moved to Sarasota, FL, with our flat-coated retrievers who live with us still in Cottage #100. We've been looking forward to Kendal at Oberlin for nearly ten years and are thrilled to be here. Anne and I enjoy biking and have joined several European "bike and barge" trips.

## 25 KORA Presidents: Tom Piraino, 2002 & 2007

Tom Piraino, one of the leaders in the development of Kendal at Oberlin, served as KORA President in 2002 and again in 2007. Tom and his wife Peg moved into Kendal on October 1, 1994. Born in Cleveland's Little Italy to immigrants from Sicily, he was a 1942 graduate of Oberlin College and in 1969 graduated from Case Western Reserve Law School. As an Air Corps officer in WW II, he test-flew Boeing's then-new B-29 bomber. After WWII, he established Nelson Stud Welding's headquarters in Elyria and served as general manager. Tom co-founded Oberlin's first community welfare agency in 1955, chaired the committee that built a new library in Oberlin, and served as trustee of Lorain County Community College.

After Tom retired, his principal volunteer activities were with the KatO community and a U. S. Department of Labor project in which he had a leadership role, improving efforts to find employment for people affected by plant closings and corporate downsizing. Tom served as a member of the Kendal Corporation Board and the Kendal at Oberlin Board of Trustees, and was vice-president and president of Kendal's Residents Association. He claimed the major interest in his life was always his family: Peg, three sons, three daughters-in-law, and ten grandchildren. Tom loved to tell stories. Perhaps some of these stories will surface at a KORA Council Meeting. Tom would have enjoyed that!

## Be Alert! Severe Weather Season Is Here

Our mild winter has already brought strong thunderstorms to our region, but the spring season brings a stronger threat of severe weather, ranging from thunderstorms with damaging winds and heavy rains to tornados. This severe weather occurs especially in April through August. Kendal has a Safety Plan and Procedure that residents and staff must follow to avoid injury in the event of a Weather Warning. Here are recommended shelter areas:

- **Heiser Community Center:** Public restrooms, auditorium, and interior corridors away from windows.
- **Apartment Building:** First floor in bathrooms, laundry rooms, stairwells, or corridors away from windows.
- **Stephens Care Center:** Public restrooms, bathing rooms, interior corridors, or resident bathrooms away from windows.

- **Cottages:** Bathrooms or closets inside cottages; away from windows.

When the National Weather Service issues a Tornado or Severe Thunderstorm Warning for Lorain County, all residents and staff members should respond immediately by taking precautions and seeking appropriate shelter. When staff members remind us that a warning has been issued, please cooperate and follow directions to seek safe shelter – even if the warning comes during a meal in our dining rooms! Facility Services and Stephens Care Center have weather radios that will send watch, warning, and advisory announcements. They will tell the Heiser Community Center of imminent severe weather and all-clear messages.

Oberlin's and Kendal's warning sirens will sound only when Oberlin is in the direct path of an approaching tornado or other violent storm. Since these sirens may be difficult to hear, please rely on weather radios, computers, and TV messages to stay updated on the latest weather advisories.

## 25 Woods for Waters Mark Your Calendars for Thurs., May 3

Trees are an amazing benefit in helping to manage storm water, keeping soil from eroding, and improving water quality. Plantings along streams and rivers (called riparian buffers) are helpful in this regard, but buffers of non-turf grass help ponds as well. Lawn grass is not good at absorbing storm water and the pesticides and herbicides used on turf are harmful to birds and fish. Here at Kendal, in addition to planting more trees and other plants near waters' edge, you may have noticed work being done to remove invasive species such as cattail and buckthorn, especially at Farmer's Pond and at Center Pond. This will help make it possible for the good trees and plants at the water's edge to thrive. We want to continue such work at our other ponds and vernal pools.

On Thursday, May 3, the John Bartram Arboretum and the City of Oberlin will celebrate Arbor Day 2018 with a focus on riparian management. We are very fortunate that Jane Goodman, Executive Director, Cuyahoga River Restoration, will be here to speak to us at 10:00am in Heiser Auditorium, and following lunch at 1:30pm, to guide us on an Interpretive Walk along the Oberlin Plum Creek Greenway starting at the corner of Main and Vine Streets. She is so dedicated to making this day specific to our Oberlin location that she came in April for a day of preparation. We look forward to this opportunity to learn how to improve our campus and town.

### Meatless Mondays at Kendal: Why Go Meatless? And Why on Monday?

The concept of "Meatless Monday" dates back to World War I when the U.S. Food Administration urged families to reduce consumption of key staples to aid the war effort. Health advocate Syd Lerner, in association with Johns Hopkins School of Public Health, reintroduced the concept in 2003 as a public health awareness campaign. The message of "one day a week, cut out meat" is a way for you to do something good for your health and for your planet.

**Why go meatless?** The average American today eats as much as 75 more pounds of meat each year than previous generations. Excessive consumption of meat has been linked with such chronic diseases as heart disease, type 2 diabetes, obesity, and cancer. Eating meals rich in fruits, vegetables and legumes which contain natural antioxidants benefits cardiovascular health. Increasing plant-based food in your diet may also have a positive effect on weight and BMIs which are correlated to type 2 diabetes. Eating less meat and more plant-based foods can lead to a better quality of life and increased longevity.

Consuming a plant-based diet can benefit the environment. According to the Food and Agricultural Organization, 14.5% of global human-caused greenhouse gas (GHG) emission is estimated to come from livestock. The EPA estimates that livestock contributes to more than one-third of methane emissions.

**Why choose Monday?** There is science behind it. Evidence suggests that healthy thinking and behavior occur more often on Mondays, when people are likely to start diets or exercise regimens, quit smoking, or schedule doctor's visits. Why one day? Taking small steps that build over time can help people sustain healthy behavior. Of those surveyed, 69% say that taking small steps rather than doing everything at once makes it easier to achieve health goals. Frequent messages can improve behaviors.

Meatless Monday is a global movement powered by a growing number of individuals, hospitals, universities, worksites, and restaurants. This is our future and at Kendal we see more residents, staff, and potential residents demanding plant-based options.
