Chris Flaharty, Oberlin College Associate Professor of Theater, will preview the Theater Department's December play. Playwrights Hamilton Deane and John L. Balderston have dramatized the novel by Bram Stoker into a classic audience pleaser that tells the gripping story of a father trying to rescue his daughter from the charms of the magnetic Count Dracula.

Student actors will preview scenes from the production and present their approach to staging this classic mystery about Lucy Seward, who is losing blood night after night. Her father and fiancé consult Dr. Van Helsing, a doctor of rare diseases, who detects the distinctive touch of a vampire. These three suspect the Transylvanian count from a nearby estate and pursue a daring plan to outwit him. But the count has a nefarious plan of his own. Can the allies vanquish the creature by the light of day, or will Dracula triumph once again in the dark world of night?


#### National Theater Live *Hamlet* Wed., Nov. 13 - 7:00pm - Apollo

#### Play Readers: *Other Desert Cities* Fri., Nov. 15 - 1:30pm; Sat., Nov. 16 - 7:15pm - AUD, KOTV

Set in Palm Springs on Christmas Eve in 2004, this dark comedy about a political family's secrets and politics was a finalist for the 2012 Pulitzer Prize for Drama. Playwright Jon Robin Baitz tells the story of the fictional Wyeth family – a clan led by a mother and father highly regarded in Hollywood circles and admired for their service to and friendship with Ronald and Nancy Reagan.

As the daughter, a writer, reveals to the family that she is about to publish a memoir, she begins to question her need to bare her personal pain against the family's stake in her choice. Both witty and deep, this very smart play poses basic moral questions for the family and for us.

Barbara Brecht, Mary Joy Leaper, John McBride, Prue Richards, and John Secrist play the five characters; Phyllis Gorfain directs.

#### Nov. 2 - Passion of Joan of Arc

(1928) This silent film depicts the trial of Joan of Arc, with all of the dialogue taken verbatim from the transcript of the trial. A more powerful depiction cannot be imagined.

**Nov. 9 - American Factory (2019)** In postindustrial Ohio, a Chinese billionaire opens a factory in an abandoned General Motors plant, hiring 2,000 Americans. Early days of optimism give way to setbacks as high-tech China clashes with working-class America.

Nov. 15 (FRIDAY) - Amish Grace (2010) When a gunman killed five Amish children and injured five others in a Nickel Mines, PA, schoolhouse shooting in 2006, media attention rapidly turned from the tragic events to the extraordinary forgiveness demonstrated by the Amish community.

Nov. 23 - Guess Who's Coming To Dinner (1967) Sydney Poitier, Spencer Tracy, Katherine Hepburn. After a vacation in Hawaii, Joanna "Joey" Drayton returns to her parents' home in San Francisco bringing her fiancé, the highly qualified Dr. John Prentice, to introduce him to her parents. Throughout the day and evening, the families discuss the problems of their son and daughter.

Nov. 30 - The Bowmaker's Wood (2019) A film for all who love music tells the story of the "silent servant" of the musical world – the bow. Starting from the workshops of five master bowmakers in the Pacific Northwest, we journey to the fascinating origin of the bow in France, then to Brazil, home to the imperiled tree from which bows are made.

# Special Documentary: *The Rape of Europa* Tues., Nov 19 - 7:15pm - AUD, KOTV

This 2006 documentary is based on the book *The Rape of Europa: The Fate of Europe's Treasures in the Third Reich and the Second World War* by Lynn H. Nicholas, who was awarded the Légion d'Honneur by France. This book documents the Nazi confiscation and destruction of looted art treasures and buildings throughout Europe. It covers the extraordinary tasks the Monuments Men undertook to locate, preserve, and return the looted art to their rightful locations during and in the immediate aftermath of World War II. (You may have seen the 2014 Holly-wood movie starring George Clooney which was inspired by this true story.)

#### Community Conversations Saving Art in Italy During WWII Thurs., Nov. 21 - 7:15pm - AUD, KOTV

William Keller will talk about his father Deane Keller's wartime activities as a leading Monuments Man in Italy. In 1943, President Roosevelt created the Roberts Commission to promote the preservation of cultural property in wartime. A member of the Yale faculty, Deane volunteered to serve as an MFAA (Monuments, Fine Arts, and Archives) officer with the U.S. 5th Army in Italy, working to protect and salvage art and monuments. He had received his BFA from the Yale School of Fine Arts in 1926 and was a recipient of the Prix de Rome, which enabled his study at the American Academy in Rome from 1927 to 1929. At each location Deane visited from 1943 to 1946, he sometimes arrived only hours after a town's capture, witnessing the worst of the devastation and the despair of citizens. Deane returned to Yale, retiring in 1970.

William Keller did his undergraduate work at Yale University. He earned a degree in Library Science from Columbia University and later received a PhD in art history from the University of Delaware. Dr. Keller pursued a career in library administration and curatorship and retired as Head of the Anne & Jerome Fisher Fine Arts Library at the University of Pennsylvania.

# More About Kendal's Residents



#### **Regina and Thomas Shea**

#### **Regina:**

I was born in Philadelphia and raised just north of the city in a suburb that predates the Revolutionary War. My childhood (after my younger sister died of leukemia) included summer trips to Maine (fishing) and January trips to Florida (fishing). I also enjoyed Girl Scouts. I was a history major at Wheeling College (now University). Had a group tour of Europe that I have always treasured. Then off to graduate school for a master's degree in library science at the University of Chicago. Was tapped to join their reference department, which was my dream job, figuring out the answers to student and faculty questions. And then one day along came Thomas Shea with a question, one that intrigued me, seeking a guide to identifying microscopic critters from pond water. He was someone who actually went out in the woods for the fun of it. After three years, we were married and then our adventures together began. Lots of vacations to national parks and sailing.

Bought our first computer, an Osborne, in 1982, just as I was starting as head of reference services at UChicago. So I wrote an instruction manual on it and trained staff on how to search the new online catalog (no free-text searching in those days).

We moved to Kenosha, WI, to get out of the city, but still commuted by train to work in Chicago. After three years of that, we decided to give ourselves time off. So we quit our jobs, sold our house, bought a larger sailboat, and went sailing. In five summers we sailed out the St. Lawrence River to Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, down the east coast to New York City, up the Hudson River and Erie Canal, and back to the Great Lakes. For two winters we worked at a startup that made early CD-ROM equipment to cover expenses for the year. Then on our way down the coast, we visited Tom's former research colleague and worked the last winter on Long Island at Brookhaven National Laboratory. Tom was in the physics department, and I just happened to connect with the Protein Data Bank, and we both had jobs there for the next 12 years.

After early retirement, we moved to our longtime goal, a rural area in northern Lower Michigan, right on Lake Huron. We sailed the Canadian shore of Lake Superior the next eight summers, till the weather changed and we felt too old to be so isolated in the wilderness. Once we were home for summers, I turned most of the grass in the backyard into a mini prairie. I've been gardening since childhood, and that was my first experience with sandy soil. Now, here at Kendal, I'm being challenged by the opposite, clay soil. I used to envision retirement as a chance to just relax, but it's been much more engaging than I ever imagined. Lots of opportunities here at Kendal.

#### Thomas:

I was born in Cleveland early in WWII. My mother and I moved to Chicago after my father went into the Army. Back to Cleveland after the war and until 3rd grade. Then back to the Chicago area. I was interested in music and electronics at an early age, so I got an associate's degree from DeVry Technical College. Because of serious asthma as a child, I was not drafted. I was fortunate to get a job at the University of Chicago, building equipment for high-energy physics experiments at Argonne and Fermilab.

Then one day I asked a reference question in the library and that's how I met my wife, Regina. We've had wonderful adventures through the years. Vacations were spent camping in national parks out west, canoeing in the Boundary Waters, and chartering in Florida. After my brother died in a skydiving accident, we spent summer weekends doing volunteer public service announcements and a film for the International Crane Foundation in Baraboo, WI. That led to many trips to Nova Scotia to visit the wonderful parents of one of the founders of the ICF, staying in several of their hunting and fishing camps.

I have a sister who is on the faculty at the University of Maine in Farmington.

My side business of doing video productions with friends led to being a partner in a video editing business in Chicago. Sold my interest in that, bought a larger sailboat, and spent five summers sailing out the St. Lawrence River to Nova Scotia and Newfoundland, down the east coast, up the Hudson River, and back to the Great Lakes. What a wonderful adventure. Worked in Santa Cruz, CA, for two winters to support our sailing lifestyle. On the way down the east coast, we moored in front of a former colleague's house on Long Island, and got a job at Brookhaven National Laboratory for the next 12 years.

After early retirement, we moved to rural northern Lower Michigan, right on Lake Huron, for 18 years and continued to sail in the summers and shovel snow in the winters.

We became familiar with Kendal when a colleague moved to the Kendal near Philadelphia. We visited there several times.

But when we heard about Kendal at Oberlin and its closeness to the College and musical offerings, we decided that Oberlin was where we wanted to be. I've brought with me a large collection of LPs, CDs, and open reel audio tapes. Now I can listen to music full time. Save the Date! #### Fall Lifelong Learning Classes at Kendal

Workshop: Literary Journalism. Tues., Nov. 12 and 19; Dec. 3; 10:30amnoon. Those interested MUST REGISTER NO LATER THAN NOVEM-BER 6 by contacting Kari Inglis. No "walk-ins" can be accommodated.

Hal Sundt is Senior Lecturer of Writing and Communication at Oberlin College. His work has appeared in The New York Times Magazine and other publications, and his first book, Warplane: How the Military Reformers Birthed the A-10 Warthog, was published last year.

This workshop explores the genre of writing that goes by many names: literary journalism, narrative nonfiction, or literary nonfiction, writing that balances the rigor of research and reportage with the literary flourishes of fiction and poetry. Participants will read examples together to understand how they were crafted and why they function as gripping, insightful stories, considering questions such as these: What makes a story engaging and how can interviews and archival research be used to animate a scene? What are the obligations and responsibilities of literary journalists? What are the inherent risks of writing in this genre? Participants will develop a toolkit of techniques and approaches to writing in this genre and try crafting their own stories.

Albrecht Dürer: Artist as Creator and Entrepreneur. Tues., Dec. 10 and 17; 10:30am-noon. Lecturer Erik Inglis is Mildred C. Jay Professor of Art at Oberlin College, where he teaches medieval art history. This course is a two-session webinar hosted by the Allen Memorial Art Museum in partnership with Kendal's Lifelong Learning Program. Session 2: Family Man. Families are an important aspect of Dürer's art. He portrayed members of his own family and maintained their historical records. Families also appear frequently in his prints, from the Holy Family of Jesus to the extended family tree of his patron, Maximilian, to generic representations of peasant and Turkish families.

#### From the John Bartram Arboretum Boxelder Maple (*Acer Negundo*)

This maple is not as common in our area of North America as the Red Maple, Sugar Maple, and Silver Maple (described in earlier articles) although it is native. It has a short life span compared to some other large trees, but is fast growing, up to an inch in diameter trunk growth in a year. Its leaves do not look at all like other maple leaves, having five leaflets along a stem. At first glance, you would not say "That's a maple."

# 🖻 Díníng Matters

On Oct. 1 the Dining Matters Committee conducted a listening session for those who take meals in the Fox and Fell or the Langston dining rooms. The resident committee members are Betsy Allen, Marilyn Burns, Tom Konkoly, Barbara Pierce, Prue Richards, Priscilla Steinberg, and Randy Wagner. The staff members are Kyle Nowak, Amy Vetter, and Lisa Wilken. Resident members are always happy to talk with you about your concerns. Here is a quick summary of some of the issues raised during our hour-long conversation.

- Concern was raised about the amount of protein in vegetarian entrees. Ideally each meal should include 25 to 30 grams of protein for a senior weighing 150 pounds. Many of our vegetarian entrees do not have this much protein. This issue is being addressed as the new four-week menu cycle is being developed. Lisa reminded people that the Langston lunch bowls can always have a protein added to them. This is, of course, usually meat. Several people urged greater accuracy in the listing of nutritionals on the menu. Checking the menus by a dietician would help immensely.
- Some people long for the good old days when they could point out to the server behind the counter or pick up for themselves the very piece or amount of the dish they wanted. Some were frustrated by having to order their meal before being able to see what the entrees looked like. We can usually see entrees and chef specials in the entryway of Fox and Fell, and we can walk down the Langston ordering line and take a look before committing to our menu choices.
- One resident suggested that those ordering take-out could be asked to fill out a questionnaire on a card while they are waiting for their meals. The hope would be to find out why people choose to take meals away rather than eating in a dining room. Some people are distressed at the large number of people choosing take-out while others find the more flexible meal arrangement to be an attraction. We will consider this idea, so in the future you may find a quick dining survey as you are waiting for your take-out meal.
- The Hearing Concerns Committee is trying hard to ensure that the remodeled dining rooms are as quiet as possible to minimize background noise for diners. We understand that the importance of this issue has made its way to the Sprint Group.

A number of speakers prefaced their comments with tributes to members of the server and cooking staffs. Clearly most of us appreciate the efforts being made by the staff to serve varied, tasty meals. However, there is no way that everyone can be satisfied. It is important to remember that plain meat and vegetables are always available. We heard pleas for no alcohol, no tomatoes, no salt, no gluten, no garlic, no dairy, and no soy sauce. Lisa assured the group that only Tamari is used in the kitchen instead of soy sauce because it is low salt and is gluten-free. Some people want their vegetables tender crisp, and others want them easy to chew. Some want no sauces, and others want flavorful dishes with interesting sauces.

The meeting closed with a comment that captured the feelings of the Committee. The comment was made by a resident who had been here for 30 years. She said, "I wouldn't want to cook for this crowd." We promise that we will keep listening and keep trying. *~Barbara Pierce, Chair, Dining Matters*
