

Join us for KatO's "Souper Supper" on October 7

Let's commemorate Kendal at Oberlin's 22nd Anniversary in a special way! Instead of treating ourselves to an elegant (and costly) banquet, our Dining Services will serve a more modest dinner. This savings, together with any voluntary gifts by Kendal residents and staff, will be contributed to Oberlin Community Services, where Kendal residents volunteer to help in the food distribution process. Last year this donation totaled over \$7,000. In 2015, thus far, OCS has completed intake of 476 new clients for case work compared to 310 in 2014, has served 1600 families in the past year and has seen a 34% increase in pounds of food distributed, including their new senior food distribution. As recommended by KORA Council several years ago, kettles will be placed in each dining room throughout the day on Wednesday, October 7. Donations by check (made out to "OCS") or cash will support the Oberlin Community Services food distribution program called Holiday Cheer. By contributing to this program, we ALL can help significantly to brighten the season for a goodly number of our Oberlin neighbors.

Know Your KORA Council

October 6, 2015, will mark another year in the life of Kendal at Oberlin. That date is the 22nd anniversary of the ribbon cutting ceremony welcoming the first group of residents to their new community. What is it like to be age 22?

At age 22 a young adult, given favorable developmental circumstances, is outward looking, service oriented, poised to shape an independent life in a world still only partially explored, yet mindful of ties to his or her years of growth that are still held dear. There were many signs, at the September meeting of KORA Council, that similar traits characterize our Kendal community at age 22. For openers, we welcomed new Councilor Randy Wagner who will fill the unexpired term of Bob McClusky. We look forward to having Randy with us.

We learned that at its September meeting, the KatO Board of Directors hosted executives from four agencies that serve the elderly in Lorain County and northeast Ohio for a generative discussion on the most pressing needs they see daily, and discussed how Kendal might relate to these service providers. Resident and Board member Dick Baznik, reporting as the chair of the newly convened Strategic Planning Committee of the Board, noted the importance of positioning ourselves in relation to the many changes in our context and in what have been our traditional markets. Strategic Planning is a committee of the Board of Directors that includes resident representatives Ira Steinberg and Ardith Hayes. Changes in our world give us no choice but to look outward, to life beyond our immediate environment. Our founders were forward looking in envisioning the need for this retirement community, but it would have been difficult to imagine the accelerating aging of the

population that is our context now. At 22 and counting, we face outward, continuing to explore a world that is always changing.

Kendal residents are service oriented. Our anniversary party has most often been the Souper Supper, a lighter than usual evening meal, with the savings realized donated to Oberlin Community Services. On Oct. 7, you will again have the opportunity to participate in this meal and/or make an individual donation to OCS.

Many, well-loved reminders of our 22 year history surround us. The campus itself tugs at all of us with our ponds, trees, wild flowers, wetlands, and lovingly tended gardens. At the September Council meeting, a group of residents, some with backgrounds as arborists, conservancy professionals, master gardeners, brought forward a proposal to

pursue official arboretum status for our 100 acre campus with its over 1,000 planted trees. They are including joint endeavors and celebrations with the town of Oberlin and with Oberlin College. The proposal coincides with the opportunity to apply for a grant from Kendal Charitable Funds, and it will be submitted for consideration. We are resilient at age 22. The Founders wrote of beginning with a campus devoid of grass, and conditions varying from blowing dust to mud, depending on whether they had sun or rain. We continue to be called upon for resilience, as we emerge from dust, mud, and ongoing construction woes. But we are 22. We can handle this, and the many other challenges that may come our way. This 1976 made-for-TV film is the true story of one spirited Japanese-American family's attempt to survive the indignities of forced detention. Jeanne Wakatsuki was seven years old in 1942 when her family was uprooted from their home and sent to live in the Manzanar internment camp with 10,000 other Japanese Americans amid searchlight towers and armed guards. The film is based on her 1973 book which told what it was like as a native-born American child to grow up behind barbed wire in the U. S.

The story and the passionate love affair between him and and a woman whom he meets accidently in Africa (Kristen Scott Thomas) draws the viewer in as, Leonard Maltin wrote, "with its sinuous sensuous images and jarring depictions of war." Oberlin's Renewable Energy Credits Dollars: History and Opportunities Thurs., Oct. 8 - 4:30pm - AUD

Carl McDaniel, a member of Oberlin's Public Utilities Commission, will explain the history of Oberlin's commitment to the goal of becoming climate positive, which requires the City of Oberlin, including Oberlin College, to achieve a net release of no heat-trapping gases.

Oberlin's Municipal Light and Power System entered into carbon-neutral electricity contracts with the consequence that it has garnered Renewable Energy Credits of more than \$1 million.

City staff and PUC members are preparing a policy on the use of these REC dollars to recommend to Oberlin City Council. The use of RECs is a significant issue in the November 3 Oberlin City Council election. Program is free and open to the public

More About Kendal Residents

Randall "Randy" Wagner

I am one of the fortunate people who have known from childhood what my life's work was to be. I early found my sandbox and have reveled in it since. It all began as a young child growing up in Wellington, OH, where I became fascinated by the church pipe organ. As a young high-school lad I began working for an Oberlin organbuilder after school and during the summers. Ohio Wesleyan University provided me with a liberal arts curriculum to help round out my education. I moved from Oberlin where I served my apprenticeship, to Cleveland; to Hagerstown, MD; and finally to Erie, PA, in 1976, in pursuit of my profession. I was at the right places to be a founding and active member of the Lorain County Chapter of the American Guild of Organists; the Organ Historical Society (OHS); the Hilbus Chapter of OHS; and the American Institute of Organbuilders, from which I earned the Master Organbuilder certificate and subsequently chaired the Examinations Committee.

I retired in 2012 as Vice President of Organ Supply Industries, Erie, PA, the largest complete American wholesaler to the pipe organ industry. I was the resident organbuilder and also involved with technical sales, working with American and international organbuilders, influencing many notable pipe organs. St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York; Crystal Cathedral, Garden Grove, CA; Duke University Chapel; Lausanne, Switzerland, Cathedral; and Finney Chapel are a small sample of instruments that contain materials built under my supervision. I continue as a member of the Board of Directors and on call as a consultant.



My work and leisure have taken me to East Germany, the Baltic states, Scandinavia, Ireland, the British Isles, and Germany. I enjoy playing the organ, reading, book collecting, walking, and travel.

Mother was a founding Kendal resident, and I look forward to my sister joining me in the future, making Kendal a family tradition. Once a Buckeye, always a Buckeye.

It was a great job because of the travel perks and the opportunity to interact with others who liked to travel. Joe: I was born in 1937 in Brooklyn, NY, and became part of a very loving Italian family. I graduated from Brooklyn Technical High School in 1954. While at GM I was involved with reducing vehicle emissions, improving air

quality, and improving the quality of fuels and lubricants on a worldwide basis. I am considered the father of "clean gasoline." After retiring, I did consulting work until 2014.

I am a member of the National Academy of Engineering, a Fellow and Emeritus Member of the Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE), and a Distinguished

Alumni of Michigan State. My volunteer activities include serving on various committees of the SAE and Michigan State, and on our local homeowners association.

Sue and I love to travel. We've been in 49 states (North Dakota beckons) and to all continents except Antarctica. We enjoy theater, folk music, and museums. For years I enjoyed downhill, cross-country, and water skiing, and sail boarding. I enjoy reading, especially about great leaders.

Nest Box News

The breeding season is over. As of mid-August the New Russia Township Park nest boxes fledged a total of 28 Eastern Bluebird chicks from four of its 30 nest boxes and 71 American Tree Swallow chicks from 15 nest boxes, and 17 House Wren chicks from two nest boxes. The more modest Kendal trail of 13 nest boxes successfully fledged four Eastern Bluebirds (a second nest of four eggs failed for unknown reasons), 12 American Tree Swallows and four House Wrens. As mentioned last month, we were gratified that no chicks were victims of English House Sparrow attacks this year.

Yet, in spite of vigilance by nest box monitors, we did lose many chicks to blowfly larva infestation. They attach themselves to the chicks and feed on the blood and body fluid of the chicks at night. Four Bluebird chicks and 13 Tree Swallow chicks were lost to this nasty parasite in New Russia Township Park and many Tree Swallows at Kendal. Some eggs laid were "duds" that never hatched, and other eggs simply vanished - probably due to a snake slithering its way into the boxes. Both are preventable with vigilance. Clearly, it's not easy to raise baby birds in the wild! -Nina Love

More News on Egg Production

A press release from United Egg Producers President/CEO Chad Gregory reports it will be at least 12 to 18 months before egg production in the U.S. returns to full, pre-avian-influenza levels. It cites pullet shortage, the need to stagger hen ages, and disease impact on breeder farms as reasons for delay. The egg farmers' cooperative notes that the recent avian influenza outbreak severely impacted egg production in this country and caused egg prices to skyrocket. The major cause of the delay is the need to stagger the ages of laying hens to ensure a steady egg supply.
