Traditional Souper Supper on Mon., Oct. 7

Although October 6 is the anniversary of the founding of Kendal at Oberlin, this year the dining room will celebrate by serving our Souper Supper on Oct. 7. Kendal residents decided long ago to remember how fortunate we are by restricting our dining on that day to a simple meal and donating the cost saved, along with any other funds donated by the residents, to the Oberlin Community Services food pantry.

OCS provides food and nutrition help for marginalized and vulnerable members of the community. The Souper Supper is a small way we can help seniors, children, and vulnerable families into a more sustainable and productive life.

The nonperishable food items you put in the big box by the Heiser receptionist desk year-round, as well as your monetary donations, provide emergency assistance however it is needed – everything from diapers to toothbrushes for kids to special dietary needs for seniors who live on Social Security.

So when you see the soup pots placed at the entrance to the dining room, please consider a generous donation to OCS.

Community Invited to Events Celebrating the Jewish High Holidays

Enid Lader, Rabbi Emerita at Beth Israel—The West Temple, will lead four events for Kendalites to observe *Rosh HaShanah* (Jewish New Year) and *Yom Kippur* (The Day of Atonement). **Whoever wishes to join is welcome.**

Wed., Oct. 2, 7:15pm, AUD - Rosh HaShanah Eve Service. The group will usher in the Jewish New Year with music, readings, the sound of the shofar, and discussion. Jill Sawyer (Priscilla Steinberg's daughter) will sing selected prayers.

Thurs., Oct. 3, 10:00am, AUD - Rosh HaShanah Torah Conversation. Participants examine the Biblical stories of Sarah and Hagar (Genesis) and Hannah (Book I of Samuel) to consider themselves in these women's struggles of loss and hope. This will be followed by *Tashlich* at the Heiser Pond. Those gathered will toss fish food into the pond and imagine that the food represents their misdeeds over the course of the past year. This traditional ceremony symbolically "casts our sins upon the waters," so participants can begin the year with a "clean slate." The shofar will again be sounded.

Participants will examine several thoughtful creative writings that respond to the themes of the High Holy Days and discuss the readings in light of the recent events. Just as we are approaching an important national election on Nov. 5, KORA is approaching its annual meeting and election on Nov. 21. Every resident is a member of KORA, and this Annual Meeting is the only scheduled meeting for the entire resident body for the year.

The agenda includes the election of KORA's 15 Councilors and Officers, the six members of KORA's Leadership Development and Nominations Committee (LDNC), and the adoption of the 2025 KORA budget. At September's KORA Council meeting, the LDNC reported the nominees for these important positions.

KORA has four governance bodies: the Executive Committee, the Council, the LDNC, and a three-member Internal Audit Committee appointed by the Council.

The Council has three committees made up of elected Councilors: the Coordination Committee, the Suggestions & Concerns Committee, and the Finance Committee. Also, each Councilor serves as a liaison to one or more of the myriad Standing Committees and Interest, Service, and Support groups responsible for organizing the extensive and vibrant educational, entertainment, advocacy, social, and celebratory activities of our community.

Just as we need to vote responsibly in our national election, we need to prepare ourselves to participate in our KORA Annual Meeting. Plan now to attend the Annual Meeting at 4:00pm on Nov. 21 in Heiser Auditorium. Get to know the nominees so that they will be better able to represent you.

Civilization and Enlightenment: The Spectacular Art of Japan's Meiji Period (1868-1911). Mon., Sept. 30, Oct. 7 and 14; 10:30am-noon. Dr. Kevin R. E. Greenwood, Joan L. Danforth Curator of Asian Art at the Allen Memorial Art Museum, presents three lectures inspired by the recent full restoration of the Allen's large bronze *Incense Burner with Dragon Base*, made during Japan's Meiji era, and introduces the diverse art of the period. Appreciation for the creativity and technical brilliance of Meiji artists and artisans has flowered in recent decades with major museum exhibitions and publications.

Lecture 1: The Historical Context of Meiji Art.

Lecture 2: From the Awe-Inspiring to the Exquisite: The Diversity of Meiji Art.

Lecture 3: The Global Impact of Early Modern Japanese Art.

Writing Workshop. Tues., Nov. 12 and 19; Dec. 3; 10:30am-noon. Hal Sundt, Senior Lecturer of Writing and Communication at Oberlin College. This course explores the genre that goes by many names, including literary journalism and literary nonfiction. It balances research and reportage with the literary flourishes of fiction and poetry. Participants will read examples together and develop a toolkit of techniques and approaches and try crafting their own stories.

Albrecht Dürer: Artist as Creator and Entrepreneur. Tues., Dec. 10 and 17; 10:30am-noon. (This course is a webinar. To register, see the Museum's website or register at: www.amam.oberlin.edu/durer-webinar) Erik Inglis, Professor of Medieval Art History at Oberlin College. This course examines Dürer as an artist and printmaker, concentrating on the artistic and entrepreneurial innovations that made him a pivotal figure in art history. It is presented in conjunction with an exhibit at the Allen Memorial Art Museum: Albrecht Dürer, Printmaker: Observation, Imitation, and Invention, Sept. 24, 2024, through Jan. 18, 2025.

Elinor and I have served churches together in Rochester, NY; Pittsburgh, PA; and St. Louis, MO, retiring in 2011. Our pastoral ministry focused on church, community, and world renewal both social and spiritual. We were part of a Family Ecumenical Order for five years with the Ecumenical Institute based in Chicago. We have centered on an environmental ministry in our retirement to address the current climate crisis. Other concerns include the preservation of democracy and dismantling of racism and white supremacy.

We resonate with Liberation Theology and its "preferential option for the poor," Faith-based Community Organizing begun by Saul Alinsky in the 1930s, and especially, Creation Spirituality as a way to care for divine creation. We also take seriously the perspective of indigenous peoples around the world and their wisdom for how to live sustainably on Planet Earth.

We come to Kendal at Oberlin for the last years of our lives to live in a vibrant, caring, and progressive community that is still interested in living life to the fullest in the midst of the limitations of older age (Fourth Lifetime).

Interests: I like to get outdoors with all my senses in all seasons. I enjoy playing pickleball, table tennis, and swimming. Music has been a big part of our lives, and I especially enjoy jazz! Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion are good anywhere! Saving life on Planet Earth and savoring life on Planet Earth are passions!

I was born in Ft. Knox, KY, during WWII, lived in Philadelphia until my family moved to Cincinnati, OH, where I grew up, engaged in school activities (sports, music, drama), the Presbyterian Church (Choir), camping trips with family/scouts, fossil/rock/ baseball card/stamp collections. I graduated from Muskingum College in 1966 (Spanish/Religion, drama, A Cappella Choir), summers in study/ workcamps with migrants in Texas, Indigenous communities in Peru, Cuban immigrants in Miami, FL. Introduced to scientist/priest Pierre Teilhard de Chardin's writings.

In 1970 I graduated from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary where I met my husband, Carleton. Since retirement in 2011, we have focused on environmental justice work.

To Vote by Absentee Ballot.

The deadline for submitting Absentee Ballot Requests is Oct. 29. But do it now so the Board of Elections isn't overwhelmed with Absentee Ballot Requests!

- 1. Get an Absentee Ballot Request Form.
 - To download a form, go to the website: www.voteloraincountyohio.gov.
 - Paper copies of the request forms are in the library.
- **2. Fill out the form.** Make sure to provide your phone number and email at the bottom of the form so that the Board of Elections can contact you if something is missing/wrong with the ballot application.
- **3. Mail your completed form** to: Lorain County Board of Elections, 1985 North Ridge Rd. E., Lorain, OH 44055. Actual ballot will be mailed to you on or after Oct. 9, 2023.

- **4. Track the status** of your application at the LCBOE website.
- 5. When you receive your ballot, fill it out soon, and send it back to the Lorain County Board of Elections.

The USPS estimates first class mail may take 3 to 5 days for delivery.

- Vote early in person at the Lorain County Board of Elections starting on October 8 (1985 North Ridge Rd. E., Lorain, Ohio 44055).
- Vote on Election Day, Nov. 5, from 6:30am to 7:30pm, in Heiser Auditorium.

From the John Bartram Arboretum Silver Maple

The Silver Maple (Acer saccarinum) is another well-known maple in northeastern America. It has delicate, graceful foliage and has been planted as an ornamental. The Silver Maple has paired, winged fruit, the largest of any maple, and squirrels and birds eat them. Young twigs are eaten by deer. They are fast-growing, reaching 50'-80', and thus giving shade. Here at the John Bartram Arboretum, there are two mature ones which you can see to the north of Cottages 106 and 107. You



can also see a woods of very tall straight ones if you walk from the employees' entrance back of Jameson on the blacktop path and look toward your left (south). I think that the

woods was here before Kendal.

There are disadvantages to this tree. It has naturally invasive roots which can do damage over time. They can buckle sidewalks, crack foundations, and damage driveways. Surface roots can be a tripping hazard. Thought needs to be taken as to where it is planted. ~Anne Helm, Arboretum Committee

Líbrary Notes

The October special display is books by and about our Indigenous People, aka Native Americans or American Indians, at the request of the Indigenous Peoples Interest Group. October 14 was officially changed from Columbus Day to Indigenous Peoples Day by the Oberlin City Council in 2017.

We have been identifying our books on the subject, coding them in our database and marking the copies with a "Native Americans" label showing an arrowhead. This effort is difficult in our library, given our lack of subject cataloging. For example, we have three books dealing with the captives seized in a French and Indian attack on Deerfield, MA, in 1704 and forced to walk to Canada in the depth of winter. The fullest account is The Unredeemed Captive, 973.2, by ethnohistorian John Demos. But two shorter versions, The Boy Captive in Canada and The Ransom of Mercy Carter, are in the Fiction section.
