

Explaining KORA to the Japanese social studies students from J. F. Oberlin University in Tokyo during their visit to Kendal last month posed a bit of a challenge. In addition to the language barrier, “Residents Association” and “Committee” required several minutes of explanation, then a conversation among themselves to come up with the Japanese equivalent, largely because both concepts are outside common practice in Japanese retirement communities. Their faculty advisor told us that residents in retirement homes in Japan mostly “just sit all day long, either watching TV, or reading the newspaper.” Those are options here, but take a small fraction of our time for most of us.

On a simple organizational chart, I had drawn a bright red line between Kendal at Oberlin’s Board and Administration, and that of KORA. This was another “foreign” concept to our visitors; in Japan resident activities, if any, would be planned and directed by staff.

A further reminder of how smoothly things run here comes from an ongoing conversation between the residents at the new Admiral (Kendal in Chicago) and KORA along with our equivalents in the other Kendals.

Their questions: “Can you describe your Resident’s Council? How are Officers selected? How long do they serve? How many Committees do you have, and what are they?” Our answer: “Look on our website.” Their comment: “We don’t have a website (yet).”

Both the Japanese visitors and Admiral residents asked: “How much is your budget? How is it financed?” Those question bring us to September. Each September, KORA asks our members to contribute to our budget, just over \$25,000 this year, to cover out-of-pocket expenses for the 30 of our 88 Committees that have a bud-

get line, plus a small “miscellaneous” fund. Many committees underspend their budget; the unused funds revert to the treasury. For several years, this modest “unallocated fund” has enabled us to share the cost of audio-visual upgrades in the auditorium and subsidize the Oberlin Connector Bus (both costs shared with KatO).

This year, our unallocated fund, including an extra \$3000 in contributions over budget last September, is helping cover the \$5000 to \$6000 net cost of our 20th Anniversary celebrations, including the printing and distribution of the “History of Kendal at Oberlin.” KORA’s expenditures are but a small part of all that we do with and for each other, and our outreach into the community. Think of the budget as “seed money,” or a “catalyst.” Relatively modest outlays trigger and enable much larger “in-kind” contributions of time and skills, of love and concern. Indeed, it is the sharing of ourselves

that most clearly defines who and what we are as a community. Each of us can take part in this sharing, regardless of financial means.

So, when the annual appeal letter for KORA’s budget appears in your box this week, please be as generous as you are able. But remember that even more important than our dollars are what we share of ourselves.

Neil Brennan, a 23-year-old entrepreneur from Amherst, will tell us about the general field of 3-D printing. He claims that almost anything can be made using 3-D printing. He will explain the recent “maker” movement, 3-D printing, and will discuss what he considers to be the future of 3-D printing. The Maker Movement is an evolution of millions of people who are starting their own small businesses dedicated to creating and selling self-made products. Brennan received a Master of Public Administration from the University of Akron in 2012, and decided that his future was in entrepreneurship.

In late 2012, he co-founded the 3D Bakery. About his business, Brennan says that one can take an idea and make it into something that can be touched and felt, exactly as envisioned. He says that “the company can turn an idea into reality for the whole world to see.”

Welcome Kendal's New Residents

Laurence M. and Marjorie Risser Porter

Laurence: Born in New York in 1936, I attended the one-world, left-wing Dalton School. My father Fairfield, a painter, and my mother Anne (Channing), a poet, belonged to the New York School of artists and writers. With three degrees from Harvard, I moved to Michigan State University in 1963 and taught French, interdisciplinary humanities, and comparative literature there until 2009. I created many courses and programs, and received MSU's Distinguished Faculty Award. My publications discuss approaches to teaching literature; critical theory; dreams (including a book on Freud); Francophone studies (literature and culture in French outside of France); literature and other arts; lyric poetry; modernism; music; painting; psychoanalysis and literature; Romanticism; social dimensions of literature (conversations, communities, and the sociolect); symbolism; translation; women's studies (for example, *Women's Vision in Western Literature: The Empathic Community*).

Amateur interests include music, hiking, racquet sports and travel; past volunteer work involved energy conservation, the Episcopal Church, teaching English to immigrants; the Peace Education Center; and the Peace and Justice Coalition. More recently, I've done some cancer volunteering, but my favorite avocation has always been mentoring junior colleagues, and students, of literature, language and culture.

Marjorie and I met 21 years ago at a Christmas concert. She contributed greatly to raising my younger son Jack, then five, and now a graduate student in film and media studies. My daughter Sarah, a successful novelist, also does professional video-mixing and teaches creative writing in troubled schools. My oldest, Leon, with a PhD in philosophy, designs and edits test questions for the ACT, GRE and graduate and professional school admissions. He lives in Portland, OR.

Marjorie: No one in my Lake Wobegonlike hometown had ever heard of Oberlin. "Overland? Where's that?" Great Aunt Allison sent me. A valedictorian in high school, I got Ds in freshman English at Oberlin. I remember Renaissance men -- Wolfgang Stechow and Andrew Bongiorno; singing folk songs at Pete Seeger's feet till 2:00am at Grey Gables after his annual concerts; rendering Heinz Politzer incredulous when I wrote something intelligent; my gratitude to Clyde Holbrook for making quick work of the tatters of the fundamentalist faith I brought to Oberlin.

Partly because I loved singing German folk songs, and partly because I was hell bent on bumming around Europe before spending the rest of my life as a hausfrau, I majored in a foreign lan-

guage, the better to compete for a Fulbright to fund my dream. It worked: I studied in Berlin, hitchhiked all over northern Europe and took the train from France to Greece.

When my children were small, I left my first husband and wound up back at Oberlin in '74, a rookie in an entry-level development job. Poor Dave Clark! Retired, I love not raising money much anymore -- but find Morningstar financial ratings a bit addictive. Being married to Larry Porter (retired French and comparative literature prof) is the best part. I've been active in my UU church; have enjoyed arranging programs for International Visitors sponsored by the U. S. State Department, serving as a docent at the Michigan State University art museum, participating in a novel discussion group and in a German conversation group. We travel, sometimes with my son, who's in international business in London; and spend time some summers with Porters on an island in Penobscot Bay. My daughter is an animal rights and LGBT activist in Boise, ID.
