KNOW YOUR KORA COUNCIL

September is our month to think about money.

The annual KORA appeal for funds to support our varied activities during 2015 will reach you later this week, for your response by October 10. Last year's total contributions of \$23,800, plus carried balances, are covering this year's KORA committee budgets, plus a \$2,500 contribution to the Oberlin Connector bus. Committees are now considering their needs for 2015. We're not yet aware of major increases, so are setting our goal for this appeal at \$25,000. We will hope you will pick up your "fair share" as you respond.

Kendal at Oberlin's annual budget-setting cycle also begins this week, with a Budget Forum on Thursday, Sept. 4. As part of this process, residents are invited to share their support or concerns by taking part in two "Café" sessions. (See the notice on p. 1 regarding sign-up).

The budget cycle coincides nicely with the returns from the Holleran Satisfaction Survey that Independent Living residents took part in during June. On Tuesday, Sept. 2 at 4:00pm, KatO Administration will present Holleran's summary of our multiple-choice responses, while Sam Goldberg and Nancy Hultquist will summarize the major themes that emerged in the several hundred written comments added by participants in the survey. These presentations, plus limited discussion, will help prepare residents for taking part in the Budget Forum on Thursday.

Finally, Kendal Charitable Funds (part of Kendal Corporation) has offered KatO, and other Kendal affiliates, the chance to apply for a grant of up to \$5,000 for a program "that enrich(es) the lives of older adults, whether within or outside Kendal, and includes, in

Heiser Auditorium Seating for Rollators and Wheelchairs

During regular programs, the new system for seating wheelchair and wheelchair pushers on the south side of the Heiser Auditorium is working well. We are now trying to seat those who wish to keep their rollators in the front row on the left, or in the back of the auditorium.

But the auditorium arrangement for Memorial Services is usually different from the usual arrangement facing the stage. The Memorial Services Committee is still working out a pattern of reserved seats conforming to the new seating.

This may be confusing until we get used to it. The first and best thing to do is to ask an usher to direct you and he or she will help you to the seats reserved for you. The ushers will also be happy to park your rollator and return it to you at the end of the service.

The seating arrangement for Memorial Services provides space for a row of wheelchairs along the north wall. The best way to enter is through the door nearest the stage. Reserved seats for rollator users and their companions are on the aisle accessed by the same door. Seats for persons who must keep their rollators with them are being held along the aisle in the right (west) section.

When the doors to the Heiser Lounge are open, these reserved seats are in the first row of the Lounge seating. Please be patient with our ushers as they are hard-pressed to seat everyone without blocking the aisles. It helps enormously if everyone arrives well ahead of time for the service.



First married to high school friend, Albert Charnes, Helen moved to Elyria, where she taught and then became principal of Crestwood and Spring Valley elementary schools, which she guided for over 27 years. Her second marriage was to Dr. Franklin Schaefer.

Helen has four children: daughters Laurie, in Tennessee, Debbie, in Florida, and Becky Serazin, wife of Elyria's Law Director. Her son, David, lives in Richmond, OH. She has six grandchildren.

Helen cherishes her Master Teacher Award from the Martha Holden Jennings Foundation. This prestigious prize came with a grant to her school for a half-year's salary, and a stipend to allow her to travel to Denmark in 1969 to the International Reading Association Annual Conference. Her award is proudly displayed on her wall in Whittier. The Elyria Schools and Friends Alumni Association honored Helen as a Distinguished Staff Member in 2002.

One of Helen's proudest avocations has been creating chocolate candy from molds, and she introduced one of her classes at Spring Valley to candy molding. Undertaken as an economics project, the students sold the candy to the community and financed a class field trip to Greenfield Village, Michigan. The project was so successful that it received an award from the Kazanjian Economics Foundation. She has many of the antique molds, and plans to use them in Whittier's Country Kitchen to make candy with

When he and his brother Seth were in elementary school, I returned to teaching at an independent girls' school, The Winsor School, in Boston. Before retiring from there in 2010, I researched and wrote a history of the School, *Generous-Minded Women*.

After a traditional family life in the Boston suburb of Braintree, the boys went to MIT and Scott and I moved to a lovely condo in the Longwood/

Fenway area of the city. I continued to teach at Winsor and (following a sad divorce) became involved with a neighborhood Episcopal Church, singing in the choir and then serving as organist and a member of the Vestry. The church provided friendships, opportunities for community service, and a spiritual home.

Music is an important part of my life and I am thrilled to have my Baldwin grand piano with me at Kendal. I also love reading and sewing and singing and walking, and I look forward to doing all of those things and more with new friends at Kendal.

**Notes from the Thoughtful
Medicine Committee**

Taking charge of your health and your health care are the major goals of Thoughtful Medicine. This Committee hears, listens and supports as many of the requests that come to us as possible. Here are some of these efforts in progress.

- Two **support groups** are planned:
 1. A caregivers support group for those directly caring for residents with Parkinson’s Disease or movement disorders. This group will meet for a planning meeting on Sept. 15 in The Den at 4:00pm. Janet Kelsey Werner and Joyce Parker will be there to assist.
 2. A support group for residents dealing with Essential Tremor Disease. If you’re interested, call Don Hultquist at 774-1669 to arrange a time and place.
- An extensive **collection of books** in our library on subjects relating to Kendal’s Thoughtful Medicine approach is being formulated so that residents can find help on a wide variety of interests from “How to Talk to Your Doctor” to education on specific diseases such as arthritis, heart disease, Alzheimer’s, and so on.

- Efforts are being made to understand and develop a workshop dealing with **Advance Directives**. There are many changes coming. The DNR may soon be replaced by the MOLST (Medical Orders for Life-Sustaining Treatment). Kim Peters, Kendal Social Services, talked at the August Committee meeting about the change. Plans for an information session are underway.

- There has been some discussion about developing a system to train residents to be **Medical Advocates** for those who need or want support during medical visits. The Committee will follow up on this issue.

The next meeting of the Thoughtful Medicine Committee will be on Oct. 23, 10:00am to 12 noon, in the Green Room. All are welcome.

July 2014 Kendal at Oberlin Board Notes

Financial Update: While revenues are behind because of occupancy, attrition income is up due to the number of deaths in 2014. June has shown improvement with short-term Medicare stays and some additional direct entries. Expenses are tracking below budget. With entrance fees coming in, we are in good shape and continue to meet or exceed our debt covenants. Our annual call with Standard and Poors went very well and our rating has been confirmed with a stable outlook.

KORA: The Governance and Nominations Committees are expecting KORA Council to submit a list of 5 to 10 candidates to be considered for a new opening on the board for a resident.

Kendal Northern Ohio: Governance options continue to be considered by a representative group of board members.

Health Care Quality Management: This Committee met in June and had some discussion on the use of defibrillators on campus. Based on research and effectiveness with older adults, there is a divided opinion on installing them on the campus.

Pension Plan: It was recommended and approved to continue to support a Defined Benefit Plan as the core plan for Kendal at Oberlin. This recommendation will be forwarded to The Kendal Corporation. Each Kendal affiliate can make its own decision. There will be less mitigation with this plan.

Marketing: Many "Try It" visits continue to be scheduled -- with nine of 15 cottages being renovated promised to prospects.

Master Planning: We now have two contractors overseeing construction: Mack & Sons and Yost. Rey Carrion is now on board as Director of Facility Services and has been proactive on issues related to construction. Carport design has been problematic and is on hold until further review.

Bird Monitoring News

• **The Kendal trail** of 13 nest boxes had only one successful nest from which **4 Eastern Bluebirds fledged**. A second nest failed. Nest boxes near Island and Rock Ponds **fledged 19 American Tree Swallows**.

• **The New Russia Township Park (NRTP)** trail next door to Kendal, successfully fledged **26 Eastern Bluebirds, 74 American Tree Swallows, and 8 house wrens** from its 30 boxes. The Kendal trail not only suffers from predation by English House Sparrows (a non-native invasive and aggressive species) but has more difficulty courting Bluebirds since the NRTP trail with its much better habitat was installed.

More exciting, for the first time, all the New Russia Township Park results will be included with the data collected by volunteers all over the country and sent to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. Thanks to a Black River Audubon volunteer, the location of each NRTP box is located on a map using GPS (i.e., the exact longitude and latitude of the box's location using the global positioning system), along with observations about habitat, box orientation and height. This information is used by Cornell in scientific studies of these variables on the nesting success for the species. Boxes on the Kendal nest box trail are not on the GPS map.

• **Oberlin's Westwood Cemetery** also had a good season. That trail fledged **29 Eastern Bluebirds, 11 Black-Capped Chickadees, 12 American Tree Swallows and 26 House Wrens**. It all adds up! -Nina Love

Resident Satisfaction Survey: A progress report was made on the successful response (99%) for the resident satisfaction survey and a board ad hoc committee that is creating a template for succession planning for the future. All affiliates have been requested to provide this as part of our affiliation agreement outcomes

Generative Discussion: Topic for the July board meeting was "Healthcare Transitions," both internal and external. Dr. Georgia Newman, Medical Director, as well as Lynn Ensinger, were invited, as guests, to lead the discussion. Dr. Newman provided her view of Accountable Care Organizations which are focusing on bringing about improved quality of care, and managed outcomes at a reduced cost. There will be a much greater emphasis on preventive care and documentation to verify efforts. There is also emphasis on forming alliances for acute care -- basically working with each hospital system, not just one. Electronic medical records will be critical in submitting data for proof of service.

6/13 Maureen Bailey, Housekeeping: Female wood duck with 6 babies in Island Pond; 6/16 Scott Orcutt: "Red saddlebags" dragonfly on walkway near trash room #17 – RARE in this area.

6/21 Orcutts: Orchard oriole on the west shore of Rock Pond, foraging and singing, and a little bird mobbing a flying model airplane high over Rock Pond!

6/25 Dina Schoonmaker: Geese with 4 tiny goslings on Rock Pond shore (laggards in love?); 7/1 Hummingbird in the bee balm in the butterfly garden next to the corridor to Apartments (and one has been in my bee balm at

#37, many days.); 7/3 Demmie: Big Blue (like turquoise!) and light green frog in the grass behind Apt. #168. He hopped away into thickets, 6 feet hops!
