An Update From Dr. Joyce Benjamin

The world is upside down. In the 1980s "bad" was slang for "good." In our Delta Covid era, a "breakthrough" is not a good thing; it is a bad thing – not good.

We don't want to go back to March 2020 – that was **bad** bad, as in **really** not good. But we don't have to because we have vaccines (a big thank you to medical science). So this month and next month we have some "new normal" prescriptions from our own Dr. Joyce (a PhD, not *that* kind of doctor).

First and foremost, as Sgt. Esterhaus commanded in *Hill Street Blues*, "Let's be careful out there." This means let's reinvigorate all those hygienic protocols we learned last year:

- Wear good masks and wear them properly.
- Prefer outdoors and when indoors seek good ventilation.
- Avoid crowds.
- Wash hands frequently.
- Use hand sanitizer when soap and water are not available.

Masks: We have become accustomed to wearing masks and some experts advise that even fully vaccinated older people continue to wear masks, especially as we approach the fall season of enforced indoor activity. So wear a good quality, properly fitted mask. KN95 and N95 masks are readily available on Amazon.

Spaces: We should seek to be in non-crowded, well-ventilated spaces, especially when off campus. Our immunizations may have made us complacent. The Delta variant with its extreme viral load and transmissibility

We Kendalites are a resilient, adaptable group of caring, thoughtful residents and staff. The pendulum swinging back and forth between Covid restrictions and opening up has been head-spinning, but we are flexible and coping with it all. Thankfully at this writing, no resident or staff member has become severely ill or hospitalized from Covid.

We recognize the difficulties these restrictions and protocols have caused and appreciate everyone's willingness to adjust and support each other.

Yet during this nearly year and a half of Covid, we have kept up a rich offering of activities and programs from KORA committees, interest and support groups, and individuals. All of this is accomplished by residents and financially supported by KORA, our association.

Every year in September, we ask for your donations to finance activities such as *The Kendalight*, Play Readers, *Eurekal*, Art, Pet Matters, Woodshop, AV, Horticulture, Floral Creations, the phone directory, resident profiles, newspapers in the library, and more. Because Covid restricted programming in 2020, unspent funds were used for special projects like the new computer in the library and a new saw for the woodshop.

Fall LifeLong Learning Classes at Kendal

Our courses this fall will be presented via Zoom. You will be able to ask questions by using the Zoom chat function. To register for a course and obtain the Zoom link, please notify Rebecca Cardozo. There is no fee.

The New Supreme Court; Mon., Sept. 13, 20, 27, 10:30am–12:00pm. Kendal resident Jonathan Entin, Professor Emeritus of Law at Case Western Reserve University, will present a three-session course focusing on the fact that the Supreme Court now has three justices appointed by President Trump. This could have significant implications for legal doctrine, the Court, and the nation.

The **first session** will review the Court's 2020–2021 term and preview major cases on the docket for 2021–2022. These include public school students' First Amendment rights, religious rights, the constitutionality of the Affordable Care Act (again), and voting rights. The next term will see major cases on abortion and the Second Amendment and, possibly, the future of affirmative action.

The **second session** will focus on how the Court seems to be transforming the law of religious freedom, trace the history of the Court's treatment of religious liberty, and examine the prospects for change. The current governing test is the 1990 Smith case, which has been criticized by both the left and the right as insufficiently protective of religious liberty. During the pandemic, the Court has taken a somewhat more expansive view of religious freedom that seems to presage a departure from Smith.

The **third session**, on the changing laws on voting rights and elections, will address the current state of the law and consider how the Court might respond to the spate of new laws adopted in the wake of the 2020 election. This session will also consider proposed federal voting rights legislation that has passed the House but has so far been blocked in the Senate.

Contemporary Japanese Art, 1950s–Present; Mon., Oct. 4, 11, 18, 10:30am– 12:00pm. Kevin Greenwood, Joan L. Danforth Curator of Asian Art at Allen Memorial Art Museum, presents a three-session course on some of the most prominent artists and movements in contemporary Japanese art.

The **first session**, *The Postwar Avant-Garde*, focuses on such artists as the Gutai Group, Mono-ha, and Yoko Ono. After the wartime destruction of Japan, the postwar era was a time of radical experimentation in the arts, questioning and challenging the definition of art itself.

The **second session**, *The Present through the Past and the Future*, looks at such artists as Masami Teraoka, Yanobe Kenji, and Mariko Mori. From the 1970s through the 1990s, some artists used elements of previous art styles and futuristic imagery to comment on contemporary changes in Japanese culture. The **third session**, *Challenges to the "Cult of Cute,"* discusses Murakami Takashi, Chiho Aoshima, and Aya Takano as part of an artistic movement known as Superflat, which adopted imagery from Japanese kawaii (cute) and otaku (obsessive sci-fi and comics fans) cultures and gave this imagery a critical edge.

Coming in November: Join us for a three-session course focusing on environmental issues with resident Terry McGowan and Dr. Rolf Bergman. Dark Sky, Deep Water, and Global Warming, Tues., Nov. 2, 9, 23, 10:30am–12:00pm.

Our mission is to encourage residents to choose a few friends who agree ahead of time to help them in times of medical emergency or with other health-related needs, thus forming their Wellness Support Network. Smart Giving! What Are Charitable Gift Annuities?

Beginning in the 19th century, Americans have enjoyed being philanthropic while maintaining life-long income for one or two persons by creating gift annuities. Distinct from commercial annuities, gift annuities are simple contracts between one or two donors and a nonprofit organization they plan to assist. Gift annuities provide retaining life income payments for one or two people; a promise that the remaining funds after death will support the nonprofit organization; and current-year income tax deduction (subject to income tax law).

Candidates in Conversation

2021 Oberlin Community Candidates Night Wed., Sept. 29 - 7:00–9:00pm First Church Meeting House*

This year Oberlin Community Candidates Night will once again take place in the First Church meeting house! Candidates for Oberlin City School Board and the Oberlin City Council have been invited to participate in this nonpartisan question and answer forum, open to all. As in the past, audience members will be invited to ask questions of the candidates, in addition to those asked by the Moderator.

Due to the ongoing pandemic, both in-person and remote access to OCCN will be offered. The event will be limited to 140 in-person attendees, but the forum will be livestreamed and recorded for those who cannot attend. If Covid conditions change, the program may be presented as a virtual event.

Face masks and physical distancing will be required in the Meeting House. There will be no refreshments served and the usual pre-forum reception will not be held.

OCCN is a nonpartisan event with a long-standing tradition that encourages informed and active participation in government by facilitating voter engagement. A coalition of Oberlin community groups (including League of Women Voters Oberlin Area and Kendal at Oberlin) has cosponsored this volunteer event for more than 30 years.

Get Ready to Vote

Make sure your voter registration is up to date.

You must be registered by October 4 to vote in the November 2 election.

- To check your status, register, update your voter registration, and also find lots of information about issues and candidates, go to the Lorain County Board of Elections (LCBOE) website: www.voteloraincountyohio.gov.
- Paper copies of voter registration forms are in the library.

Apply for an Absentee Ballot.

The deadline for submitting Absentee Ballot Requests is three days before November 2. But do it now so the Board of Elections isn't overwhelmed with Absentee Ballot Requests in October!

1. Get an Absentee Ballot Request Form.

- To download a form, go to the website: www.voteloraincountyohio.gov.
- Paper copies of the request forms are in the library.
- 2. Fill out the form. Make sure to provide your phone number and email at the bottom of the form so that the Board of Elections can contact you if something is missing/wrong with the ballot application.
- 3. Mail your completed form to: Lorain County Board of Elections, 1985 North Ridge Rd. E., Lorain, OH 44055. Actual ballot will be mailed to you on or after October 5, 2021.
- 4. Track the status of your application at the LCBOE website.

When you receive your ballot, fill it out soon, and send it back to the Lorain County Board of Elections. Don't let a pandemic, post office problems, or fewer voting sites cause you to miss your opportunity to vote.

REMEMBER: The United States Postal Service estimates first class mail may take 3 to 5 days for delivery.

- Vote early in person at the Lorain County Board of Elections starting on You'll find profiles of all residents, new-October 5 (1985 North Ridge Rd. E., Lorain, Ohio 44055).
- Vote on Election Day, November 2, from 6:30am to 7:30pm, at the New Russia Township Hall.

From the John Bartram Arboretum: Our Invasive Plants

Any arboretum must work to control invasive plants. This is especially true at our John Bartram Arboretum where we have enjoyed the beautiful spring bloom of the Callery pear trees in front of the Heiser entrance year after year. But this invasive species has seeded out in areas like Wildflower Hill and along the wooded edges on our community's perimeter drive. The trees need to be removed. Hopefully, residents will tolerate the removal work this fall, knowing that much thought has been given to the new landscape design for the Heiser entrance.

The invasive plants in the Arboretum include the Canada thistle (*Cirsium arvense*). Listed as a noxious weed by the Ohio Dept. of Agriculture, it was introduced to North America in the 1600s from eastern and northern Europe and western Asia. The thistle is capable of sending out lateral roots from its main root and its seeds can be viable for up to 20 years. But it has a hollow stem down into the root, and a drop of herbicide directly into the root can help destroy it without getting any herbicide on other plants. And hand cutting of individual plants before seeds mature helps prevent its spread.

English ivy, burning bush, bamboo, purple loosestrife, and periwinkle are other problem plants. Although they may look lovely, these plants can take nutrients from the soil and change the Ph level, making it difficult for the native plants to survive. Unlike the nonnative plants, the native plants provide nutritious food for many insects, birds, and other animals in our environment. OSU Extension Agent Craig Everett notes that nonnative bush honeysuckle produces less-nutritious berries than the native dogwoods and highbush cranberries it displaces. This has caused cardinals, Ohio's state bird, to be genetically less fit.

The glossy buckthorn is one of the worst nonnative invasive species. We have fought it on our Kendal campus for decades. It aggressively invades fields and forests, leafing out earlier than most of our noninvasive trees. Work is underway on our campus to remove buckthorn from wooded areas under renewal to let in the sunshine

needed for spring ephemeral plants.

We need to prohibit the growth of invasive species in order to protect native plant species. We have wonderful resident volunteers working to control our invasive plants, Arlene Dunn in Phase 3 and the Buttonbush Bridge area, and Jill Wettersten on Wildflower Hill, to name a few main folks.

Dining Matters

We are in the midst of a trial period, using Dining Dollars as we explore the options of the Choice Meal Plans. The decisions we will make on September 19 lock us into a plan for the next quarter.

Dining venue, dining menus, and dining options will continue to evolve depending on a host of factors – many beyond our control.

Dining Dollars have allowed us to pay for individual items (à la carte) rather than ordering a complete meal. We now have fewer extra charges on our monthly statements for the odd bagel or ice cream that we picked up on a whim. We are selecting only those items we really want rather than eating a traditional three-course meal.

This "point of sale" part of the Choice Meal Plan has allowed flexibility and fairness; it is more in line with meal plans at other life plan communities. We pay our monthly fee and Kendal uses that fee for operating costs including dining. Our Dining Dollar allocation is the amount budgeted by Kendal for our contracted meal a day. Our contracts do not specify that Kendal should or would refund any of that allocation, but the tiers that we have been trying out do just that – provide a credit based on the tier selected. The credit is basically a refund for the cost of the raw food we elected to forgo.

This part of the Choice Meal Plan is still being evaluated. It has caused concern among residents who think this is a way to reduce their monthly fee while other residents think they must spend all their Dining Dollars to "get their money's worth." The impact of the Choice Meal Plan on Kendal's operating budget is still being evaluated to ensure long-term sustainability in options and design.
