Fall LifeLong Learning Classes at Kendal

The Emerging Supreme Court. Tues., Sept. 6; Mon., Sept. 12; and Mon., Sept. 19, 10:30am–12:00pm. Jonathan Entin, Kendal resident and Case Western Reserve University law professor, will look at the current Court. This threesession course will point out some broad themes in what the Court appears to be doing and explore the implications of its emerging approach.

Session 1: Originalism, History, and Tradition.

Session 2: Review of the 2021-2022 Term.

Session 3: Preview of the 2022–2023 Term.

Art and Architecture of Medieval European Monasteries. Tues., Oct. 4, 11, and 25, 10:30am–12:00pm. Note: no class on Oct. 18. Dr. Eric Inglis, Oberlin College Professor of Art, presents a three-lecture course focusing on medieval European monasteries from the eighth to twelfth centuries. Monasteries were set up as places of retreat from secular society, where monks and nuns dedicated their lives to prayer and worship. Paradoxically, this retreat from society attracted society's attention, and monasteries became medieval Europe's engines of prayer and education, as well as major patrons and producers of art and architecture.

Session 1: The Spaces of a Monastery. Like residential colleges or retirement communities, monasteries had to meet all the needs of their inhabitants, from the loftiest religious goals to the lowliest bodily functions. We'll look at several examples of how this challenge was addressed, including the ninth-century plan of St. Gall and the actual medieval monasteries of Moissac, Fontenay, and Fountains.

Session 2: Three Abbesses and Their Books. This session addresses books made for three women who led convents: Uta of Niedermünster had an illuminated copy of the Benedictine Rule and a spectacular manuscript of Gospel readings; Herrad of Hohenbourg compiled an illustrated anthology of texts in order to educate her nuns; Hildegard of Bingen commissioned a manuscript that documented and interpreted her visionary experiences.

Session 3: Monastic Artisans. We look at manuscripts and metalwork produced by medieval monks. How did their specialized labor contribute to the monastery? Where and when did it take place? How did monks reconcile individual artistic excellence with the monastic injunction to remain humble and obedient?

Coming Tues., Nov. 1, 8, 15: Tom Van Nortwick presents *The Aging Hero: Sophocles' Oedipus at Colonus* as a dramatic representation of the human life cycle.

Oberlin Shansi has been facilitating two-way educational exchanges between Oberlin College, the Oberlin community, and partners across Asia since 1908. Executive Director Gavin Tritt and other members of the Shansi team will talk about ways in which Shansi Fellows, Visiting Scholars, and partners responded to the pandemic and their outlook for the near future.

Initially an exchange with China, Shansi has expanded since 1951 to India, Japan, and Indonesia. Since 1980, it has been active in China again as well.

Denise Weller Presents Her Documentary: *Blood Stripe, a Spouse's Story* Tues., Sept. 27 - 7:15pm AUD and KOTV

Denise Weller will show her documentary *Blood Stripe, a Spouse's Story* and then talk with us about the film. Adapted from her original theatrical production of the same name, it tells the story of a family torn apart as a veteran and his wife struggle with the invisible wounds of war.

This true story of heartbreak, healing, and hope is told through interviews, mixed media, and performance. *Blood Stripe* exposes the unseen tragedy of war and its consequences for the families of those who survived, their lives changed forever.

Art Gallery

Once again, all Kendal galleries are now open to Kendal residents and outside visitors (if they first check in at the kiosk). Giving local artists a venue in which to display their art to a wider audience as well as to us here at Kendal is gratifying indeed!

On August 16 new exhibitions were installed in each of our galleries. In the Kendal Gallery is Elaine Albers Cohen: A Retrospective. The works on view cover more than seven decades of the artist's career, from the 1950s to 2022, in a wide range of mediums – from ceramics and glass enamel to oil, acrylic, ink, and watercolor to ceramic and cast paper assemblage. Elaine will be here for an in-person artist's talk on Fri., Sept. 9, at 4:00pm in the Heiser Lounge. The show will remain in the gallery until October 10.

The Friends Gallery now shows the work of local photographer John Seyfried. John, who goes everywhere with his camera, is afraid he might miss something. As he says, "Before the

days of ubiquitous camera phones, someone had to do it!" Watch WKAO and the bulletin board for his reception date. His show, The Development of My Panoramas, will be on exhibit until October 12.

Dar McDonough's Dumpster Book Art is in the Community Gallery until October 13. Dar, who is director of the Oberlin Public Library, says he sees everything as a collage - from writing, to music, to images. He salvages photos and images from discarded books and recycles them to give them a second life.

The Curio Cabinet now houses an exhibit of the origami creations of local artist James Peake. This inventive artist/teacher creates intricately folded figures – from abstractions to animals and more. On Thurs., Sept. 22, at 4:00pm in Heiser Auditorium, he will demonstrate some of his folding inventions and give pointers to those of us who wrestle with small colorful squares of origami paper in our attempts to fold less ambitious animals and objects!

The works now on view in the Marketing Office Window were created between March and June 2022 by two different Art Studio groups – a Clay Workshop and a Textile Arts class.



➤ Make Sure Your Voter Registration is Up to Date.

You must be registered by October 11 to vote in the November 8 election.

- To check your status, register, update your voter registration, and also find lots of information about issues and candidates, go to the Lorain County Board of Elections (LCBOE) website: www.voteloraincountyohio.gov.
- Paper copies of voter registration forms are in the library.

➤ To Vote by Absentee Ballot.

The deadline for submitting Absentee Ballot Requests is three days before November 8. But do it now so the Board of Elections isn't overwhelmed with Absentee Ballot Requests in October!

1. Get an Absentee Ballot Request Form.

- To download a form, go to the website: www.voteloraincountyohio.gov.
- Paper copies of the request forms are in the library.
- **2. Fill out the form.** Make sure to provide your phone number and email at the bottom of the form so that the Board of Elections can contact you if something is missing/wrong with the ballot application.
- **3. Mail your completed form** to: Lorain County Board of Elections, 1985 North Ridge Rd. E., Lorain, OH 44055. Actual ballot will be mailed to you on or after October 12, 2022.
- **4. Track the status** of your application at the LCBOE website.

When you receive your ballot, fill it out soon, and send it back to the Lorain County Board of Elections. Don't let a pandemic, post office problems, or fewer voting sites cause you to miss your opportunity to vote.

REMEMBER: The United States Postal Service estimates first class mail may take 3 to 5 days for delivery.

> To Vote in Person.

- Vote early in person at the Lorain County Board of Elections starting on October 12 (1985 North Ridge Rd. E., Lorain, Ohio 44055).
- Vote on Election Day, November 8, from 6:30am to 7:30pm, in Heiser Auditorium.

From the John Bartram Arboretum **Good Pollinator Plants in** Our Arboretum

We have many good pollinator plants in our Arboretum, in both our open woods and wildflower areas and we are working to establish more. I will mention a few in this article.



Joe-pye weed is a great native magnet for pollinators. Butterflies, including monarchs, tiger swallowtails, and skippers, love it. It also attracts native bees.



Cardinal flower (Lobelia cardinalis) is a native plant wonderful for naturalizing in wildflower meadows. Its long flower neck makes it difficult to pollinate for many insects. Hummingbirds are strongly attracted to it and get pollen on the top of their heads as they sip the nectar. The pollen then spreads as they fly around.



Iron weed (Vernonia faciciulata), named for its tough stem, attracts many butterflies and other pollinators. It is host to the American painted lady. It has a special value for native bees. Its bittertasting leaves are not liked by most mammals, a benefit here where we have many deer.



Goldenrod has many small flowers grouped together, filled with nectar and Transportation Talk pollen. It draws a wide variety of butterflies, bees, beetles, moths, flies, and wasps. According to the National Wildlife Federation, it does not trigger allergies. Goldenrod makes a beautiful color combination with the joe-pye weed and iron weed in late summer and fall on our Wildflower Hill. Native Americans referred to them as "Sun Medicine." Their blooms have long been used to dye yarn.

Here at the John Bartram Arboretum, we are making a concerted effort to reduce our lawn mowing and are planting more native trees and plants. We are delighted that cottage residents have been planting native species, including pollinator plants, in the fivefoot spaces near their homes.

We encourage residents to seek advice from Grounds staff and Arboretum and Horticulture Committees as to what would work well in their particular location. Our collaboration with the City of Oberlin and the Western Reserve Land Conservancy is very helpful. ~Anne Helm for the Arboretum Committee


