Our traditional anniversary simple meal honoring the founding of KaO while donating to Oberlin Community Services. Look for more in the October issue.



Life-Long Learning Fall Classes at Kendal

Our Two Supreme Courts. Tues., Sept. 5, 12, 19, 10:30am–12:00pm. Jonathan Entin, Kendal resident and Professor Emeritus, Case Western Reserve School of Law, presents a three-session course.

Session 1: Review of the U.S. Supreme Court's 2022–2023 Term and Preview of the 2023–2024 Term.

Session 2: Judicial Ethics and the U.S. Supreme Court.

Session 3: The Ohio Supreme Court.

Ethics in Medicine. Tues., Oct. 3, 10, 10:30am–12:00pm. Kendal resident Alan Lockwood, Emeritus Professor of Neurology, University at Buffalo, and Senior Scientist, Physicians for Social Responsibility, presents a two-session course. Alan is the author of two books on the health effects of climate change.

The practice of medicine has changed substantially during the past decades. The role of patient participation in medical decision-making has evolved as much as advances in medical and surgical treatments. Much of this change has been driven by deliberate or inadvertent disasters. Gone are the days of "First do no harm" in the Hippocratic Oath. This Oath was aimed at the physician and did not specify any role for the patient. Revised versions of the Oath are still taken by students of medicine. Current medical practices place the patient at the center of medical decision-making.

The two sessions will begin with the Hippocratic Oath and continue with a description of the evolution to current practices. Milestones will include the Nuremburg Code, which as of a decade or so ago was still classified as secret by the U.S. government! Other milestones include the Tuskegee Experiment, the Belmont Report, the Common Rule, the Jesse Gelsinger Experiment, and as a surprise to some, the Tenerife Airport Disaster. The National Academy Press publication *Responsible Research: A Systems Approach to Protecting Research Participants* was important in guiding Alan's own role as chairman of the institutional review board of the VA's Western New York healthcare system. More changes are certain to come as medicine and society deal with change.

Sept. 2 - Celluloid Closet (1995) A documentary on how Hollywood films have depicted homosexual characters, subliminally and otherwise. Based on Vito Russo's landmark 1981 book.

Sept. 9 - Through a Glass Darkly (1961) Ingmar Bergman won his second Best Foreign Film Oscar for this moody family drama. It is the first of what came to be called his "chamber dramas," which positioned four characters in one place where they could interact like a string quartet.

Sept. 16 - Imitation of Life (1934) A Black housekeeper and her fair-skinned daughter start a successful business but face familial, identity, and racial issues along the way. In 2005, this Oscarnominated Best Picture was selected for preservation in the U.S. National Film Registry, deemed "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant."

Sept. 23 - Blithe Spirit (1945) Based on Noel Coward's play. When a spiritualist medium (Margaret Rutherford) holds a seance for a writer (Rex Harrison) suffering from writer's block, she accidentally summons the spirit of his deceased first wife, which leads to an increasingly complex love triangle with his current wife.

Sept. 30 - A Higher Law – The Oberlin-Wellington Rescue of 1858.

The rescue was a key event in the history of abolitionists leading up to the Civil War. A group of 37 White and Black men in Ohio were indicted for violating the Fugitive Slave Act of 1850, in which they used a higher law as their defense in a federal court case.

Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Transition Team Considerations

This is a quiet time for the Transition Team. The Deffet Group has been working hard to summarize all of our comments and suggestions gathered during their two-day campus visit, compiling the CEO Needs Assessment responses and adding the individual messages you shared. After review, the Transition Team will approve the CEO position profile drafted by Deffet to help to tell the Kendal at Oberlin story. So, this seems like a good time to talk about some other factors we are considering in our CEO search.

CEO Tenure - While we have been blessed with Barbara Thomas's dedication to KaO for 31 years, the current trend in CEO tenure is much shorter. In today's environment, a CEO stays in their position 4–7 years. If our new CEO stays for 10 years, we will have hit the jackpot!

Work-Life Balance – Successful work-life balance may be defined as meeting and/or exceeding work goals and still having time for family, friends, hobbies, restful sleep, and not constantly worrying about work when away from the office. Today's CEOs expect an organization to support work-life balance and most CEOs are clear up-front about those expectations. Supporting work-life balance has proven to increase productivity, decrease time off, improve morale, and extend retention.

CEO Candidate Professional Concerns – In no particular order, candidates may be concerned about internal and external growth and risk, regulatory management, technology, innovation, people, and organizational culture.

CEO Candidate Personal Concerns – Candidates most likely will have questions about affordable housing availability within a reasonable commuting distance, cultural and leisure opportunities in the region, and if they have children, the quality of the local public school system.

Louise Hausman and **George E. Wright**

Louise:

For a while after leaving my Toledo, OH, home, it seemed I was on an unintentional five-year plan. Five years in New York, Sarah Lawrence College and a year in Tarrytown; five years at the University of Iowa (Iowa City) to earn a Masters and MFA in photography and studio art; five years in South Central Texas, leaving behind a first marriage; five years in East Texas, working as Resident Artist and Curator of Education at the Tyler Museum of Art; five years in Tappahannock, VA, teaching studio art at a small girls' boarding school.

The museum job set me on course for a teaching career, and a total of 29 years teaching all levels. I ended my five-year cycles when I took a job teaching studio art in the Upper School at Cincinnati Country Day School, bought a house, and stayed for 27 years.

George Wright and I were married in Rhode Island after 13 years of being together.

We liked the beautiful Ohio River Valley and the Cincinnati area, especially the concerts, the Symphony and music festivals, museums, and restaurants. Our dogs, Danny, Luna, Oboe, and, still, Ully, have been the best companions at home and on the roads we've traveled together.

My volunteer work after retirement in 2015 included gardening at Turner Farm, a non-profit certified organic farm, and work for Save the Animals

Foundation, a volunteer-run cat and dog rescue.

I love to read, go to the movies and museums, listen to music, eat (and cook), and work in my garden. I've traveled to Kenya and France, and we've taken trips to Chicago, California, NYC, Boston, Western Massachusetts, Vermont, Maine, South Carolina, and Northern Michigan.

Significant early influences include Francis Keller, historian, pianist, women's and civil rights advocate, and surrogate Mom, who set the bar for values I hold today; the Farm and Wilderness Camps in Vermont, where I first learned Quaker ways of living simply and in harmony with nature and other human beings; family trips to Frankfort, MI; overnight train journeys to New Orleans, where my mother's family lived; and now, Oberlin, where I look forward to exploring new places and people, meeting new challenges and continuing to become who I will be.

George:

I grew up in Lyndhurst, OH, and graduated from Hiram College majoring in biology. I went to the University of Wisconsin for an MS in zoology. Living on a dairy farm there influenced a change in career direction to veterinary medicine. I graduated in 1976 from The Ohio State University College of Veterinary Medicine. I practiced companion animal medicine in the Cincinnati, OH, area for 40 years as partner of the Milford Animal Hospital. I was active in the Cincinnati Veterinary Medical Association, and I helped establish the Emergency Veterinary Clinic of Cincinnati, Inc., serving as treasurer and president.

I have been an active board member in three nonprofit organizations providing mental health, addiction, and alcohol abuse treatments over the past 20 years. I gained empathy for the cli-

ents of these services, and I learned much about the challenges of running a large nonprofit business.

I met my wife, Louise Hausman, in 1997. She taught art in Cincinnati and had both my children in her classes. In addition, I was her dog's veterinarian. We discovered we had many common interests in art and music, as well as enjoying eating at restaurants serving locally sourced delicious food. We married in 2012, a beautiful small affair of family and friends on the breezy porch of a cottage in Rhode Island. We lived in a 110-year-old house in an older neighborhood of Milford, OH.

We have thought about Kendal at Oberlin as a possible future home for more than 10 years. We are excited to join the active KaO community. Our golden retriever, Ully, makes the move with us. He is pretty excited as well.



The Girl in Centerfield Tues., Sept. 12 - 7:15pm AUD, KOTV

Director Brian Kruger, a twice-Emmynominated filmmaker, will present his documentary that tells the story of Carolyn King, the 12-year-old girl who inspired the rules and regulations giving equal treatment to women in sports.

From the John Bartram Arboretum **Trees Need Darkness**

Most of us know that darkness is needed by people and other animals. But darkness is needed by trees and other vegetation too. Like most other living things, trees need both bright days and dim/dark nights.

William R. Chaney of Purdue University has done research in this area. Too much night lighting harms trees in variable amounts, depending on the species, its age, and the type of lighting. Trees need sunlight for photosynthesis, but at night, plants, shrubs, and trees need darkness to regenerate a key compound: photochrome. Trees take in oxygen in the dark to respire (breathe) as part of their metabolism. They need to sleep. Prior to our using a lot of outdoor night lighting, Chaney states, we had natural periods of darkness. Don't

leave lights on all night, or at least substantially dim them.

Artificial lighting that extends the day also prevents trees from developing the dormancy of the seasons that helps trees and other plants survive winter weather. Younger trees are more subject than mature trees to cold injury as a result of the growth prolonged by artificial illumination, reports Chaney. Continuous lighting is the most damaging.

Kendal's Dark Sky ad hoc committee of residents and staff, headed by resident Terry McGowan (recently named co-chair of the Technical Committee of References: the International Dark-Sky Association), is working to certify Kendal at Oberlin as an "International Dark Sky Community" as we reduce our exterior light pollution. The choice of type of lamp and whether the lamp shines down rather than up is essential, but

isn't the total solution. New types of lighting control systems designed for LED light sources can both turn lights on and off as well as dim them, and that type of system has recently been installed at Kendal.

What hadn't been known until recently is that the way we have lights turning on when there is movement in the area also seriously disrupts the trees' darkness period for that night. Can we just have that area kept dim for the night?
